Summer School Starts June 24

The annual Roseburg School District summer school program is scheduled to start on June 24 and end on July 26.

According to director Bill Williams, the summer school program will include classes in reading, spelling and arithmetic for students of all ages. The classes are basically intended for students who are having difficulty in these areas, or who have missed considerable time during the school year. All classes are one hour each day, Monday through Friday. Students may register for more than one class.

All classes will be held in the library arts building at the senior high school, Williams said. Students will be assigned to rooms on the first day.

Tuition fee will be \$15 for one hour classes and \$25 for two one-hour classes. This tuition may be paid in advance or at the first class, or, special arrangements may be made for later payment. Additional information may be obtained from Williams at the District 4 administration office.

Solons Get Plan For Deschutes River Project

SALEM (UPI)—A \$565,000 project to open up a 20-mile section of the lower Deschutes River in Sherman County was presented Tuesday to a joint meeting of the Senate and House Natural Resources Committees.

Russell E. Getty, state director of the Bureau of Land Management, said the project would be financed with federal funds if the money became available. The plan was prepared by a special state-federal inter-agency study group.

Getty recommended construction of a two-lane public road from Sherars Bridge — on State Highway 216 near Maupin — 20 miles north along the east bank of the Deschutes to Mack Canyon. He also called for construction of three public recreation sites with camping and boat launching facilities.

Long Range Plans
The development plans for the Deschutes below Sherars Bridge are the first part of a long range recreation study of the entire lower Deschutes River basin, Getty said.

Most of the land is not now accessible to the public, he said. Getty explained the proposed road would dead-end at Mack Canyon to preserve the wilderness character of the river downstream from that point.

He said Congress is considering an appropriation measure which would include finances for the project.

He estimated the proposed development would increase usage of the area from 3,000 to 75,000 people a year.

Getty said the BLM would continue to administer the lands, road, and camping facilities. The State Game Commission would be responsible for fish and wildlife resources.

Voter Strength Disparity Seen In Yturri Plan

SALEM (UPI)—The "Yturri Plan" of legislative apportionment would "give a mandate" to go as close as possible to a 3-1 disparity in voter strength, a legislator warned here Tuesday.

Sen. Don Willner, D - Portland, made the remarks as the Senate Committee on Constitutional Revision continued consideration of a House-passed new state constitution.

The plan of Sen. Anthony Yturri, R-Ontario, was accepted in principle by the committee last week, over opposition from Willner and two others. The House had approved Oregon's present apportionment plan.

The committee still must act on specific apportionment language, and Willner and others continued efforts to get closer to the present plan.

Effect Noted
Willner said the effect of the Yturri plan would be to add four representatives to the House, three from Eastern Oregon, and five senators to the Senate, two from Eastern Oregon.

Yturri replied his plan was based on formula recognizing only population figures. He said it would remove inconsistencies in the present population plan and make it workable.

Yturri said under Oregon's present plan, the disproportion in voter strength could go as high as 4-1.

The committee decided the legislature should continue to meet every two years. The House-passed version had made annual meetings optional.

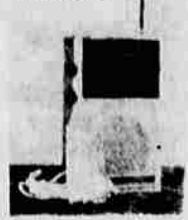
The committee reversed its action of last week and restored new broader language on protection of an accused person against double jeopardy.

It tentatively defeated a move to change the effective date of the document from Jan. 1, 1967, to July 1, 1966, but the votes of two absent committee members could pass the motion.

The speaker was introduced by Jerry Coen.

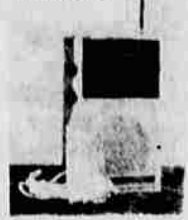

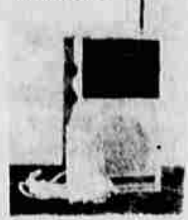

House Gets Rogue Project Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Ore., Tuesday introduced a bill to authorize the Interior Department to construct and operate the Merlin division of the Rogue River Basin project.

The bill was introduced simultaneously in the Senate by Sens. Wayne Morse and Maurine Neuberger, D-Ore.

Duncan said the principal works of the Merlin division would consist of Sexton Dam and Reservoir, diversion and distribution facilities and drainage facilities.

The completed project would provide irrigation water for about 9,300 acres. It also would provide flood control, conservation and development of fish and wildlife and recreation benefits.

The measure calls for an authorization of \$14,750,000. Reimbursable costs of the project would be repaid over an extended period of 50 years. However, Duncan said certain costs would not be repaid. These would include costs of investigation, planning, operation and maintenance plus an appropriate share of the joint costs of the project.
