

Dodgers' Podres Stops Pirates 1-0

What ever happened to all that dissension among the Los Angeles Dodgers?

Manager Walt Alston says everytime he picks up a newspaper he reads about dissension on his ball club.

He probably isn't doing much reading lately or he would have noticed a conspicuous absence of such stories.

Eight victories in 11 games will do it all the time and that's been the Dodgers' pace since May 5 when they began climbing from seventh place. They're second now and have apparent designs of moving even higher.

Southpaw Johnny Podres scored his first victory in more than three weeks Thursday night when he went the distance for the first time since April 24 in beating the Pittsburgh Pirates 1-0.

Podres scattered seven hits, struck out five and walked only one as he took only an hour and 50 minutes to record his second victory of the season.

Loser Don Schwall also gave up seven hits, including two in the ninth inning that did him in.

Gilliam Scores Winner

Jim Gilliam opened the ninth with a single, moved up on a sacrifice and went to third on an infield out. Wally Moon was purposely passed and John Roseboro followed with a single to center that scored the only run of the game.

The league-leading San Francisco Giants kept pace by edging the New York Mets 6-5, the Chicago Cubs clipped the Cincinnati Reds 2-0, the Milwaukee Braves completed a three-game sweep against the St. Louis Cardinals 5-2, and the Philadelphia Phillies continued their mastery over the Houston Colts 5-2.

Only three games were played in the American League, with the Cleveland Indians defeating the Chicago White Sox 5-4, the Baltimore Orioles beating the Washington Senators 9-1, and the Boston Red Sox taking over first place with a 3-0 win over the Los Angeles Angels.

Willie Mays and Willie McCovey each connected for his sixth homer of the season with one on in the Giants' victory over the Mets. Southpaw Billy O'Dell ran his record to 5-0 although Gaylord Perry had to rescue him when the Mets rallied for four runs in the sixth.

Shuts Out Reds

Larry Jackson whitewashed the Reds on six hits to register his fifth victory in nine decisions for the Cubs. Loser Jim O'Toole, now 6-3, allowed only four hits in the seven innings he worked, with Ernie Banks singling home the run that was enough to beat him in the seventh.

Eddie Mathews' three-run homer off Ray Washburn highlighted a four-run first inning rally that assured the Braves their victory over the Cardinals. Lefty Denny Lemaster held the Cards scoreless until the ninth when he was nicked for homers by Stan Musial and Gene Oliver.

The Phillies' victory over the Colts was their 21st in 23 games since Houston entered the circuit. A two-run homer by Don Demeter that helped hand Dick Drott his first defeat. Ray Culp limited Houston to five hits in six innings and gained his fourth victory although Jack Baldschun had to halt a two-run rally in the seventh.

Roseburg's Mike Crunican Is Favored In Mile Running At District Track Meet

Roseburg's Mike Crunican will go into the District 5-A-1 tournament at Springfield Saturday as an odds-on favorite in the mile and a second choice in the 880-yard run.

Crunican, who has posted the fourth best time in the state in the mile, a 4:24.4, will be the only state-ranked miler in the meet. His 1:57.5 in the 880 ranks second in the meet behind North Eugene's Mike Curtis, 1:57.0.

Indian coach Jack Burg will take a 13-man team into the District 5-A-1 running at Springfield, with the top two finishers in each event slated to see action in the state tournament.

Cottage Grove Favored
Cottage Grove ranks as the team favorite in Saturday's meet. Other 5-A-1 trackmen who stand among the top four in the state, and who'll be seeing action at Springfield are:

Shot Put — Alan Richards, Cottage Grove, 59-2; Ed Reed, North Eugene, 55-4 1/2.

Discus — Alan Richards, 165-6 1/2. (Richards is tops in state in both).

He also ranks fifth in the javelin in the state with a toss of 197 feet.

Broad Jump — Pete Robertson, North Eugene, 22-2; Bud Walsh, Marshfield, 21-9 1/2.

Pole Vault — Mark Henningsgaard, Cottage Grove, 14-1/2 (best in state); Roger Steen, Cottage Grove, 13-4; Ryan Dancer, Thurston, 13-3.

High Hurdles — Rich Jorgenson, North Eugene, 14-9; Bud Walsh, Marshfield, 15 flat.

An expected field of 90 golfers will converge on the Roseburg Country Club Memorial Day weekend for the 18th annual Roseburg Amateur Golf Tournament.

The 18-hole qualifying round is scheduled May 30, and match play will follow on May 31. Already about 50 amateurs have indicated their intentions to take part.

Tom Shaw of Portland, who won the tourney last year, won't be back to defend the title, since he has since turned professional. But such golf names as Stu Schroeder and Leon Leonard, ex-Oregon State University players; Tom Morrow, one of the top high school tee artists of the state, and Doug Olson, Medford High star, will be on hand. Leonard will be back to try to repeat his Roseburg Amateur win of two years ago.

Stewart Robertson, Roseburg High School basketball coach, has recently announced that he has accepted a summer coaching position at the Conifer School of Basketball near Seattle, Wash.

