The Communist agency said the prisoners, captured during Sino-Indian border fighting last year, were released "in the Tibet region on the northern side of Bang Pass." New China also said that 498 more Indian prisoners will be released Monday.

Stacked Trumps, Difficult Hand

South's one no-trump opening is preferable to one heart. He has 16 points; 5-3-3-2 distribution and stoppers in all suits.

After North's Stayman two clubs South shows his hearts and game is reached easily.

Although the contract is a good

one it requires fine play to make it due to the bad trump break.

The first winning play is to let West hold the first spade. South

will have to lose a spade eventually and as the slogan goes, "Why not now?"

He wins the second spade and leads a trump toward dummy's king. There is a slight pause while South worries. Then he plays three rounds of diamonds, trumping the third in dummy.

The ten of hearts is played and East covers. South cashes his ace and jack and throws East in with a fourth trump.

East has a good diamond left and leads it but South must not ruff. Instead he discards his remaining spade and leaves East in the lead.

At this point poor East is down to clubs and out of good plays. It doesn't matter which club he leads. South will make the last three tricks with the queen and ace of clubs and his last trump.

Delegates Seek Solution To U. N.'s Financial Woes

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—United Nations delegates have turned to private talks behind the scenes to seek a compromise solution for the organization's multi-million dollar financial troubles.

Secretary General Thant warned the assembly's budgetary committee Wednesday that the financial problem is perhaps the most serious one facing the United Nations.

"Despite the various measures that have been taken, the unhappy fact remains that the organization continues in a state of serious financial difficulty," he said.

The Budgetary Committee, instructed to find a better way to pay for the U.N. peace-keeping missions in the Congo and Middle East, recessed until Monday after its opening session Wednesday. The recess will give delegates time for private consultations.

The deficit now totals nearly \$100 million. It is caused by the failure of the Soviet bloc, France, South Africa, Portugal, and some other countries to pay their share of the peace-keeping costs.

The consultations are aimed at reconciling the positions of the developed countries and the underdeveloped countries. The latter, a majority of the 111 U.N. member nations, wanted the big powers to contribute more, but have run into opposition.

Thant's current authorization to

spend money for the peace operations expires June 30. The assembly must extend this authorization if the operations are to continue.

It also must find means of providing money for continuing the peace missions.

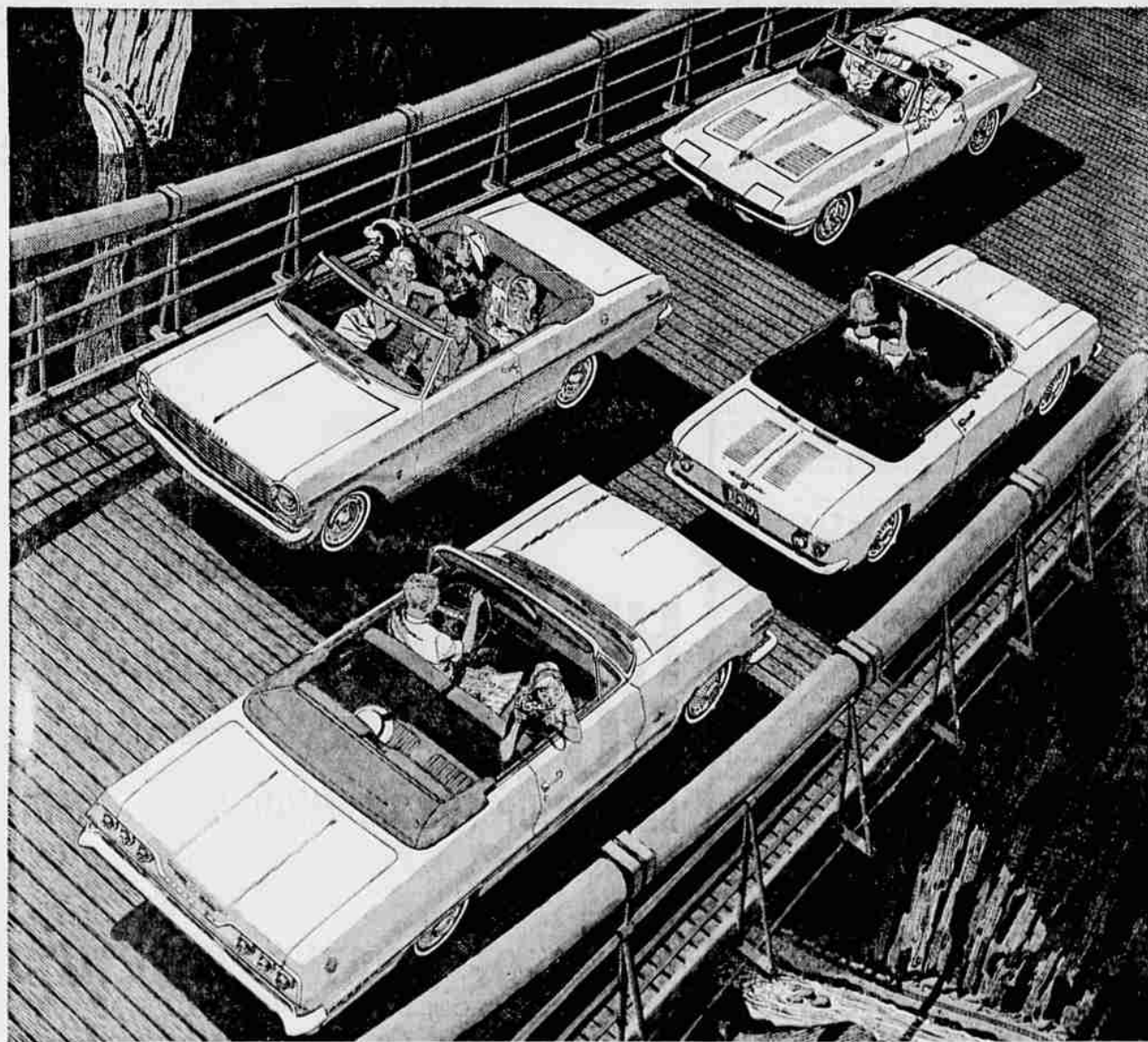
