This Sunday, at the instigation of the choir members and congregation, the church's annual Choral Recital will feature an all-Trued program in recognition of his na-

ture at her request. He once rode 20 miles on horseback to hear Padewski play, evidencing his lifetime devotion to music. He has appeared in concert with Metropolitan Opera stars and has made several cross country tours. Writing film music for Hollywood studios, including the score for a Warner Bros. production which consisted of a full chorus and full symphony orchestra along with solo parts, has also been part of his tremendous output.

Since 1943, the Trueds have lived in Roseburg, and have become an integral part of the musical life of the community.

U.S. Business Spurt Seen As Solid Trend

HOT SPRINGS, Va. (UPI)—Administration economists are convinced that the recent spurt in business activity is not a fleeting burst of spring fever, but the start of a solid trend that should hold up this year.

The same feeling of optimism also is shared by some of the top economists in the business world, who usually are a lot harder to convince.

This was the mood Friday when both got together to discuss their hopes for 1963 during the spring session of the Business Council, which includes about 175 of the nation's top business leaders.

Indictments Returned By Grand Jury

The Douglas County Grand Jury Friday returned seven indictments, one secret indictment and one not-true bill. Judge Charles S. Woodrich received the returns.

Indicted were James Edward Lickliss and William John Lickliss, both charged with burglarizing the dwelling of Wesley and Pauline Neas at Drain last Dec. 17, 1962. Bail was set at \$5,000 on each.

Man Indicted
Orval Almo Baker was indicted on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a 15-year-old girl, by inducing her to drive away with him from the home of her parents and to travel from the city of Myrtle Creek on April 5.

Edward Eugene Emerson was indicted for perjury. This case grew out of a District Court trial before Judge Gerald R. Hayes, in which Emerson was charged with drunken driving. He is alleged to have stated on trial and under oath, he was not the operator of the car and had merely been a passenger, but that he had taken the position as driver only after the car had stopped in front of the Myrtle Creek police station. The indictment alleges that this statement was false. Bail is \$2,500.

Clarence E. Young is charged in an indictment with obtaining money by false pretenses. He allegedly passed a worthless \$35 check at the First National Bank of Roseburg and made out on the First National Bank of Coos Bay.

Gun Found
Ralph E. Osborn is charged in an indictment with receiving and concealing stolen property. He is accused of having in his possession a .22 Winchester pump gun, the property of John Painter, knowing it to have been stolen, on July 27, 1962.

A lesser of two charges was made in a true bill charging Marie S. Colburn with assault and battery on Ruth Thompson April 25. A not-true bill was returned against her in which she was charged with assault and battery by means and force likely to produce great bodily harm. The two involved the same set of facts. The assault is alleged to have taken place at a Reedsport motel operated by Mrs. Thompson.

Four Timber Tracts Sold

Four tracts of timber containing 6,822,500 board feet were sold Friday by the Roseburg district office of the Bureau of Land Management for \$112,903.53.

Two of these tracts, containing 590,500 board feet were sold to salvage timber damaged in the Columbus Day 1962 windstorm. One other tract containing 4,122,000 board feet, of which 76 per cent was salvage, received no bids. This tract will be held open for a period of 90 days during which bids for not less than the appraised price will be received.

Lumber Sales Co. Inc. of Roseburg bought the first tract, located southeast of Camas Valley. It paid \$18,428.50 for the tract appraised at \$15,292.50. High bid for the 640,000 feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$20.65 was \$23.55. Other qualifying bidders were Roseburg Lumber Co. and R. & H. Logging Corp. of Roseburg.

Green Valley Lumber Inc. of Myrtle Creek won the second tract containing 5,162,000 board feet on South Myrtle Creek. The company paid the appraised \$83,285.45, based on \$17.05 per thousand for 4,739,000 board feet of Douglas fir.

Other bidders were C. D. Lumber Co. of Riddle and National Plywood Inc. of Roseburg. R. & H. won the third tract of 238,000 board feet. It paid \$4,637.40 for the tract in the vicinity of Table Mountain. The tract was appraised at \$4,569.30, with Douglas fir appraised at \$19.80. The company paid \$20.10 per thousand for the 227,000 feet of Douglas fir.

Other bidders were Roseburg Lumber Co. and Grant Nielsen. The last tract of 352,500 board feet went to Einar Engen. The tract is located northeast of Azalea. Engen paid the appraised price of \$6,532.18, based on a Douglas fir price of \$18.60 per thousand. No other bidders participated.

2 Drown At The Dalles

THE DALLES (UPI)—Two men drowned when their small rowboat capsized in the Columbia River about 10 miles west of here Friday.

The victims were James Powers, 69, and Joseph Arbuckle, 35, both of Hood River.

Their bodies were recovered by a skin diver from the Wasco County sheriff's office.

The men had been fishing and were attempting to attach rope to a piling when their boat tipped over.

CAN'T HOLD OFFICE

New City Official Admits Prison Term

HIGH POINT, N. C. (UPI)—A respected businessman and civic leader told his children Friday he may not take office as a city councilman because he is an convict without citizenship rights.

Virgil P. Carrick, 46, owner of a small manufacturing concern, was one of the eight Republicans elected Tuesday in a GOP sweep that drew national attention.

Carrick was scheduled to be sworn in next Tuesday as a councilman. Friday he told his children and then a news conference that he had served a 7 to 10-year term in prison for an armed robbery committed in 1938.

Anyone who serves one year and a day in prison automatically loses the rights of citizenship, including voting or holding public office.

"I knew it was coming out today so I got my oldest one, my 17-year-old son, Virgil Jr. out of class at high school," Carrick told newsmen. "I wanted him to hear it from me first before he heard it anywhere else."

He then told his other children aged 12 and 10, but a two-year-old daughter was too young to understand.

Carrick said his wife knew that he was convicted when he was 21 in nearby Davison County of holding up a gas station with two other youths in a stolen car.

"But the children never knew," he said, "that is until today."

Carrick said he decided to disclose his past because an "anonymous source" was "spreading the word" about him. He added that his criminal record was "certainly not unknown" although he never advertised the fact.

Carrick settled here on his release from prison and later became owner of a small plant making furniture hardware. He became a civic and church affairs.
