Minow Resigns Top FCC Post

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Newton N. Minow, who labeled television a vast wasteland and rapped radio for carrying too many commercials, is leaving the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) June 1.

Minow, chairman of the commission, told President Kennedy recently he was quitting his controversial two-year struggle to improve the quality of radio and television. He will join the Encyclopedia Britannica as executive vice president and general counsel at a reported annual salary of \$100,000.

President Kennedy immediately appointed E. William Henry, 34-year-old FCC commissioner, to succeed Minow.

Henry, a Memphis, Tenn., lawyer appointed to the regulatory agency last August, was asked if he would continue to follow Minow's "tough line." He replied that "I suppose that is going to be the usual tag put on it, at least in the beginning."

To take Henry's seat as commissioner, the President named Asst. Atty. Gen. Lee Loevinger, head of the Justice Department's antitrust division. William H. Orrick Jr., deputy undersecretary of state for administration, will be named to succeed Loevinger, the White House said.

In accepting Minow's resignation "with reluctance," Kennedy said the 37-year-old chairman's record showed "impressive results." Minow offered to continue his services to the government if they are sought.

Divorce Suits Filed
Ethel Mae vs. Lyle Henry Stout, Married June 6, 1946. Cruelty charged. Plaintiff asks custody of minor child, \$50 monthly support, and award of real property at 1800 SE Strong Ave., accounts receivable from a certain source, with one half of the sum to apply toward support payments, asks award of household furnishings and livestock, and attorney fees. On motion and affidavit of plaintiff, order issued restraining defendant from molesting plaintiff, or from selling or disposing of their personal property. Show cause order issued as to support payments.

Verna B. vs. Leon Washington Elder, Married at Eugene April 16, 1941. Cruelty charged. Plaintiff asks award of minor child, and reasonable support payments as soon as defendant is able to be employed again; award of 1953 pickup to defendant; awarding to plaintiff household furniture, requiring defendant to pay off obligation, and decreeing that defendant has no interest in plaintiff's equity in the Club Tavern, Roseburg.

Bessie Maxine vs. James Dale Parker, Married at Granger, Wash. Sept. 3, 1954. Cruelty charged. Plaintiff asks award of minor child, defendant's naval ship support allowance, awarding to defendant 1957 automobile and confirming the division of miscellaneous property.

Red China, Soviets To Talk Ideologies

TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China and the Soviet Union will open talks in Moscow July 5 in an effort to thrash out their ideological differences, the official Communist New China News Agency reported recently.

The agency said Peking party official Yang San-kun told Soviet Ambassador S. V. Chervonenko that Red China has agreed to a Soviet proposal that the talks "be held in Moscow from July 5."

Moscow and Peking have been at loggerheads over their approach to Communist positions on the West.

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev has advocated a policy of peaceful coexistence in which he claims the Communist world can defeat the West through sheer competition.

Red Chinese leader Mao Tse-tung, on the other hand, has urged a hard-line policy more in accord with the attitude taken by the late Soviet Premier Joseph Stalin.
