

Michigan Walker On World Tour To Improve Image Of Americans

A 19-year-old college student from Michigan who plans to walk and hitchhike around the world in an attempt to counteract the "Ugly American" image he fears has spread into many corners of the world, stopped in Roseburg Sunday night and was the guest of the city fire department.

Wayne Kiley, from Adrian, Mich., told The News-Review he figures it'll take him more than a year and a half to hike through the 25 to 30 countries he plans to visit as a one-man ambassador of good will.

"I want to go to all of these countries, working my way along as I go, so I can live with the people on their level—eat their food—and give them a better impression of Americans," he said. "Also, I figure I can get a better insight into their way of life."

He started from his hometown in Michigan on March 18 and has traveled several thousand miles through the U.S., as well as about 3,000 miles through Mexico. He reported receiving a warm reception by the Mexican people.

He traveled through Roseburg after visiting a brother, Mike, at Kingsley Field, Klamath Falls.

while en route to Portland. In Portland, he said, plans call for trying to work his way to Hawaii on a ship. From there, travel plans figure on Japan, Hong Kong, Australia, the Holy Land, Western Europe, and (hopefully) Russia.

Caudill Trial Opens Today

The trial of John Aaron Caudill Jr., 24, of Roseburg, charged with assault with intent to commit rape, opened in Circuit Court before Judge Charles S. Woodrich at 10 a.m. today. Selection of a jury was the first order.

Caudill is accused in a Grand Jury indictment with entering a home on the west side in the early hours of last Aug. 17 and committing an assault with intent to commit rape upon a young woman, by placing a sharp instrument against her throat and "forcibly and violently, grasping, seizing, grappling and clenching" with her.

According to police reports, the girl's alleged assailant fled after she resisted. A similar charge concerning another girl Nov. 25 pends in a Grand Jury action, in addition to two burglary charges in connection with the alleged break and entries of the homes.

Caudill's attorney, Harrison Winston, has filed notice he intends to show his client was insane or mentally defective at the time of the alleged crime. Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson is the prosecuting attorney.

Oakland Residents Protest School Budget At Meeting

A total 32 people turned out at a public meeting in Oakland Monday night to protest the annual school budget, which has been turned down twice by voters.

The protests took no definite pattern, but the School Budget Committee whacked away a group of small items for a total of \$7,515. This brought the budget figure to several dollars less than the present year's operating budget. However, \$300 had to be added to the total to pay for the third election which will be scheduled soon.

The biggest cuts came in the drama and athletics department. The drama department, which has operated at Oakland High School

Roseburg Man Forefeits Bail

During the meeting, Supt. Cecil Barnett expressed great concern over the failure of voters to give approval to the budget. He said the insecurity of not having a budget has started several teachers to begin looking for other jobs where they can find more security. "This shakes their faith in the school district," Barnett said.

He also suggested the district consider voting on a tax base. It presently has no tax base, so the entire budget is outside the 6 per cent limitation. Barnett said he feels establishment of a tax base would protect the instructional program but give people a chance to control large program or capital expenditures.

Oregon Council Sets White Cane Week

This is White Cane Week.

It is the time when the Oregon Council for the Blind asks the public to become more conscious of those who are struggling with the handicap of blindness and who are striving to become self-reliant citizens.

The council says the white cane is becoming the symbol of independence for all blind people and is recognized as an aid to a blind pedestrian in allowing him to be able to travel more safely through traffic.

All of the 50 state governments, the council says, have existing motor vehicle laws on their statute books pertaining to these safety measures. It is a punishable offense for motorists to fail to yield the right-of-way to any visually handicapped pedestrian who prominently displays a white cane while crossing highway and street intersections.

White Cane Week, being observed now, emphasizes to the public the importance of these laws, and stresses the necessity of being ever aware of these helpful and courteous gestures toward blind citizens.

In observance of White Cane Week, the Douglas County Chapter of the Blind is having its fund drive to help finance summer camps, rehabilitation centers and workshops.

Saturday is White Cane Day, when citizens will be asked to contribute to the welfare of the blind. The Roseburg Lions Club will assist in the fund drive on that day.

The Douglas County chapter is also sponsoring a homemade candy sale Saturday, and during the week has arranged for exhibits which may be seen at the Douglas County Library and a downtown drug store.

Kick-The-Fag-Habit Group Holds First Meet At YMCA

Thirty would-be non-smokers attended the first group therapy session at the YMCA Monday to start their five-day effort to stop smoking. The Roseburg Seventh-day Adventist is co-sponsor with the "Y."

Dr. Lewis Hart of the physician-clergyman team conducting the series, reports a serious interest on the part of the participants. "Some have been chain smokers. Many have been smoking for many years. All have a common bond—a desire to break the habit," Hart says.

Participants Monday night received "personal control" booklets with activities outlined for the daily routine. "If these activities are followed," Dr. Hart stated, "the individual can without doubt free himself from the tobacco habit."

Similar to the program followed by Alcoholics Anonymous, those attending the session were assigned "buddies" to help them over the rough spots. Elder A. P. Ritz, participating clergyman, gave instruction in the proper use of will power and pointed out traps that might lure the refrainer back into the habit. The psychological, as well as the physiological, aspects of breaking the smoking habit were also discussed. A color film showing a lung cancer operation was included in the program.

At tonight's session another film, "Time Pulls the Trigger," will be shown, and therapy participants will report on how they fared on their first day without smoking. Further instructions will be given on the five-day plan.

According to Dr. Hart, polls taken following presentation of the series in other cities showed that 70 per cent of the participants in the course have succeeded in controlling the smoking habit. There is still room for a few more persons in the remaining four nights of the series. All are scheduled at 7:30 p.m.
