Court Ruling Frees Sit-In Demonstrators

City's Racial Segregation Laws Illegal

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court today overruled the convictions of Negro sit-in demonstrators in several southern states on grounds they were arrested under unconstitutional local segregation laws.

Nullified were the jail sentences and fines imposed on demonstrators in Greenville, S.C.; Birmingham, Ala.; Durham, N.C., and New Orleans.

It was the first time the court had ruled in a series of sit-in appeals which stemmed from arrests made throughout the South during the demonstrations there in 1960 and 1961.

The court used the Greenville case to hand down its landmark decision.

Forced to Segregate

Chief Justice Earl Warren declared in his majority opinion that 10 demonstrators there were wrongly convicted because the store manager had been forced to segregate his lunch counter because of a city ordinance.

Warren held that even if the manager had acted as an individual, the convictions were invalid because the local ordinance was on the books.

In quick succession, then, the court overturned the following other sit-in convictions:

—Trespass convictions of 10 Negroes in Birmingham.

—The conviction of two ministers—the Revs. F. L. Shuttlesworth and Charles Billups—who were found guilty of having incited the demonstrators in Birmingham.

—The trespass convictions of five Negro students and two white students for sit-ins at Durham, N.C.

—Criminal mischief convictions at New Orleans.

In the Greenville case, the court did not touch on the argument that store owners could maintain segregated facilities on private property.

Warren's opinion indicated that as long as the local statutes required segregation, the owner was left no choice but to maintain separate facilities for whites and Negroes.

Warren declared that state segregation statutes violate the 14th Amendment and that in the Greenville case, the city statute eliminated any private choice on the part of the store owner.

He said that the statute meant "that a person owning, managing or controlling an eating place is left with no choice of his own but must segregate his white and Negro patrons. The Kress management, in deciding to exclude Negroes, did precisely what the city law required."

RECORD TREMORS

NEW YORK (UPI)—Two relatively severe earth tremors were recorded Saturday night by the Fordham University seismograph. The Rev. Joseph Lynch, S.J., said Sunday.

Father Lynch said the shocks were recorded at 9:15.45 p.m. EDT and at 9:25.33 p.m. EDT. He estimated the tremors occurred about 5.6 miles south of New York in the vicinity of Chile and registered about 6.5 on the Richter scale.

U.N. Will Demand Release Of Pilots

SEOUL, Korea (UPI)—Communist North Korea today agreed to attend a military armistice commission meeting Wednesday at which the United Nations Command will seek return of two American pilots forced down in North Korea.

The North Korean radio said Sunday that pilots Captains Ben W. Stutz, 32, Florence, Ala., and Charles W. Voltz, 26, Frankfurt, Mich., were "captured" Thursday but said nothing of their condition.

A UNC spokesman said Marine Maj. Gen. George H. Cloud will make a strong demand for the return of the men at Wednesday's meeting in Panmunjom. Previous demands have gone unheeded by the Communists.

The UNC helicopter piloted by Stutz and Voltz was flying a boundary checking mission along the demilitarized zone between North and South Korea when forced down in Communist territory.

It was fired on by the North Koreans but it was not known whether the shots hit the plane before or after it landed.

Two More Bomb Explosions Hit Canadian City

MONTREAL (UPI)—Two bombs exploded today at the headquarters of the Royal Canadian Army Corps of Electrical and Mechanical Engineers.

The blasts were the latest in a series of bombings which have terrorized Montreal residents this month. Authorities blame the explosions on the FLQ, a fanatical political group.

No one was injured, but one of the explosions blew out at least 30 windows and damaged four cars parked near the headquarters.

First reports indicated that one of the bombs was planted in a parked car while the second was buried a few feet under the building's west wall.

The bombings came as no surprise. Police earlier expressed fear that the FLQ—the separatist Quebec Liberation Front—might use the queen's birthday holiday today to leave more of their political calls.

They called on residents to celebrate the official birthdays of Queen Elizabeth and Queen Victoria in any way but with fireworks. Police expressed concern that exploding firecrackers might touch off false bomb reports and keep the bomb squad hopping.

Montrealers still were jumpy because of the dozen bombs that exploded last Friday in suburban Westmount. One of the terrorist bombs injured explosives expert Sgt. Maj. Walter (Rocky) Leja, 42, when it blew up while he was trying to deactivate it.

Navy Intensifies Thresher Search

PORTSMOUTH, N. H. (UPI)—The Navy today intensified the search for the submarine Thresher, spurred on by the possibility that the shattered hull of the sub may have been located.

A Navy court of inquiry met behind closed doors again to gather evidence it hoped would determine what happened to the \$45 million nuclear vessel April 10.

