

Records To Fall At District 4-B Track Meet Here

More records than ever before in the history of District 4-B are expected to fall late Saturday in the annual district competition.

The meet is scheduled to start at the Roseburg High School track at 4 p.m. The field events will start at this time, and the running events will get under way at 5.

The turnout of B school athletes competing for berths in the forthcoming state tournament is described as "the strongest in history." Many district and several state records are in danger of falling.

Two Favored

The spotlight at the meet will be on Camas Valley, which qualified 16 at last weekend's subdistrict tourney, and Canyonville Bible Academy, which qualified 22.

To achieve berths in the state meet, boys running in Saturday's competitions must place first or second.

The only defending state champion returning to the district meet is Jim Archer of Oakland. He holds

the state title in the 440-yard dash. However, he will have a tough time in his bid to return to the state meet from Walt Sapenter of CBA and Terry Volkman of Camas. Sapenter beat him in the subdistrict, and Volkman was a close third.

Another Oaklander, who is expected to return to the state arena this year, is Bill Fredericks. Last year he was third in the state in the high jump. This year he has the highest leap in state for B competitors at 6 feet 2 1/4 inches. He is considered a solid favorite to win in the district. He is also this year's Hayward Relays champion in the event.

Putter Powerful

Another threat to the district record book is Duane Schultz of Elkton. He is considered one of the top shot men in the state. In the subdistrict, he cast the iron ball 47 feet 7 inches.

Eud Olsen of Canyonville, who was second in the state last year in the pole vault, will be back stronger than ever. With a vault of 11 feet 9 inches behind him, he is expected to repeat as district champion.

Meanwhile, Bob Lawson of Camas Valley is out to continue his record breaking. Last weekend he topped the subdistrict record in the 880 with a time of 2:03.

Mile Featured

Probably the feature race of the day will be the mile. The district champion is John McCray of Powers, but he has been beaten twice by CBA's Dave Morfin this year. Morfin has steadily improved and has broken his school's record for the distance six times. His time last weekend was 4:47, and at least five others should be under 5 minutes.

The first and second place winners at this meet will be eligible to participate in the state meet at Bend May 17 and 18. Other schools and their representation in the district meet Saturday will be Powers 14, Elkton 12, Canyonville 11, Yoncalla and Oakland, 8 each, and Days Creek-Tiller 3.

Big Daddy Lipscomb Dies; Police Set Investigation

BLATIMORE, Md. (UPI)—Professional football player Gene (Big Daddy) Lipscomb died in a hospital today shortly after he was found unconscious in a house here.

Police termed the death mysterious and ordered an investigation by the homicide squad, although they said there was little evidence of foul play.

The Baltimore News-Post said the giant athlete had four "punctures" in his right forearm.

Police said Lipscomb, 31, a tackle for the Pittsburgh Steelers who rose to football prominence with the Baltimore Colts, was found unconscious and breathing heavily in the house.

He was pronounced dead on arrival at Baltimore Hospital. An autopsy was ordered.

The 6-foot-6 Lipscomb, whose playing weight was 283 pounds, achieved all-pro distinction in the National Football League without ever having played college football.

A native of Detroit, the huge tackle learned to play the high-powered kind of game favored by the pros while serving in the Marines.

He signed with the Los Angeles Rams for the 1953 season and for three years was known as little more than a routine lineman in the NFL.

But in 1958 he was traded to Baltimore and it was with the Colts that he blossomed into one of the most feared linemen in the league.

Gifted with amazing agility for a man his size, "Big Daddy" was one of the key factors behind the Colts' championship drives in 1958 and 1959.

He later was traded to the Steelers and after two mediocre seasons, he regained his peak form last fall when Pittsburgh became a championship contender.

In his last professional game, the Playoff Bowl in Miami last January, Lipscomb played one of his finest games against the Detroit Lions.

Tribe Trackmen Seek Revenge Saturday In Big Three-Way Meet At Finlay Field

Jack Burg's Roseburg Indian thinclads are primed to gain a measure of revenge in a triangular track meet on the Roseburg field Saturday afternoon.

They were bested by both Marshfield and North Bend in the Roseburg Invitational, but they have gained strength since then. As an indication, in the Spike Leslie meet since the invitational, Roseburg outpointed North Bend and almost overtook Marshfield.

"This time we think we can do it," Burg says.

The meet with the two coast teams will start at 1 p.m. with field events, and the running events get under way at 1:30. This is the first year for this triangular affair. Last year, this date was reserved for the subdistrict meet, but it has been canceled this year. The district meet is slated next weekend.

