

Roseburg Indians Topple North Bend In "Tune Up" Pair

The division champion Roseburg Indians, in what amounted to a tune up for this weekend's district championship battles with the South Eugene Axmen, swept both ends of a double bill from the North Bend Bulldogs Tuesday.

The Tribe captured a 7-1 win in the first game and then came back to claim the night cap 11-4. The second game was called at the end of four innings because of the cold—as well as the length of the game.

Indian coach Bill Harper used most of his reserves in the second contest. They'll play South Eugene here Friday and then travel to Eugene for one (or two) games Saturday in the best two out of three series for the 5-A-1 District championship.

Start Off Slow

After three scoreless innings, the Tribe broke the scoring ice in the top of the fourth when catcher Jim Beamer led off with a single to left, advanced to second on an error, took third on a wild pitch and then scored on a pass ball.

In the fifth inning, Dave Sevall singled to right, moved to second on an error, advanced to third the same way and then scored on a squeeze bunt by Marshall Cast. Cast scored on a double by Lance Casbeer to make it 3-0.

In the final inning, Cast singled, pitcher Jerry Boucock singled behind him and then both scored on a double by Bob Manning. Beamer doubled to drive in Manning and Evans then doubled to drive in Beamer.

North Bend's lone run came in the bottom of the seventh, when relief pitcher Tom Rush drilled an out-of-the-park homerun.

For Roseburg, Boucock went all the way to pick up his first league

win of the season. He struck out four, walked none and gave up eight hits.

Take Early Lead

In the second game, the Tribe jumped off to an early lead as Dave Fenner reached first on an error and scored on a double by Cast. Cast was picked off, but Manning doubled and then scored on a single by Kinyon. Mike Cashner doubled to score Kinyon and Long singled to send Cashner home and make it 4-0.

North Bend scored lone runs in the first and third innings to make it 4-2, before the Tribe exploded. It all started in the top of the fourth, when Gary Heeter bunted for a single, Jerry Renick and Fenner walked to load the bases and Bob Hatfield singled to drive in two runs. Manning walked to load them up again, and Kinyon singled to drive in Fenner and Hatfield. Doug Watson was safe on a fielders choice and a double by Cashner drove in Manning, Kinyon and Watson.

Dick Williams started for the Indians, going three innings, before Harper sent Jon Burnham in to loosen up in the fourth in preparation for the showdown with the Axmen.

Although it cost them twice as much for the satisfaction, the San Francisco Giants could claim today they were one up on the Los Angeles Dodgers in the expensive game of "bonusmanship."

The battle was fought on the mound at Tacoma's Cheney Stadium Tuesday night where San Francisco bonus baby Garibaldi outdueled Joe Moeller, the Dodgers' blue chip investment, in Tacoma's 5-2 win over Spokane.

The 21-year-old Garibaldi, who

pitched the distance for his fourth victory and scattered eight hits, got a reported \$150,000 for putting his name on a San Francisco contract.

Moeller got a piddling (by comparison) \$75,000 for signing with Los Angeles, which may be the reason he decided to retire after six innings.

Garibaldi had only one lapse, in the seventh, when he gave up four successive singles and both Spokane runs. But, by then, his teammates had cushioned him to a 5-0 lead and he coasted the rest of the way.

In other PCL action, the Salt Lake City Bees nudged the Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers 3-2, the San Diego Padres rode the strong pitching of Sammy Ellis to a 6-1 victory over the Seattle Rainiers and Denver downed Oklahoma City 5-4 despite the hitting heroics of Carroll Hardy.

The Portland-Hawaii contest was washed out by heavy thunderstorms in Honolulu.

Freddie Burdette turned in a fine relief stint for Salt Lake City to keep the Bees percentage points ahead of San Diego in the Southern Division pennant chase. Burdette was called to the mound in the sixth after Dallas-Fort Worth had put two runners on base with only one out. The strong rightlander blanked the Rangers the rest of the way to preserve starter Wayne Carlander's third victory without a loss.

The defeat was the Rangers' first in eight games at home this season.

Ellis fanned 10 Rainiers batters in pitching the Padres to victory. His big support at the plate came from Mel Queen who drove in three runs with two singles.

San Diego's Deron Johnson extended league leadership in home runs by smashing his 11th four-bagger of the season in the fifth with the bases empty.

Hardy drove in all four Oklahoma City runs with two singles, a double and homer. But his efforts were not enough.

His home run came with a runner on in the ninth and pulled the 88ers to within one run of evening the score. But reliever Clair Hickman got Dave Roberts to fly out deep to right field to end the rally and the game.

Corky Withrow and Jim McKnight belted bases-empty home runs to spark Denver's nine-hit attack.

Tribe Track Team Ready For District

Roseburg track coach Jack Burg will take one senior and an even dozen trackmen who'll be back for more action next season into the District 5-A-1 track tournament a Springfield Saturday.

The Indian trackmen will be competing against Cottage Grove, who Burg said appear to be slight team favorites, as well as Willamette, North and South Eugene, Springfield, Thurston, North Bend and Marshfield for the District 5-A-1 crown.

The top two in each event will win berths in the state tournament. In addition, all those who meet the state qualification in each event, will win a state berth.

The Indians' Mike Crumican will be favored in the mile Saturday. He has turned in the best mile this season (4:24.4) of anyone in the district. Barry Grant, who has posted a 51.4 in the 440-yard dash, is also one of the tournament favorites.

Joining Crumican in representing Roseburg in the mile will be Bill McClung. Crumican and Clayton Nelson will enter the 880-yard run.

Tom Dodge, who has a 12-6 to his record, will represent the Indians in the pole vault. Al Joelson, lone senior in the group, will join with Jorgan Fowler in the high jump.

