

Ron Fraback Wins Grant

Ronald C. Fraback, 18, Roseburg, a freshman in pre-medicine at the University of Oregon, has been awarded a \$1000 scholarship from the Jackson Foundation, Portland, for the 1963-64 academic year.

This is the second of six recipients of such scholarships to be announced this spring. The particular scholarship won by Fraback is awarded without regard to the major field of study.

Other Jackson Foundation scholarships will go to two students in journalism, one student in law, and one student at the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland.

The scholarships are made available to University students by the trustees of the Foundation, a testamentary trust of the late Mrs. Maria C. Jackson, widow of C. S. Jackson, founder of the Oregon Journal.



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Fraback is the son of Mrs. C. E. Fraback, 635 N. E. Winchester, Roseburg, and a 1962 graduate of Roseburg High School, where he was a member of the student council, the school newspaper staff, and the tennis team.

At the University, while maintaining a grade point average of 3.79 out of a possible 4.00, he has become the University's Greater Oregon representative for Roseburg and has headed the United Fund drive in his dormitory, Morton Hall.

He is a member of the Honors College, the "college within a university" for exceptionally able students, and of Phi Eta Sigma, freshman men's scholastic honorary.

Fraback has been employed during high school and summer vacations in a variety of jobs, most recently as an assistant surveyor on a highway construction project. He plans to work on a Forest Service fire crew during the coming summer.

He intends to enter medical school following completion of his studies at the University.

Valedictorian And Salutatorian Selected At Canyonville High

Sue Hoverson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Hoverson of Canyonville, has been named valedictorian of the Canyonville high school graduating class with a grade point average of 1.22, according to Supt. Norman York.

Beth Chappell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Chappell, has been named salutatorian with a grade point average of 1.53.

Miss Hoverson is student body president this year and co-editor of the "Noyne," the school annual. She belonged to the Pep Club and was a cheerleader for two years and was a member of the Future Homemakers of America, the annual staff and the Lumberjack staff.

She was valedictorian of her eighth grade class. Last summer she received a National Science Foundation scholarship for a five-week course at Humboldt State College.

In the summer of 1961, she served as Worthy Advisor of South Douglas Assembly, Rainbow for Girls and was awarded the Grand Cross of Colors in 1962. Miss Hoverson plans to attend Texas Women's University at Denton this fall.

Miss Chappell is editor of the school paper, "The Lumberjack" this year and was co-editor last year. In her freshman year, she was president of the Science Club.

A winner of essay contests, Miss Chappell won the Douglas County award in the Voice of Democracy contest last year and following her eighth grade year, won a 4-H scholarship to summer school at Corvallis for her essay on prunes. She was Worthy Advisor of Rainbow in the fall of 1960, Grand Patriotism in 1961 and was awarded the Grand Cross of Colors that year. She plans to attend the University of Oregon and major in library.

The workshop, designed to interest future teachers in the challenge of the profession, is sponsored by the Oregon Educational Association and is being held this year for the third time. The scholarship is paid for and awarded by the Glendale chapter of the OEA.

She is also employed as a student-secretary in the school of fine this year.

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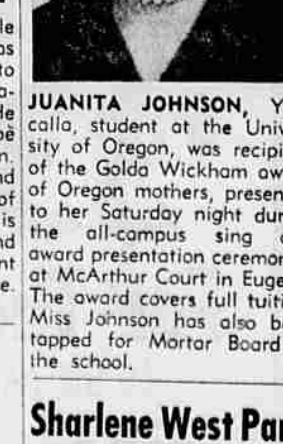
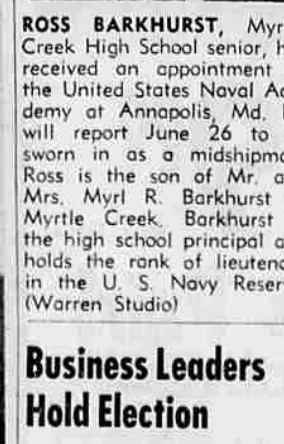