One of the major reasons for Burg's high hopes is the fine physical shape and constant improvement the Roseburg squad is showing. Among the Roseburg hard-core runners certain to make top showings are:

Mike Crumican, who is in exceptional shape and is favored to take the mile;

Barry Grant, who now holds the 440-yard dash record of 51.1;

Tom Dodge, with a best of 12 feet in the pole vault, who will be shooting at the school record of 12-5 1/2 Saturday;

Jesse Hart, whose platter throwing has pushed into top contention. His best meet discus throw is 136 feet, but this week, he has been hitting 140 feet in practices;

Doug DuFresne, who has put the shot 47 feet 7 inches, will be trying for 50 feet in this one;

Al Joelson, with a high jump of 6 feet, who is favored to win this event.

In conjunction with this district preliminary, an informal junior varsity meet will be conducted. After each varsity event, a novice competition will be carried on to give more boys a chance at competitive action.

Area Freshmen Track Meet Set Tonight At Roseburg

Nine schools will bring freshmen to Roseburg tonight for the second annual Freshman Invitational at Roseburg High School.

The meet starts at 6 p.m. with field events, and the running events getting under way at 6:45.

Teams participating will come from Joseph Lane and Fremont junior highs in Roseburg, South Grants Pass Junior High, Marshfield, Cottage Grove, Sutherlin, Canyonville Bible Academy and probably Douglas. Only freshmen will be allowed to participate in the full distance events. The only event lacking will be the javelin. But it will be replaced by a 440-yard relay, as well as an 880 relay.

Each school will be limited to two men in any event. It is estimated some 135 boys will be participating. Last year, the figure was somewhat below that since only seven schools participated.

Coordinator Jim Burggreen said it had originally been planned to run the meet under the lights, but with the start of daylight saving time, daylight may continue through the entire event. He expects to see the meet end at about 8:45.

Pee-Wee, Little League Plans Set At Tenmile

The summer Pee-Wee and Little League baseball programs will be discussed at a meeting in the Tenmile School multipurpose room at 7:30 p.m., May 15. Myrtle Creek Viks Favored In Sub-District Track Meet

The host Myrtle Creek Vikings will be ranked as slight favorites as they seek their fourth straight Sub-District 6-A-2 track championship Saturday.

Preliminaries are slated to get underway at 10 a.m. at the Myrtle Creek track, with running events set for 1:30 p.m. On the morning agenda will be the broad jump, javelin and shot put, while the pole vault, high jump and discus start at 1 p.m.

The top three in each event will qualify for the district meet slated next Saturday at Myrtle Creek. The top two from the district meet will then go on to the state.

Bulldogs Rank Second

The Sutherlin Bulldogs figure to go in as the second place favorite in this Saturday's meet. Others in the meet are the Glendale Wildcats, Glendale Pirates, Douglas Trojans and Riddle Irish.

Sure to be one of the feature events will be the mile, as Myrtle Creek's Ed Cadman will be pitted against Sutherlin's Clell Goin. Cadman's best time for the mile this season is 4:37.1, while Goin has turned in a 4:37.7.

Cadman also figures as the favorite in the 880-yard dash. His best time for the season is 2:01.3.

Myrtle Creek also has the top contender in the 100-yard dash and the 220, in the form of Ross Barkhurst. Barkhurst has clocked a 10.2 in the 100 and 23 flat in the 220. Terry Peterson and Leo Steel have both turned in a 10.5 in the 100.

Worley Picked

Glendale's Darrell Worley will be the odds-on favorite in the 440. Worley has posted a time of 52.5, while his nearest competitors are Bill Murphy of Sutherlin with a 54.9 and Russ Anderson of Douglas with a 55.7.

Jim Byrd of Myrtle Creek will be favored in the high and low hurdles with Gary Hall of Sutherlin expected to give Byrd his strongest competitors.

Sutherlin's talented junior, Don Goertzen, who set a new field pole vault record last Saturday at Brownsville, will be the unquestioned favorite in this event. Goertzen cleared the bar at 12-9 1/2 last weekend, the best A-2 mark in the state this season.

Ron Salmon of the Vikings, who has reached 5-8, will be favored in the high jump.

Russ Anderson of Douglas will be favored in the broad jump, while Gary Kennedy of Glide figures to lead the pack in the shot put. The Vikings' Ross Barkhurst is favored in the discus and Sutherlin gets the nod in the javelin.
