Board Proposes Procedures For Rail Pact

WASHINGTON (UPI) —A presidential emergency board Tuesday proposed procedures, including final and binding arbitration, for settlement of the featherbedding dispute to avert a nationwide railroad strike in 30 days.

The board, which submitted a report to President Kennedy late Monday night and met with him today, centered most of its proposals on terms for coping with management demands for elimination of the jobs of diesel firemen, which rail unions have been fighting.

The board said a rail strike would be "crippling" to the nation.

The board made a number of recommendations for settlement of the work rules issues. It said that during its 5½ weeks of deliberations and mediation efforts "considerable progress has been made towards the creation of a climate which could support genuine negotiation."

Nation's Welfare Involved

Asking each side to "re-examine its responsibilities not only to itself, but to the nation," the board said:

"If the parties approach the bargaining table in this spirit, and will immediately undertake serious negotiations, we believe that the difficulties raised by the number and complexity of the issues and by the number and diversity of the parties can be overcome."

Kennedy created the board April 3 to forestall a strike over charges by railroads of featherbedding by unions and the position of labor organizations that their criteria for work rules and pay structure of some 200,000 operating employees should be honored.

The dispute, which has been pending since November, 1959, came to a head after a Supreme Court decision March 4 upholding the right of management to change work rules.

No Strike For 30 Days

The unions, under terms of Kennedy's order setting up the board, are barred from striking for an additional 30 days from the time the report was filed Monday with the White House.

Members of the emergency board are Judge Samuel L. Rosenman, New York, chairman; Clark Kerr, president of the University of California, and Prof. Nathan Feinsinger of the University of Wisconsin Law School.

The board said a general railroad work stoppage "would stop all movement on 82 per cent of the total railroad mileage in the United States, and render idle 94 per cent of the industry's employees."

If this happened, it said, "the damage to the nation would be incalculable."

Birdwatchers Back On Beach

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) —America's birdwatchers, that hardly breed which forsakes living room television sets to stand under the burning sun to watch the nation's space ventures, were back on the beaches en masse today.

Undaunted after standing for hours in the wind-driven spray of the sea Tuesday, many returned to the beaches early this morning to watch this nation's second attempt to launch L. Gordon Cooper on a mission that would send him around the earth 22 times.

Many of the rocket watchers, sometimes called "space nuts" by the less enthusiastic, admit they are trapped by the drama of America's most ambitious space project to date.

Leo Peesi, a soldier from Camden, N.J., said he and his wife would be back on the beach today.

"After coming all this way, we can't go home now," said Peesi, who had asked for special leave from his post in Atlanta to view the launching.

Mrs. George Pyeatt of Portland, Ore., sat in her car throughout the night to be on hand for the first attempt to launch Cooper.

"I saw the other launchings from my comfortable bed at home," she said, "and I could have seen this one here if they had installed auxiliary radar. After all the billions they spend on this program, you'd think they could afford another radar machine."

Most who lined the beaches on Monday night and Tuesday morning to see the launchings were disappointed by the postponement but Mrs. E. H. Rhame of Savannah, Ga., pretty well summed up their attitude: "It's an awful letdown," she said, "to come to see the rocket launch and have nothing happen, but for the safety of the man, I think it is worth it."