Myrtle Creek Hosts District Track Meet

One of the finest all-around track meets ever seen in Douglas County will get underway at 1 p.m. Saturday at Myrtle Creek, as the Vikings play host to 6-A-2 District meet.

In many events, this is figured to be the same as the running of the state meet, because the top times and distances in the state have been turned in by the athletes who'll be competing in the 6-A-2 District.

Rogue River, selected on the basis of performances at last weekend's subdistrict meets, ranks as a favorite in Saturday's competition. The host Vikings and St. Mary's of Medford rank as the darkhorses.

100, 220 Are Keys

The big question marks of the meet, which could ultimately decide the champion, will be the 100 and 220 yard dashes. Myrtle Creek's Ross Barkhurst, running on a wet track in the subdistrict last Saturday, turned in a 10.4, but has done the 100 in 10.2 at other outings. This will pit him in stiff competition with Jim Webb of St. Mary's and Chris Jones of Rogue River, both of whom have turned in times of 10.15.

In the 220, Webb has turned in a 23.2 and Jones a 23.4. Barkhurst, who went 24.5 on the wet track in the subdistrict, has done the 220 in 23 flat. With all indications pointing to a dry track Saturday, these two events could be the tightest ever in a district meet.

The southern teams seem to have the edge in the high hurdles, as Don Salyer of Rogue River turned in a 15.1 last weekend and Sam Charters of Eagle Point flashed in at 15.3. Gary Hall of Sutherlin won the local subdistrict with a 16.3.

Goertzen Top Vault

Sutherlin's Don Goertzen holds the edge in the pole vault, with a past performance of 12 feet, 9 inches to his credit. Salyer has gone 12.2 and the Vikings' Jim Byrd has also topped the 12 foot mark.

High jump competition also sees Douglas County trackmen holding the edge, as Myrtle Creek's Ron Salmon has a 5 foot, 8 inch jump to his credit, Sutherlin's Nultemier has a 5-7 and Darrell Worley of the Glendale Pirates has a 5-6.

In the broad jump, Tom Darlin of St. Mary's had a 20-9 in the southern subdistrict, while Jerry Wade of Douglas won the northern crown with a 19-4 1/2.

Shot put competition will see Jim Granby of Phoenix, with a toss of 52-5 1/2, in the drivers' seat. The javelin is figured as a toss up, with Rickey Richey of Phoenix having a toss of 166-10, Jim Calhoun of St. Mary's with 162-5.

and Fred Williams of Lakeview with 161-8. Howard Graue of Sutherlin won the local district with a toss of 159-9 1/2.

Barkhurst Favored

The Vikings' Ross Barkhurst, with a toss of 141 feet, will be the pick in the discus, with Douglas' Jim Heard, 132 feet, ranked second.

In the low hurdles, Salyer has turned in a 20.1, while Gary Hall of Sutherlin won the local with 22.2. Sam Charters has a 20.3 and

Ken Hawkins of Eagle Point has a 20.5.

St. Mary's Tom Darlin will be favored in the 440, with a time of 51.7 to his credit. Allen Yates of Rogue River has a 52.8, while Worley won the local meet with a 53.2.

The mile and the 880 appear to be a match between Myrtle Creek's Ed Cadman and Rogue River's Jack Salter, with Sutherlin's Goin also in the running. Cadman had a 4:35.8 mile, while Salter turned in 4:38.6. In the 880, Cadman posted a 2:04.4, while Salter racked up a 2:06.6.

St. Mary's, with a time of 1:36.4, will be favored in the 880-yard relay. Myrtle Creek won the subdistrict in this area with a 1:39.3.

Represented at the meet will be the host Vikings, the Sutherlin Bulldogs, the Glendale Pirates, Glendale Wildcats, Douglas Trojans and Riddle Irish from this district, with Rogue River, Sacred Heart of Klamath Falls, St. Mary's, Henley, Lakeview, Eagle Point, Phoenix and Illinois Valley from the south.

The top three from each subdistrict meet will compete at Myrtle Creek Saturday.

Burnham Slated For Second Game

Dick Williams will be on the mound for the Roseburg Indians today and Jon Burnham is scheduled to start Saturday, as the Tribe takes on the South Eugene Axemen for a District 3-A-1 championship.

Roseburg went into today's game at Legion field with an 8-0 league record, while South Eugene was 7-1.

The second game in the best two-out-of-three series will get underway at 12:30 p.m. Saturday in Eugene. The third contest, if needed, will follow on the South Eugene diamond.

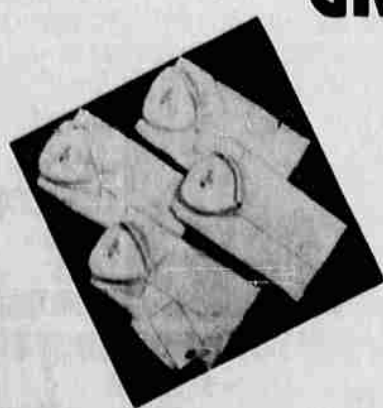
