

# Robinson 5-for-5, Including Two Homers, Paces Pirates To 13-3 Route Of Houston

There's fresh proof today that the Cincinnati Reds go as Frank Robinson goes.

National Leaguers actually put it another way.

"When Robinson's not hitting," they say, "it's like playing a team that's blind-folded when it bats."

The 1961 NL champions seemed blind-folded, at that, for the first three weeks of the season. They were shut out four times and held to one run three other times as they stumbled around in a hit famine that was enough to make Manager Fred (The Bear) Hutchinson tear up the clubhouse furniture.

Then, Robinson, the NL's Most Valuable Player in 1961 and a .342 hitter with 39 homers and 136 runs-batted-in last season whose average this year had dwindled to a sicy 261, suddenly burst out of his slump. And what a coming out party it was!

**Blasts Two Homers**

All Robinson did Thursday night was go 5-for-5, with two homers, a double and two singles, score

three runs and drive in seven to pace the Reds to a 13-3 rout of the Houston Colts. Teammate Vada Pinson weighed in with 3-for-5, three runs scored and four RBI's to make it a breeze for Jim Maloney to chalk up his fourth victory against one loss.

Robinson's spurge raised his 1963 average 40 points to .301 and gave him six homers and 22 runs batted in.

The San Francisco Giants downed the Milwaukee Braves, 8-2, the St. Louis Cardinals turned on the Los Angeles Dodgers, 10-7, the Chicago Cubs beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-1, and the New York Mets defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 3-2, in other NL action.

**Chisox Beat Yanks**

In the American League, the Chicago White Sox shut out the New York Yankees, 2-0, the Baltimore Orioles beat the Boston Red Sox, 4-1, and the Washington Senators topped the Cleveland Indians, 6-0.

Robinson hammered a two-run double to cap a four-run third-inning rally, hit a two-run homer

in the sixth and added a three-run round-tripper in the eighth to round out his one-man attack on Houston pitchers.

Ed Bailey and Felipe Alou each drove in three runs for the Giants, who have won nine of their last 10 games. The Giants routed Warren Spahn with a 10-hit, seven-run outburst in 5 2-3 innings to hand the great lefty his second loss of the season against four wins. Billy O'Dell pitched a seven-hitter to win his fourth in a row for the Giants.

**White Grand Slams**

Bill White hit a grand slam homer, Charlie James connected for a three-run round-tripper and Gene Oliver connected for a two-run blast as the Cardinals collected 17 hits against five Dodger pitchers. Bob Gibson went 6 2-3 innings to win his first game for the Cardinals.

The Cubs ran their winning streak to six games, longest since 1961, on the strength of the two-hit pitching of Dick Ellsworth. Billy Williams and Ron Santo had two hits each for the Cubs, who have won nine of their last 10 games.

## Doug Sanders Takes Lead In Colonial Golf Tourney

FORTH WORTH, Tex. (UPI)—Doug Sanders and Bill Collins, fortified with anti-pain pills and sharp chipping irons and putters, led the Colonial National Invitational Golf Tournament field into the second round today.

Sanders, chipping so well he had 12 one-putt greens, fashioned a three-under-par 34-33-67 in Thursday's first round. Collins capitalized in a 62-foot chip shot for one of his four birdies en route to a 35-33-68.

Only two other players were able to conquer Colonial Country Club's 7,122-yard par 35-35-70 layout and the gusty winds which raked the course during the first round. They were Jerry Barber and Bob Rosburg with identical 34-35-69s.

**Nicklaus Fifth**

The early favorites were strung

out behind this quartet with red-hot Jack Nicklaus cooled off to a one-over-par 37-34-71 that left him in a six-way tie for fifth place with Bruce Crampton, Gardner Dickinson, Tony Lema, Phil Rodgers and Julius Boros.

Arnold Palmer, the defending champion who is trying to keep Nicklaus from dethroning him for the third time this season, faltered to a 37-37-74, while Gary Player, the other member of golf's so-called "big three," was a stroke better off at 36-37-73.

Nine players were bracketed at 72. Player had four partners at 73 and seven other players were bunched with Palmer at 74.

The opening round also was marked by the disqualification of Don January, the man whose snubbing by Colonial officials for awhile appeared to have touched off a revolt by other members of the tour.

January had a lapse of memory regarding the rules and played his original ball out of a water hazard on the eighth hole after electing to take a second tee shot.

## Herbert New Yankee Killer; Posts 2-0 Shutout Victory

It took Ray Herbert a long time to learn how to beat the New York Yankees, but once acquired the technique is habit-forming.

A 20-game winner in 1962, the Chicago White Sox right-hander from Detroit is the newest American League pitcher to qualify as

a "Yankee killer." And, in the bargain, his flashing curveball is making him one of the AL's top pitchers and a "shutout artist" reminiscent of the dead ball era.

Herbert, who had a 6-14 record against the Yankees until he beat them twice in the last week of the 1962 season, topped 'em for the third straight time Thursday night when he hurled a two-hitter that gave the White Sox a 2-0 victory. It was Herbert's fourth win of the season—and his fourth shutout.

**Chisox Stretch Lead**

The White Sox' fourth consecutive triumph and sixth in their last eight games enabled them to take a one-game lead over the idle Kansas City A's and the Baltimore Orioles, who suffered a 4-1 loss to the Boston Red Sox.

Dave Stenhouse pitched a seven-hitter to give the Washington Senators a 6-0 victory over the Cleveland Indians in the only other AL activity of day or night.

Herbert, a refugee from the Kansas City Athletics, from whom he was acquired June 10, 1961, has now shut out the A's, Orioles and Senators in that order. In those 27 shutout innings, he has allowed a total of only nine hits. His victory Thursday night also dumped the lordly Yankees into fifth place in the AL and tagged them with their first shutout of the 1963 season.

**Surrenders Two Singles**

Herbert was tapped for singles by Joe Pepitone and Clete Boyer, walked only one batter and permitted one Yankee batter to reach third base. The White Sox scored both their runs off World Series hero Ralph Terry (3-4) in the fourth inning on a double by Pete Ward, a walk to Dave Nicholson and Ron Hansen's double.

Stu Miller's one-hit relief pitching for two innings preserved the Baltimore victory for Chuck Estrada, who had yielded the Red Sox only two hits over the first seven innings. Boog Powell homered for the Orioles' first run and they added three more in the sixth inning, with the key blow a two-run double by Brooks Robinson. Chuck Schilling, John Tillman and pinch-hitter Gary Geiger accounted for the Red Sox' three hits.

**Senators Beat Grant**

Stenouse, who tailed off as a rookie last season after a brilliant start, turned in his second victory of the season for the Senators, whose eight-hit attack was paced by Ed Brinkman's three-run fourth-inning homer. It marked the first time the Senators beat Jim (Mudcat) Grant after 12 straight losses to him at Washington. Grant started the game with an overall lifetime mark of 20-4 against the Senators.

In the National League, the San Francisco Giants beat the Milwaukee Braves, 8-2, the Cincinnati Reds routed the Houston Colts, 13-3, the St. Louis Cardinals out-slugged the Los Angeles Dodgers, 10-7, the Chicago Cubs defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-1, and the New York Mets edged out the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2.
