Mrs. L. E. Adams Enjoys Fine Trip To Far East

Mrs. L. E. Adams has returned to her home in Roseburg, after spending the past month in the Far East. Mrs. Adams and Mrs. Lloyd Barker left Seattle March 29 by North West Orient Air Ways, for Tokyo, Japan. After touring Tokyo, Nikko and surrounding territory for four days, they flew to Hong Kong, staying at the beautiful Miramar Hotel in Kowloon. Their tour took them to Victoria Peak by tram, to the Bauhinia Gardens and the Aberdeen fishing village, where they saw hundreds of living in sampans and the famous floating restaurants. The tour of Kowloon and the New Territories took them through the government housing of the refugees from Red China. Mrs. Adams reports conditions in this area unbelievable. The travelers were in locked cars at all times since robbery and pick-pocketing was common.

The travelers were fortunate to tour the New Territories on Ching Ming day, the day comparable to our Memorial Day, when the Chinese people travel great distances to visit their ancestors' graves. A picnic is held, with flowers and food placed on the graves, then fire crackers are lighted, setting many fires.

The tour took the travelers to the famous walled city of Kam Tin, which is 300 years old. In this city live 500 families, all of whom are related. The tour took the travelers only one mile from Red China at one point, and through glasses, one could see the Red guards along the border.

After leaving Hong Kong, the travelers flew to Manila, P.I., where they were met by Capt. and Mrs. John Wegner, son-in-law and daughter of Mrs. Barker, who are stationed at Clark Air Force Base.

On Good Friday the visitors watched the "Penitence" marches in several barrios around the area. This is a sight very few Americans have ever seen. They also visited the Negrito village on the base. This is the only Filipino tribe protected by the U.S. government as a reward for its help to us during the last war. The Negritos are small people, and are considered to be the colored people of the Philippines. Santa Thomas prison camp and San Fernando, the end of the Bataan death march was also visited. Four days were spent at Baguio, the summer capital of the Orient. Baguio is a beautiful city and a welcome vacation from the intense heat and humidity of the lowlands.

After a very interesting two weeks in the Philippines, the travelers flew to Honolulu, Hawaii, where they were guests at the Moana Hotel on Waikiki Beach. A luau, several Hawaiian shows, including Hilo Hattie at the Hawaiian Village, a tour of Pearl Harbor and a tour around Oahu and Honolulu took six days.

Mrs. Adams and Mrs. Barker flew to Seattle, Wash., where they were met by their husbands. Mrs. Adams reports a very interesting and educational trip, but one that makes us thankful that we are Americans, and can walk on the street unguarded.
