WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U.S. Supreme Court Monday denied a hearing to Jeannette June Freeman, 21, sentenced to the gas chamber in Oregon for throwing a small boy to his death.

The court's brief order leaves the state free to carry out the execution.

Miss Freeman, who would be the first woman executed in Oregon, had appealed to the high court after the Oregon Supreme Court affirmed the conviction on Sept. 19, 1962.

An execution date for Miss Freeman will be set later.

Bodies of two children were found in May of 1961 at the bottom of the Crooked River Gorge in Central Oregon.

The victims were Larry Jackson, 6, and a younger sister, Mrs. Gertrude Mae Jackson, 32, mother of the two, pleaded guilty to the slaying of the girl and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Miss Freeman's appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court said that on arrest she was not brought before a magistrate for a preliminary hearing; that the statements by her admitted at the trial were obtained during a period of illegal detention when she was deprived of the assistance of a lawyer.
