

Nottebart No-Hits Phillies To Gain 4-1 Win For Colts

The guy with the big win was Don (No-Hit) Nottebart, but the man with the big grin was Houston teammate Don McMahon.

McMahon was the fellow who first recommended Nottebart to the Colts so you can imagine how he felt sitting in the bullpen last night and watching the right-hander from Lexington, Mass., pitch the National League's second no-hitter within a week.

Nottebart's masterpiece over the Philadelphia Phillies was slightly tainted in that they scored an unearned run off him in his 4-1 victory.

But Nottebart wasn't the least bit unhappy, particularly since it was the first time he pitched nine innings since 1961 and the victory brought his season record to 5-1.

The only run the Phils scored off Nottebart came in the fifth inning as a result of a two-base error by shortstop J.C. Hartman. Don Demeter reached second on the misplay, took third on Clay Dalrymple's sacrifice and scored on Don Hoak's sacrifice fly.

That run matched a first-inning homer by Carl Warwick and tied the score at 1-1 but Howie Goss untied it with a three-run homer in the sixth off Jack Hamilton, who had beaten the Colts three times last year and twice this season without ever losing to them before.

Nottebart's no-hitter came only six days after the first one of the season turned in by Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers against the Giants.

En route to his no-hitter, Nottebart walked three batters and struck out eight.

Strictly a reliever with the Braves last season, Nottebart told McMahon he would like to be with the Colts while they were chatting one night last summer.

The two were good friends, having pitched for the Braves together, and as soon as McMahon returned to Houston, he passed the word along to General Manager Paul Richards. The Colts added Nottebart last Nov. 20.

In other NL action Friday night, the Los Angeles Dodgers pounded the Pittsburgh Pirates 9-3, the St. Louis Cardinals ended a four-game losing streak with an 11-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds and the San Francisco Giants beat the New York Mets 4-3 in 11 innings. The scheduled game between the Braves and Cubs was rained out.

Minnesota trampled Cleveland 11-4 in the American League, Kansas City blanked Boston, 2-0, and the New York Yankees edged the Los Angeles Angels 4-3. A Detroit-Washington doubleheader was rained out along with the Baltimore-Chicago game.

Frank Howard drove in three runs for the Dodgers with a double and a two-run homer against the Pirates. Bob Miller gained his third victory and Joe Gibbon was charged with his first defeat.

A barrage of four home runs by George Altman, Julian Javier, Dick Groat and Stan Musial carried the Cardinals to their fourth victory at the expense of the Reds. Joey Jay, a 20-game winner last year, was routed after two innings and suffered his seventh loss against one on a sacrifice.

The Elmira squad got back into the game in the fifth inning after Cool had given up one of his two walks. A wild pitch and passed ball took him to third, then Don Marquardt brought him home with a single.

This proved enough to incense the Warriors, and they came back to tie the game in the sixth with a big four-run uprising. The rally was started when the Elmira fans fell apart momentarily in the early part of that frame. Tom White singled, and Bob Anderson sacrificed. He reached first on an error which stirred Elmira mightily. While they argued the point, White raced around to the home plate. Anderson reached second in the same series of events. He stole third and then romped home on a sacrifice fly. Rod Painter followed with a walk, stole second and was driven home by Mike Blomberg's double. He stole third and came home on a wild pitch to end the scoring.

With this Emerald League game, the season ended with Drain in second place. Its league record was 5-1, topped only by McKenzie's 7-0. This was one of the two teams to beat the Warriors all season. The other was Coburg in the season's opener. For the season, the Warriors boasted a 10-2 record both in and out of the league.

Allison, who stands 6-foot-4 and weighs 218 pounds, is generally recognized as the strongest man in the AL—perhaps in big league baseball.

And he sure looked 10 feet tall with shoulders as wide as Friday night when he hit three homers and drove in six runs to lead the Twins to an 11-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians. The win snapped a four-game losing streak and lifted the Twins out of last place.

The Twins have been one of the most disappointing teams in either league this year but it's no fault of Allison, who leads the AL with 29 runs batted in, has hit nine homers and is batting .330. Allison's three homers Friday night came off Jim Grant, Jerry Walker and Ron Wachwitz.

Tacoma Gets 'North' Lead In PCL Play

Seattle is seeing goose-eggs and Tacoma is having goose-pimples in their see-saw battle for the lead in the Northern Division of the Pacific Coast League.

