

Stuart Hits Pair To Lead Boston To Twin Victory

Some guys back up to the pay window, but Dick Stuart had to be different—he went clear over the wall.

Twice!

That's the friendly left-field wall at Fenway Park and what better time to hit a couple of balls over it than on pay day?

They passed out the pay checks all over the majors Wednesday and Stuart picked the occasion to pace the second-place Boston Red Sox to a 9-3 and 7-5 twin-night sweep over the Los Angeles Dodgers with a grand slam homer in the opener and a three-run homer in the nightcap.

It was kind of a mixed-up night for the ex-Pittsburgh first baseman.

The Fenway Park crowd of 12,789 booed him for committing his first two errors of the season but also cheered him for hitting his sixth homer with the bases full in the third inning of the first game and his seventh homer with two on in the third inning of the finale.

Drives In Seven Runs

Stuart drove in a total of seven runs during the twin bill, and although his first homer assured Bill Monbouquette his third victory, Russ Nixon had to break a 6-all tie with an eighth-inning double in the nightcap to bring reliever Dick Radatz his third triumph.

The league-leading Chicago White Sox came from behind to down the Detroit Tigers 7-4, the Cleveland Indians blanked the Kansas City A's 1-0, the Baltimore Orioles walloped the Wash-

Size Of WHL Is In Doubt

SEATTLE (UPI)—Delegates from six Western Hockey League clubs continued their annual meeting here today with the question of whether the loop would be reduced to six teams still up in the air.

Delegates from Calgary and Edmonton Wednesday held a quick caucus and then pulled out of the sessions. They departed after getting permission to postpone a final decision until May 31 whether they will operate next season.

The return of Spokane next season seemed virtually assured when, after nearly seven hours of debate, the directors approved a financial equalization plan.

No details were revealed but the plan replaces the controversial 20 per cent pool that was voted out earlier in the day. The new plan also is aimed at helping those clubs which experienced financial troubles last season.

Robert Breitbard, San Diego sportsman, attended the morning session and made formal application for a league franchise. Art Edwards also made a pitch for a franchise for Long Beach, Calif.

Sid Abel, general manager of the Detroit Red Wings who own the Edmonton club, said Detroit lost \$110,000 in operating the Edmonton franchise last season.

Chateaugay Is Underdog In Preakness

BALTIMORE (UPI)—Entries for Saturday's 87th running of the \$150,000 added Preakness Stakes close today with Darby Dan tucky Derby winner, named ahead of time just as he was at Churchill Downs two weeks ago.

Trainer Jimmy Conway, who had to leave for New York Wednesday, filed the entry before he left "just so there will be no slip-up."

And when the box closes, the names of Candy Spots, Never Bend, Sky Wonder, On My Honor, Lemon Twist and Country Squire are expected to join that of Chateaugay, completing the field of seven.

Although he won the Kentucky Derby by a length and one-half, Chateaugay once again finds himself cast in the role of underdog. For Candy Spots, third in the Kentucky Derby, is pre-race favorite at 7-5 with Never Bend, second at Churchill Downs, second choice at 2-1. Chateaugay ranks third at 5-2.

Candy spots, winner of the Santa Anita derby and the Florida Derby this year, suffered his only defeat in the Kentucky Derby, many observers blaming jockey Willie Shoemaker for his third place finish.

Shoemaker again rides the son of Nigromante, who now boasts six wins in seven races.

Never Bend, winner of the Flamingo Stakes and the champion juvenile of 1962, will be ridden by Manny Ycaza. The colt is ranked better than Chateaugay because several of his races prior to the Kentucky Derby were easy victories and he is expected to improve with a tough race now behind him.

But Conway warns that Chateaugay will be better too. The trainer no longer is concerned about a fast workout by the Darby Dan farm colt on Tuesday morning when Chateaugay equalled the track record for the mile.

Wilbur Wood Pitches 6-Hitter Wednesday As Padres Blank Rainiers 4-0 In PCL Game

For Wilbur Wood, the step from the Pacific Coast League to the majors is as long as the trip from Seattle to Boston, and the young Rainier southpaw is closing that distance just about every time he walks to the mound.

