Another classic athletic battle is

on the schedule board Friday between two giants of District 5-A-1. In the first of a best-two-of-three-tourney, Roseburg's Indian baseballers will take on the South Eugene Axemen. The game starts at 3:30 p.m. at Legion Field.

The Indians will take a perfect 8-0 southern division record into the tourney, while South Eugene claims a record of 7-1.

Roseburg has four straight wins over each of the other two division teams, Marshfield and North Bend. South Eugene ended its northern division season Monday with a 2-0 triumph over Willamette High. The

Axemen's sharp A. Mendenhall won his second start of the league season, extending his streak of scoreless innings to 14. He tossed a two-hitter, striking out eight and walking four. He is expected to start on the mound against Roseburg.

Starting for Roseburg will be Dick Williams, who helped win the second game against North Bend Tuesday and was credited with a flashy three-hitter last Friday against Marshfield. Burnham has a league record of 2-0.

Roseburg will be playing with the same squad it has gone with most of the season.

If Roseburg wins the one here Friday afternoon, it need only win one more Saturday at Eugene. This second game, and a third, if necessary, will take place in Eugene Saturday, starting at 12:30 p.m. Jon Burnham, who pitched a one-hitter against Marshfield, will start that one.

Canyonville Firemen Drop Little League Sponsorship

There'll be no Little League baseball in Canyonville this summer unless someone else will pick up the tab.

According to Canyonville Volunteer Fire Department spokesman Norman Hanson, the firemen, who initiated the summer ball program three years ago and have invested close to \$1000 and countless hours of time, feel no responsibility to continue the program.

Hanson said the firemen used their own personal money—not department or city funds—to get the Little League going; primarily to keep the town's children from missing their little time.

They planned right from the beginning that the school district would assume some of the cost of the program, which it did last year. Now, this year, as a result of the voters rejecting the budget last week at the annual school election, the board has eliminated the summer recreation program from its revised budget, correspondent

Mrs. R. E. Proctor reported.

Right from the beginning of the entire school district participated in the program—not just boys from town—and a lot of parents became ardent fans and real community interest was generated. Hanson pointed out.

All neighboring communities sponsor Little League ball. One depends on private subscriptions, one is supported by city funds and three are supported in part by their school districts, Mrs. Proctor reported.

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O'Dell Gets Nod For Giants Today

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The New York Mets, no longer a joke around the circuit, moved into Candlestick Park today for the start of a three-game series with the Giants who seemed to be running out of base hits.

Undefeated southpaw Billy O'Dell was tabbed by manager Alvin Dark to go after his fifth win of the season for the Giants. Casey Stengel, the legendary pilot of the Mets, counted with Jay Hook (1-4).

The giants won three out of four from the Mets earlier this year at the Polo Grounds but the fledgling National Leaguers also

have enjoyed a five-game winning streak.

Although held to four hits Wednesday, the Giants squeezed out a 4-3 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates and Dark didn't seem upset about the famine at the plate.

"We still got the most runs and that's what counts," Dark said.

How about Willie Mays, whose batting average is grooved at .252?

"Willie will be okay," Dark said of his \$100,000 per year crasser.

Bolin is Fireman

Bob Bolin came on in the eighth inning Wednesday to quell a rally and save Juan Marichal's fifth

win of the season. Pittsburgh got to Don Juan for a total of eight hits during the game and had bashed him for three extra base blows and two runs in the eighth alone, before Bolin came in with two out.

Then, with the tying run on second, Bolin made Bob Bailey hit a hot grounder to Jim Davenport at third who threw him out and ended the uprising.

San Francisco scored all its runs in the fifth inning at the expense of Don Cardwell (1-3) who became unglued after a fine start. During the frame, the veteran right-hander gave up a bases loaded walk, hit a batter with the bases still loaded, and issued two other passes.

A double by Bill Virdon and Bob Skinner's triple accounted for one run during the Pirates' eighth. Will Stargell then hit a sacrifice fly to Mays and Skinner came home ahead of a fine throw for the third Pirate tally.

Also to be honored will be Eldon Jenne, Pacific University coach of the middle 30's who since has been director of physical education in Portland elementary schools.