In the javelin, Burg will send Joe Gerner, while Bruce O'Neil will be in the high hurdles and Ron Leep in the low hurdles. Bob Burgess will take part in the broad jump, 100 yard dash and 220 yard dash.

Balk Rule Changed

NEW YORK (UPI) — It's now official. Major league pitchers no longer will have to come to a full-second stop in their delivery with men on base.

Instead, they must pause just long enough to satisfy the umpires before delivering the ball.

This revision in the controversial balk rule was announced Tuesday by Charles Segar, secretary for baseball, who said the change had been approved unanimously by the nine-man Rules Committee in a special telegraphic poll.

Segar notified all leagues in professional baseball that the phrase "at least one second" has been deleted from rules 501-B and 805-M governing pitchers' deliveries with men on base.

The balk controversy was touched off this spring by President Warren Giles of the National League, who directed his umpires to interpret the balk rule strictly and insist that pitchers come to a full-second stop.

American League umpires, meanwhile, were ignoring the full-second requirements and insisting only that a pitcher pause in his delivery.

When the number of balks called in the National League passed the 190 mark last week, compared to only 10 in the AL, Commissioner Ford Frick called Giles and Joe Cronin, the American League president, to his office.

Herbert Fires Fourth Straight Shutout

Spahn Hurt, But Finishes With Victory

That new contract looks mighty good to Milwaukee manager Bob by Bragan, but old Warren Spahn looks even better to him.

Bragan was signed through the 1964 season shortly before Tuesday night's game with the St. Louis Cardinals and what should have been a festive occasion nearly turned into a nightmare.

Stan Musial threw a damper on the proceedings with a wicked second inning liner that struck Spahn in the pit of the stomach and knocked him to the ground. Acting instinctively, the 42-year-old Milwaukee southpaw groped for the ball, came up with it and threw out Musial but then fell back on the ground.

The game was delayed for several minutes before Spahn finally got up and went on to pitch the Braves to a 4-3 victory that snapped their three-game losing streak. The victory was Spahn's fifth in seven decisions.

Spahn was touched for 11 hits, including a homer by Julian Javier, but he was in front from the third inning on and personally singled home what proved to be the winning run in the seventh off loser Bob Gibson.

Giants Down Pirates

The San Francisco Giants lengthened their National League lead to 1½ games with a 3-1 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates, the Houston Colts shaded the New York Mets 4-3 for their sixth straight, the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Los Angeles Dodgers 5-1, and the Chicago Cubs ended a four-game losing streak with a 2-1 win over the Cincinnati Reds.

In the American League, the first-place Chicago White Sox blanked the Detroit Tigers 3-0, the New York Yankees defeated the Minnesota Twins 2-1, the Baltimore Orioles beat the Washington Senators 6-1, and the Kansas City A's clipped the Cleveland Indians 5-2. Rain washed out the Boston-Los Angeles game.

Jack Sanford won his sixth game for the Giants and the 100th of his major league career, although he needed help when the Pirates kicked up in the ninth inning. The Giants handed Bob Friend his third loss.

Farrell Wins Fourth

Dick Farrell survived a two-run ninth inning rally by the Mets to post his fourth victory for the Colts and helped them equal their longest winning streak in history. Farrell allowed five hits while striking out eight.

Cal McLish stopped the Dodgers on five hits in gaining his first victory of the season for the Phillies. The 37-year-old McLish, who helped his own cause with two doubles, had beaten the Dodgers only once before in his career. Wes Covington started Don Drysdale on the way to his fourth defeat with his eighth homer in the first inning.

Ken Hubbs' two-run homer off Joe Nuxhall in the eighth inning gave the Cubs their winning margin over the Reds. Dick Ellis, credited with his fourth victory in six decisions, held the Reds to five hits before bowing out in the ninth in favor of Lindy McDaniel, who gave up one more.

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ChiSox Star Needs 1 More To Tie Mark

Ray Herbert wants to rewrite baseball's official scoring rules but first he may rewrite the American League's pitching records.

The 33-year old Chicago White Sox' right-hander insists some of the rules governing pitchers' earned run averages "don't make sense" and adds, "my earned run average is my bread and butter."

In the meantime, however, he's taken the matter into his own hands with a string of four consecutive shutouts and a 1.80 ERA that makes him the pitching sensation of the year. He needs just one more shutout to equal the major league mark of five in a row set by Doc White of the White Sox in 1904. His current string is the longest run of consecutive shutout innings in the major leagues since 1950.

Hold First Place

The curve-and-control artist—he's yielded only eight walks while striking out 28 batters in 50 innings—beat the Detroit Tigers 3-0 Tuesday night enabling the White Sox to retain their one-game first-place lead. He's allowed a total of 15 hits in scoring consecutive shutouts over the Tigers, New York Yankees, Washington Senators and Baltimore Orioles. His first victory of the season — back on April 17 — was a three-hit shutout over the Kansas City Athletics.

Herbert has been hit pretty hard in other starts but even so has allowed only 34 hits and 10 earned runs this year.

Jim Landis provided Herbert and the White Sox with all the runs they needed with a leadoff homer in the first inning and a two-run single in the fifth. The unlucky loser was Jim Bunning, who allowed three hits and struck out eight but suffered his fourth defeat.

The Yankees shaded the Minnesota Twins 2-1, the Athletics topped the Cleveland Indians 5-2, and the Orioles beat the Senators 6-1 in other AL games. Los Angeles at Boston was rained out.

In the National League, the Milwaukee Braves edged the St. Louis Cardinals 4-3, the Chicago Cubs beat the Cincinnati Reds 2-1, the Houston Colts downed the New York Mets 4-3, the San Francisco Giants topped the Pittsburgh Pirates 3-1, and the Philadelphia Phillies beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 5-1.