The 21-year-old native of Belmont, Mass., was signed by the Red Sox in 1960 just after being named the outstanding high school hurler in the greater Boston area. He saw action in a Red Sox

uniform briefly at the end of the last two seasons, and he may be wearing that uniform on a more permanent basis if he continues to pitch as he did Wednesday.

Wood held San Diego to six hits and nipped up his fourth straight victory as the Rainiers blanked the Padres 4-0. Wood fanned eight men and showed perfect control in not walking a batter.

In other action around the league, George Williams' home run sparked a four-run rally by Oklahoma City that carried the 8ers to a 7-3 victory over Denver. Hawaii blasted out of a long batting slump with 17 hits to turn back Portland 9-3, the Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers used the home run ball to defeat Salt Lake City 9-5 and superb relief pitching by Ken Rowe preserved Spokane's 6-4 victory over Tacoma.

Wood got all the offensive support he needed from teammate Billy Harrell who drove in three runs with two singles and a sacrifice fly.

Oklahoma City and Denver were deadlocked 3-3 when Williams smashed his home run with two men on base to ignite a four-run outburst by the 8ers in the seventh.

Johnny Weekly had accounted for all three Oklahoma City runs in the early innings with three hits. Starter Ben Johnson, who left the game for a pinch hitter in the seventh, was credited with the victory, his second in three decisions.

Veteran Carlos Bernier made the most noise in Hawaii's hitting spree with five hits in five trips, including a bases-empty home run. Chuck Dees also got into the act for the Islanders with four safeties and two RBI's.

Hawaii starter Ed Thomas was working on a no-hitter until Portland's Jay Hankins dropped a double down the left field line with one out in the seventh inning.

Joe Christian, George Banks and Ray Jablonski led Dallas-Fort Worth's home run parade against Denver. Christian's four-bagger ignited a four-run rally in the first inning, and Banks' and Jablonski's home runs came during a four-run outburst in the fifth.

Ranger starter Marv Meeklenburg survived a four-run spurt by the Bees in the eighth and went the distance for his second win in three decisions.

The Spokane Indians got off to a quick 6-0 lead before Tacoma started whittling it down with three runs in the third and one in the sixth.

When the Giants Jim Hart walked to lead off the eighth, Rowe was called in from the bullpen to relieve starter Norm Koch. Rowe struck out the side in the eighth and retired the Giants in order in the ninth to preserve the victory for Koch.

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Dodger Southpaw Follows No Hitter With Big Win

Sandy Koufax exposed one of baseball's oldest myths today by proving a pitcher doesn't necessarily have to take his lumps the next time out after a no-hitter.

Down through the years relatively few major league pitchers have managed to go the distance in their next game following a no-hit performance.

Koufax, who hurled a no-hitter against the San Francisco Giants last Saturday night, not only went nine innings Wednesday night but did better than that, going 12 while leading the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 3-2 extraordinary triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies.

The southpaw fastballer gave up 11 hits but struck out 12 and did not walk a man. It was only the second time in his major league career that he did not give up a walk during an entire game.

Ron Fairly provided Koufax with his fifth victory by singling home Jim Gilliam from second base in the bottom of the 12th. Reliever Johnny Klippstein had retired 14 straight batters before Gilliam singled in the 12th and moved up to second base on Bob Oldis' passed ball.

burgh Pirates 4-3, the Cincinnati Reds crushed the Chicago Cubs 10-2, and the New York Mets snapped the Houston Colts' six-game winning streak 7-4.

Beatty, Grelle Slated Terms

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Jim Beatty and Jim Grelle, two of America's top distance runners, and other members of the Los Angeles Track Club said today they would not participate in Friday night's Coliseum Relays unless two conditions are met.

The L.A.T.C. members met for three hours at Grelle's home Wednesday night before announcing the conditions.

Beatty, president of the L.A.T.C., said the conditions were:

"1.—We want approval from the Coliseum Commission that the L.A.T.C. can use the coliseum on June 15 or another mutually suitable date for track and field competition.

"2.—The Southern California committee for the Olympic Games will assist the L.A.T.C. in acquiring the appearance of Peter Snell who had already expressed a desire to compete in the proposed competition tentatively set for June 15 in the coliseum."

Grelle had entered the so-called "miracle mile" against Snell. Dyrrol Burleson and others, while Beatty was scheduled to race Murray Halberg in the 5,000 meters.
