

Local Kiwanians Invite Participation In Plan To Promote Pee Wee Baseball

Roseburg Kiwanis Club first vice president Eldon F. Caley today said persons in the outlying areas (outside the Roseburg city limits) who wish to help develop a means of participation in the Pee Wee baseball program for boys in their areas are urged to meet with Kiwanis officials.

Interested parties may contact Caley for an appointment to discuss the program with the Kiwanis.

It was announced Thursday the program would have to be curtailed unless financial support from the outlying areas could be obtained. The program will center around children who live in the city, because the bulk of the funds, about \$2,000, have been donated by the city.

Announcement of the impending

entailment came after the Roseburg School Budget Committee voted against holding a special election to determine if the schools should offer financial support to the program this year. Tentative plans were made by the School Board, however, to put the issue of summer recreation up for election next year.

The Kiwanis Club is left in the position of wanting to include as many boys as possible in the program, but not having enough funds to continue on the scale of last year's program. The 1962 program featured eight fields of play, taking in over 600 boys and costing some \$7,000.

Including the grant of \$900 in salary for an administrator made by the School Board Wednesday night, the Kiwanis have less than \$4,000 for this year's program.

The School Board last year provided \$4,200 for the program, but decided to withdraw its support this year because it was not sure the schools should spend money allocated for school activities on non-school recreation.

The Kiwanis Club is left in the position of wanting to include as many boys as possible in the program, but not having enough funds to continue on the scale of last year's program.

Four more Oregonians have died as the result of traffic accidents.

Two of the victims died in separate Oregon collisions Thursday, raising the state's 1963 toll to 172, which is 30 more than on the same date last year, according to the Traffic Safety Division in Salem.

Mrs. Delores Davis, 35, Dallas, was injured fatally in a collision near Dallas on State Highway 223, and James Brestel, 31, Lake Oswego, was killed in a two-car accident near Portland.

Frederick Brown, 80, Grants Pass, died Wednesday night from injuries suffered in an accident a day earlier five miles south of Grants Pass.

Lester W. Fawber, 54, Lakeview, was killed Thursday night at Alturas, Calif., when his lumber truck struck a freight train.

Pair Of Forest Employees Honored For Ten Years Service With U.S.

Two Umpqua National Forest employees stationed on the Little River ranger district at Glendale were honored this week on the completion of 10 years service as federal employees.

Presentation of the awards signed by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman was made by Ranger Jack Price to Lester Spurgeon and LaRay Armstrong. Spurgeon is fire control officer at the Glendale ranger station and Armstrong is the Little River district's timber sale officer.

Caudill Jury Returns 'Not Guilty' Verdict

John Aaron Caudill, 24, Roseburg, was acquitted by a jury of a charge brought in a grand jury indictment of assault with intent to commit rape.

The verdict of "not guilty" was returned by the jury at the conclusion of a three-day trial Thursday night. The case went to the jury at 3:45 p.m. and the verdict was returned at 11:55 p.m.

The jury had three possible choices: "guilty," "not guilty," and "not guilty by reason of insanity." The vote of the jurors was 10 to 2 for acquittal on a straight "not guilty" verdict.

The offense on which Caudill was tried was alleged to have been committed Aug. 17, 1962. The indictment had accused him of entering the room of a girl, now 20, placing a sharp instrument against her throat and threatening rape.

Caudill had pleaded innocent and innocent by reason of temporary insanity. Two psychiatrists took the stand and testified as to a mental condition of Caudill, in which he is alleged to have suffered from blackouts possibly resulting from an injury when he was kicked by a horse as a child. The alleged blackouts were referred to repeatedly throughout the trial. Caudill denied knowledge of having been in the home of the girl, but his signed confession was admitted into evidence.

Caudill's attorney Harrison Winston contended information in the statement given to police officers had been suggested to him, rather than being his own admission. Caudill claimed he had blacked out and didn't know of circumstances, including a party he attended that night.

The case was prosecuted by Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson before Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

Three other charges still pend against Caudill. One is assault with intent to commit rape involving another girl last Nov. 25, and the others are burglary in connection with his alleged breaking into the homes involved.

Climbers Report Tip-Top Weather

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The American Mt. Everest expedition has reported favorable weather conditions and "increasingly bright" chances for another successful assault on the 29,028-foot summit, the National Geographic Society reported Thursday.

A member of the expedition already has become the first American to scale the world's highest peak. James W. Whittaker, 32, Redmond, Wash., and a Sherpa guide, Nawang Gumpu, reached the top May 1.

Plans now are for two more two-man teams to leave their advance camps today and try to reach the summit at the same time, but by different routes, Tuesday.

Barry C. Bishop, 30, and Luther G. Jerstad, 26, will follow the Whittaker route up the mountain's south col.

James B. Corbet, 26, and William F. Unsoeld, 36, will try a new route up the southeast ridge. Corbet is a ski instructor and mountain guide from Jackson, Wyo.; Unsoeld, formerly a professor at Oregon State University, is a Peace Corps official in Nepal; Bishop, a National Geographic staff member from Bethesda, Md., and Jerstad, an instructor at the University of Oregon and a National Park Service mountain guide.

Two Bridges, Road Improvement Scheduled For Umpqua Forest

Two new bridges and a road improvement are included in a group of projects scheduled for construction this summer on the Umpqua National Forest.

The projects were announced today by Walter Furen, engineer on the Umpqua supervisor's staff.

Bids will be opened May 21 on the Boulder Bend Bridge to be constructed across Boulder Creek at a location in the South Umpqua Ranger District. The project site will be 17 miles northeast of Tiller by the way of the South Umpqua and Boulder roads. Plans call for a single-lane reinforced concrete bridge.

Furen said bids for a bridge structure on Wheeler Road 1.3 miles north of Layne Creek Ranger Station east of Cottage Grove were opened May 7 but the contract winner has not been announced by the Forest Service regional contracting office. This will be a single lane structure of the same type. It will replace a temporary log stringer bridge crossing Junetta Creek on Wheeler Road in the Bohemia Ranger District.

A dust oil application is scheduled for 15.2 miles of Little River Road (that portion of the road designated as Forest Development Road No. 272) in the Little River Ranger District. Bids will be opened next Monday. The project can be reached from Glide by following the Little River Road (County system) for 12.9 miles, the project extending at that point for 15.2 miles on the forest road 272.

Furen said purpose of the application is to reduce dust and make the road safer and easier to maintain.

Water System Due

A new water system is scheduled at the Layne Creek Ranger Station. Bids were opened this week but winner has not been announced. The project involves construction and furnishing materials for a water system to serve the station's office, several residences and warehouse buildings. Installation of a four-inch main and elevated 20,000-gallon storage tank is specified in the plans.

Contract calls for hydrants, valves, installation of submersible pump in an existing well, appurtenances and controls and lateral lines. The project is designed to upgrade the standard of water service facilities so that safe water is provided for drinking and adequate water provided for fire protection and domestic purposes.

Shop Served

An extension of the heating system at the Forest Service warehouse building on NE Diamond Lake Blvd. is also on the list of Umpqua improvements. This will extend the present heating system of the sign department to serve the automotive shop. Project calls for piping, unit heaters along with controls, valves and electrical work. Bids were to be opened Thursday.

The new system will replace a onetime coal heater which in later years was converted to oil. The heater was inefficient, slow to heat and took up valuable space on the shop floor, Furen explained.