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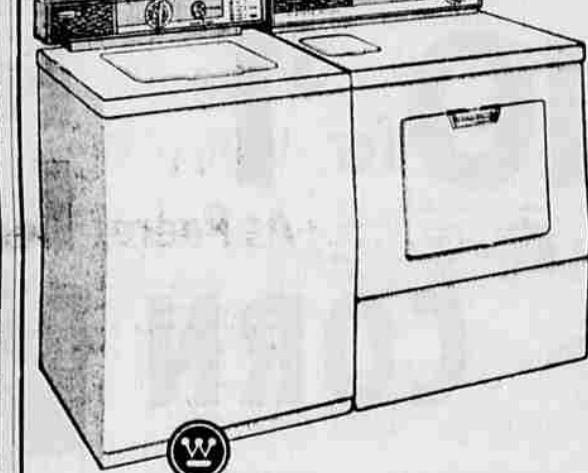
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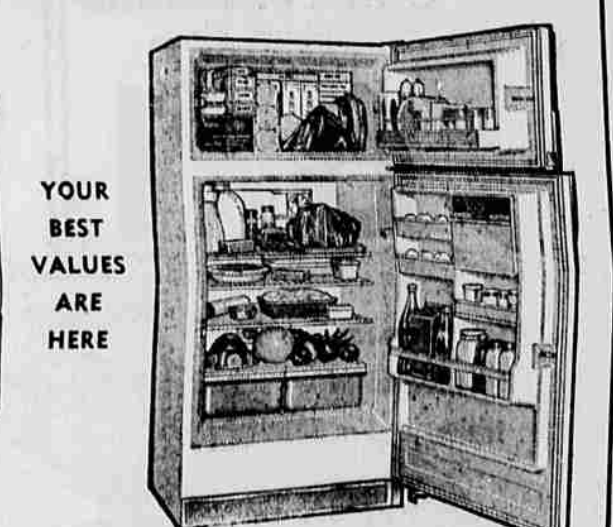
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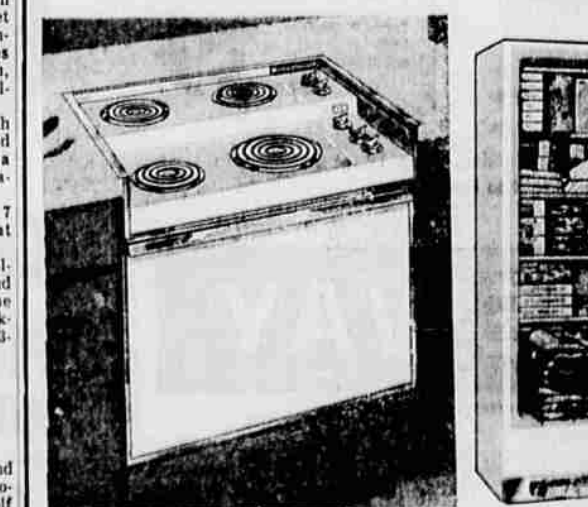

Gene Lipscomb Rites Are Held

DETROIT (UPI)—Relatives, friends, players and fans paid their final respects to Gene (Big Daddy) Lipscomb Wednesday.

An overflow crowd that spilled out onto the lawn of a local funeral home attended the funeral for the 296-pound giant who came off the Detroit sandlots to become one of the National Football League's most feared and yet best liked players.

The honorary pallbearers who attended were Art Rooney, the owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers, the team that Lipscomb played his last game for, Rooney's son Dan, and Don Kellert, the general manager of the Baltimore Colts.

Lipscomb achieved his greatest fame while helping the Colts win two straight NFL titles in 1958 and '59 and earning recognition as the game's top defensive tackle.

Many of the NFL's top standouts who played both with and against Lipscomb also attended. The pallbearers were six football players—John Henry Johnson, John Sample, Lenny Moore, Jim Parker, Dick (Night Train) Lane and Sherman Plunkett.

In Baltimore Wednesday, doctors reported that Lipscomb's death last Friday was due to an overdose of heroin.

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
