

Sutherlin, State Agreed On Street Paving Project

Business mostly of a routine nature occupied the Sutherlin City Council at this week's meeting with much action being of necessity delayed until after the budget election, correspondent Mrs. Jerry DeMuth reports. Council president Larry Armstrong presided in the absence of the mayor, Lyle Seehawer.

The deed for a 10-foot strip of school property along Comstock Road, given to the city to facilitate straightening of the street, was announced as completed.

Because of bad weather, completion of sidewalks to West Elementary School has been held up, it was reported. The project will be completed during the summer.

A request for paving the tie-down area in front of the airport has been made to the state Aeronautics Board but a reply has not yet been received, it was reported.

New insurance rating for the city by the Oregon Insurance Rating Board will be held up for at least six months because of defective water mains, Mrs. DeMuth reports. Leaky water mains in three sections of the city are due to be replaced if favorable action is given on the city budget at the election May 23.

Action Requested

In other action, the city requested the library board to take action as a committee on the control of indecent literature, with a report to be made at the next council meeting.

It was reported that the city, as a precautionary measure, had installed a fence around the hole dug for a foundation for the locomotive to be set up in the city park. Rain water has filled the hole, causing a hazard to children, council members said.

Building permits for the month of April totaled \$41,000, with two new residences accounting for part of the total. Four new homes are presently under construction, Mrs. DeMuth reports, showing an upswing from the 1962 construction of only one new dwelling.

Virgil Munion will be auctioneer. Money raised from the auction will be used for a scholarship and payment of expenses to bring a foreign student to Roseburg.

UO Will Train Group Of Peace Corp Workers

EUGENE (UPI) — The University of Oregon will conduct an 11-week training program this summer for a group of Peace Corps volunteers.

President Arthur S. Flemming said the university has received a \$124,000 grant from the Peace Corps to train 40 men and eight women who will serve two years in Nepal. The sessions are scheduled to begin June 11.

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\$2,631 Collected For Cancer Fund

A total of \$2,631 has been collected for the Cancer Fund to date from Roseburg and immediate surroundings according to Tom O'Dell, drive chairman.

While the drive officially closed at the end of April, contributions are still coming in from the mailing campaign and residents who have neglected to return their envelopes are urged to do so now, O'Dell said. No door-to-door campaign was conducted this year, O'Dell said, but various activities have contributed to the present total. An amount of \$874 was collected by "bowl for cancer" games at local bowling alleys and \$150 at "coffee" given to aid the drive.

'Smiley' Burnette To Visit Saturday

"Smiley" Burnette, known as television's "ole frog," and long a popular figure in movies, will be in Roseburg Saturday.

He will make a public appearance on the parking lot of Byrd's Low Cost Market on W. Harvard Blvd. at 2 p.m. He will present a program and will be available afterwards for autograph signing.

Smiley made his first picture in August of 1934, when he and Gene Autry sang in a western movie that starred Ken Maynard. He since has 81 motion pictures to his credit with Gene Autry, 7 more with Roy Rogers, 64 with Charles Starrett, 16 with Sunset Carson, and 1 each with Robert Livingston, Eddie Dew and George O'Brien, for a total of 171 full length westerns. He also has made numerous television and radio appearances.

He wrote 353 songs, 173 used in westerns and 14 in feature pictures. His first love has always been personal appearances, in which his act is a comedy monologue, sound effects and the songs he sang in pictures.

Caudill Trial In Second Day

The trial of John Aaron Caudill Jr., 24, Roseburg on a charge of assault with intent to commit rape, went into its second day at 10 a.m. today.

Much of Tuesday's session concerned the selection of a jury and then part of the afternoon was given over to technical proceedings as to what testimony of officers was admissible as evidence.

Caudill is accused in a Grand Jury indictment with entering the home of a young girl last Aug. 17 and making an attempted assault upon her. He has pleaded innocent and innocent by reason of temporary insanity.

Third Check Suspect Taken Into Custody

A third party allegedly involved in worthless check transactions here recently has been taken into custody and returned here from Corvallis to face a charge of conspiracy to obtain money by false pretenses.

He is Robert F. Whitney, 21, Corvallis, whose wife, Juanita Dianne Whitney, 18, Winston, is being held for forgery, and has been bound over to the Grand Jury.

The third person, William Vade Cary, 19, also of Winston, is accused of uttering a forged check (presenting a forged check for payment). He was bound over to the Grand Jury Tuesday following a preliminary hearing in the district court of Gerald R. Hayes.

The specific check in question is one for \$30, made out to Cary and signed by Margaret Price, an alleged forged name, and cashed at Roy's Enco Service Station on April 17. Other checks are said by police to be outstanding. Whitney allegedly is involved in the transactions.

Judge Rules Mistrial In Drunk Driving Case

Trial of former Roseburg mayor Ernest Milton Barker, 40, of 725 NE Haines St., Roseburg, on a drunken driving charge Monday ended in a mistrial. The case will come up again some time in June.

The trial was conducted in District court before Judge Gerald R. Hayes.

In Roseburg Municipal Court action Tuesday night, Robert Leonard McChesney, 43, of 2475 NE Diamond Lake Blvd., was found guilty by Judge Warren Woodruff and fined \$200 and \$5 costs and sentenced to serve 15 days in the city jail.

Total of 46 cases were handled in municipal court Tuesday night, including two trials. Of the total, 12 were for violation of the basic rule, 18 for non-stop violations and the others miscellaneous.

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