It seems the Tacoma Giants are getting the better of the deal. They slipped one-half game into first place ahead of Seattle Friday by scoring four runs in the 13th inning to down Portland 8-4.

Meanwhile, Seattle, which has the third best hitting team in the league, fell shutout victim for the second day in a row to San Diego. Dave Sisler (2-1) and reliever Ray Ruppelmeier combined to blank the Rainiers 2-0 on a three-hitter.

San Diego scored both its runs in the ninth on singles by Chico Ruiz and Tommy Helms. A single, double and walk had loaded the bases previously in that inning against Seattle pitcher Pete Smith (3-3) who was the loser.

Also in 13 innings, Oklahoma City nipped Denver 10-9, Hawaii slipped past Spokane 9-8, and Salt Lake City defeated Dallas-Fort Worth 8-1.

Seattle has not scored a run off San Diego pitching over the last 32 innings. The Padres' Scott Breeden blanked the Rainiers 1-0 Thursday.

A three-run homer by Ricardo Joseph in the 13th gave Tacoma its win over Portland. The Giants had taken a 4-2 lead in the top of the 11th only to have the Beavers tie it again in their half of the inning. Jim Hughes slammed a two-run homer for Portland in the first inning.

Oklahoma City scored twice in the bottom of the 13th to squeak past Denver. The teams were tied 7-7 at the end of the regulation nine innings and both clubs tallied single runs in the 10th. Then Denver went ahead 9-8 in the top of the 13th and the 89ers won it with two hits.

Denver exploded for six runs in the seventh inning on home runs by Ray Withrow and Jim Aaron. Surprising Hawaii ran its longest winning streak of the season to three games by edging Spokane 9-8 on a three-run outburst in the eighth. The victory tasted twice as sweet because it came at the expense of the Indians ace reliever Ken Rowe (2-1) who was sent down recently by the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Two doubles, two singles and a ground out produced Hawaii's winning runs. Chuck Dees laced three doubles for the islanders and outfielder Carlos Bernier drove in three runs for Hawaii with two hits.

Salt Lake City hurler Gordon Seyfried (2-5) pitched a five-hitter and his mates collected 17 hits in the win over Dallas-Fort Worth.

UVL All-Star Team Dominated By Juniors As Glendale, Riddle Place Five On Team

The Umpqua Valley League should produce some of the finest baseball action in its history next year if the indications given by the selection of the 1963 UVL All-Star team turn out correct.

The UVL All-Star squad is comprised of eight juniors, three sophomores, one freshman and only two seniors. The 14-man squad includes two catchers, three pitchers, plus a utility infielder and utility outfielder.

It's a hard-hitting squad, with an average batting mark of .347. Five of the all-stars ended 1963 conference play with marks of over .400. Glendale pitcher Arojaio Gutierrez led the pack with a .463 average, followed by teammate Bill Waterman with .454. Only three of the 14 hit below .300 this season.

Team-wise, Glendale's Pirates shared honors with the Riddle Irish, as both placed five men on the all-star squad.

The UVL 1963 All-Star team: Pitchers: Arojaio Gutierrez, junior from Glendale, won 4, lost 1. Gutierrez, a freshman, pitched 28 innings, giving up six runs, two of which were earned while striking out 42 and walking 15.

Ron Westbrook, Myrtle Creek's champion Vikings, won 3 and lost none. The Viking's junior lefty also led his team in the hitting department with an average of .400-plus.

Bill Loper, Riddle senior, won 3, lost 1, striking out 26, walking 19 and giving up 15 hits in league play.

Catchers: Mike Markham, Riddle sophomore, bats and throws right. The six-foot, 160-pound Irish star wound up the season with a .420 batting average.

Hubert Stewart, junior from Glendale, hit .431 for the season. A 5-7, 140-pounder, Stewart bats and throws right handed.

First Base: Bill Markham, Riddle senior, throws and bats left handed. Markham hit an even .300 for the season.

Second Base: John DeGroot, Glide junior, who ended the season with a .429 batting average. DeGroot, only Wildcat on the front nine, stands six foot and weighs 160 pounds.

Shortstop: Gary Paetz, Riddle junior, who batted .329 for the season. Paetz stands 5-10, weighs 140 pounds and bats and throws right handed.

Third Base: Jim Radfield, Glendale junior, batted .250 this season. Radfield stands 5-8, weighs
