Mets Win Fifth In A Row As Willey Stops Reds 3-2

The last years aren't so painful for Carlton Willey any more because the New York Mets are giving him all he ever asked for—a chance to pitch.

That chance has resulted in the 31-year-old Cherryfield, Maine, right-hander's return to the form that made him one of the most promising pitchers in the National League as a member of the Milwaukee Braves in 1958.

It also has contributed to the emergence of the Mets, a team that lost a record 120 games in 1962, as a major surprise of 1963. The Mets set a club record of five consecutive victories Friday night when they shaded the Cincinnati Reds 3-2 on the strength of Willey's five-hit pitching and an eight-inning homer by Jim Hickman.

Cool Paces Drain Win

Ran Cool got off to a slow start, but then came back to strike out 16 batters and pace the Drain Warriors to an 8-3 win over the Creswell Bulldogs at Creswell Friday afternoon.

Willey won eight games during a two-month stretch to help the Braves to the 1958 NL pennant, but then fell victim to the rigid pitching rotation system that also cost the Milwaukee club Joey Jay and Juan Pizarro. He languished on the bench for four long years until finally this spring the Mets acquired him from the Braves.

Two Runs Uneared
Willey, who yielded two unearned runs Friday night when Johnny Edwards homered after an error by Ron Hunt, now has a 1.50 earned run average for the season.

The Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the San Francisco Giants 2-1, the St. Louis Cardinals edged the Pittsburgh Pirates 1-0, the Houston Colts downed the Chicago Cubs 4-1, and the Braves topped the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-1, in other NL games.

In the American League, the Baltimore Orioles beat the New York Yankees 6-3, the Boston Red Sox defeated the Washington Senators 6-3, the Detroit Tigers routed the Cleveland Indians 14-0, the Minnesota Twins topped the Kansas City A's 2-0 and the Chicago White Sox nipped the Los Angeles Angels 2-0.

Don Drysdale, a 25-game winner in 1962, squared his 1963 record at 3-3 with a six-hit, 11-strikeout performance against the Giants, who had won nine of their previous 10 games. Tommy Davis doubled home the decisive run for the Dodgers as San Francisco's Jack Sanford suffered his second loss against five victories.

Strikes Out 13
Dick Farrell struck out 13 batters and allowed only two hits in winning his third game for the Colts. Farrell pitched perfect ball in eight innings—except in the seventh when a single by Lou Brock and Billy Williams' triple produced Chicago's run.

Friends Say Lipscomb Not "Dope" User

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI)—The mystery surrounding the death of professional football star Gene (Big Daddy) Lipscomb may be solved early next week upon completion of tests that will determine the presence or absence of narcotics in his vital organs.

Thus far, the cause of Lipscomb's death remains undetermined although doctors at Lutheran Hospital said, "The presumption is that death was caused by an overdose of narcotics."

Despite the insistence of all those who knew the 6-foot, 6-inch, 290-pound Pittsburgh Steelers' tackle that he dined on "needles" of any kind even for physical ailments, Dr. Rudiger Breitenacker, who conducted the preliminary autopsy on the 31-year-old Lipscomb, said, "No other cause of death was found."

"At this point the presumption is that death was caused by an overdose of narcotics," Dr. Breitenacker added. "No trace of cocaine or other factors were found."

Further Tests Conducted
The results of further tests will not be known until Monday or Tuesday, he said.

Lipscomb, who gained stardom with the Baltimore Colts before they traded him to the Steelers in 1961, was found unconscious and breathing heavily while seated at a table in the kitchen of a friend's apartment early Friday morning.

Removed by ambulance to Lutheran Hospital, Lipscomb was pronounced dead on arrival.

Big Daddy's body was reported to bear puncture marks above veins on both arms. A syringe, described as "makeshift" by Dr. Breitenacker, was found in a waste basket in the kitchen. A preliminary test of the syringe for narcotics proved negative but further tests are being conducted.

Former Teammates Awe
Lipscomb's body was identified by several of his former Colt teammates, none of whom could believe he ever used narcotics.

"I have never known Big Daddy to take any kind of dope," said Claude (Buddy) Young, former pro football star and a close friend of Lipscomb. "He wouldn't do it."

Dr. Ray Sweeney, the Steelers' trainer, said at his home in Portland, Maine, that Lipscomb even refused to take novocaine once when he was in severe pain with a shoulder injury.

Sweeney quoted Lipscomb as saying: "I never had a needle in my life. I'd rather play hurt than take anything."

The Pittsburgh trainer said, "I think it's impossible that Big Daddy was involved with narcotics. Over the past two years I've been very close to him. I just don't believe this is possible."

A National Football League spokesman said League Commissioner Pete Rozelle was watching for any proof that Lipscomb might have been involved with narcotics.

"If it is proven, naturally we will look into the matter further," the spokesman said.

The amiable, fun-loving Lipscomb, one of the few men ever to achieve pro football fame even though he never attended college, died after "partying" Thursday night, according to Timothy Black a friend.

DeNucci To Meet Gonzalez In TV Boxing Bout Tonight

BOSTON (UPI) — Young Joe DeNucci of Newton, Mass., never noted for his knockout prowess, will meet Jose Gonzalez of New York in the nationally televised middleweight bout at the Boston Arena tonight.

The 23-year-old De Nucci will be making his second national television appearance in just over one month in the 10-round bout.

De Nucci faced the problem of his fistie future after his planned middleweight campaign collapsed earlier in the week on the retirement of Paul Pender, the man considered middleweight champion of the world in Massachusetts.

De Nucci had hoped to whip Gonzalez and get an eventual crack at the title fragment held for three years by the veteran Pender.

De Nucci has a record of 40 wins, four losses and two draws. Gonzalez has won 25 of 32 fights and lists Ruben (Hurricane) Carter and Joey Archer as his recent victims.

Bucs Whitewashed In Tilts; Roseburg To Meet Axemen

A chill wind whipped restlessly over Finley Field and the skies were leaden, but this didn't cool the hot bats and flashy pitching of the Roseburg Indians Friday.

While a small gaggle of fans hunched in their overcoats and sweaters against the cold breeze, the Indians swept a doubleheader from the Marshfield Pirates. They scuttled the white and blue-clad coast squad, 13-0, in the first game and 4-0 in the second. Both were seven-inning contests.

Each one of them turned in a three-hit shutout, with Pizarro and Regan adding kickers by connecting for their first AL homers.

Pizarro kept the Chicago White Sox in first place with a 2-0 victory over the Los Angeles Angels. Pascual blanked the Kansas City A's by the same score to post his fourth win for the Minnesota Twins and Regan led the Detroit Tigers to a 14-0 runaway over the Cleveland Indians.

Pizarro did practically all the work for the White Sox, driving in both their runs with a single in addition to his third inning homer off loser Ken McBride. He struck out six in gaining his second victory without a loss.

Strikes Out Six