A flotilla of Navy and oceanographic ships used super-sensitive sonar equipment and underwater cameras to conduct a yard-by-yard search of a 300-yard area near where Thresher made her fatal plunge with 128 men aboard, 220 miles off Cape Cod.

Navy officials disclosed last week that photographs of the 8,400-foot deep ocean floor showed debris which could have come from a sub torn apart by extreme pressure.

Marine scientists and Navy authorities were cautious about identifying positively the objects photographed by cameras lowered from the research vessel Atlantis II.

"The pictures by Atlantis II showed debris dense enough to be the missing submarine, but the pictures in themselves are not conclusive," a Navy spokesman said.

However, "side looking" sonar and other electronic probes of the area bear out the possibility that the debris in the area could be the Thresher," he said.

Authorities Seek Hospital Escapee

SPOKANE (UPI)—Law enforcement officers in Washington and Oregon searched today for Bruce Little, 35, who escaped from Eastern State hospital at Medical Lake Sunday.

Little was found innocent by reason of insanity when he was tried at Olympia in June of 1961 for the fatal shooting of his brother, Lee. The jury said Little was not insane at the time of his trial but that the insanity could recur and he was not safe to be at large.

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Stormy Weather Halts Climbers

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI)—Storms have delayed an American mountain-climbing team working its way up the unexplored west ridge of Mt. Everest, scattered its equipment and caused a depletion of precious oxygen supplies.

This may cause the cancellation of a planned two-team rendezvous Wednesday on top of the 29,028-foot peak, an expedition spokesman said here Sunday.

"The west ridge team is severely delayed," the spokesman said. "The summit meeting may be dropped."

He said a second team attempting to scale Mt. Everest by the better known south col (pass) route was "on schedule."

Its American members, Barry C. Bishop, 39, Washington, and Luther C. Jerstad, 26, Eugene, Ore., moved up Sunday from Advance Camp 3 at 23,000 feet to Camp 4 at 24,900 feet. They expect to make a final assault Wednesday from Camp 6 at 27,400 feet.

A support team of Dr. David L. Dingman, 26, Baltimore, Md., and British Lt. Col. James Roberts, 46, moved up to Camp 3 behind the assault team.

The west ridge team was reported attempting to proceed today from Camp 3W, where its members rested Sunday following storms Thursday and Friday.

Nepalese Sherpa guides were working to gather up equipment strewn around by high winds, while others brought up sleeping bags and food from the advance base camp.

The expedition spokesman said seven lons had been lost in all—a big loss even for such a well-supplied expedition.

"But the time and oxygen supply lost are just irreplaceable," he said.

Depletion of the oxygen supply was caused by too many men having to stay too long at altitudes where they must depend on oxygen, he said.

President Will Accept San Diego State Degree

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (UPI)—President Kennedy will attend a \$1,000-a-couple dinner here with producers, executives and other top entertainment figures during his June visit to Southern California.

Kennedy is not expected to make a speech at the Hilton 7 banquet at the Beverly Hilton Hotel. The President is scheduled to arrive in San Diego June 6 where he will accept the first honorary doctor's degree ever given by San Diego State College.

U. S. Seeks To Break Deadlock With Common Market Nations

GENEVA (UPI)—The United States today sought to break a four-day deadlock with the European Common Market nations that has brought their tariff-cutting talks to the brink of failure.

A three-hour meeting between the United States and Britain on the one hand and market members on the other broke up early today and a U.S. delegate said "nothing is settled."

Former Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, chief U.S. delegate, plans to leave the conference of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) on Wednesday, and informed sources said that if no agreement is reached by then the consequences could be as serious as Britain's failure to join the market last winter.

Tariff Cut Issue

Herter led the Anglo-American negotiators in the talks that ended shortly after midnight. He was to confer again today or Tuesday with the Common Market team, headed by Jean Rey, the market executive commissioner for external affairs.

The issue is the amount of tariff reductions acceptable to the two sides.

The United States is authorized to negotiate across the board tariff cuts of up to 50 per cent. Herter's team can settle for less than 50 per cent, but the cuts must be the same for all products.

The Common Market rejects this, charging that it favors U.S. business over European interests. The alternative is a sliding scale of tariff rates.

Both sides agree that tariffs should be cut to increase trade. The Europeans contend that the American plan would continue to protect certain U.S. products—chemicals, for example—from European competition.

The United States says the European plan would reduce tariffs only by a total of 12 per cent. It does not consider this enough of a stimulus to trade.

Thus far, no compromise has been found for the two views. The deadlock could have repercussions extending far beyond matters of trade. It could pit the United States and the British-led European free trade area against the Common Market in a bloc that might force the Common Market nations to line up behind France's "third force" ideas of its future.

Personal Income Surges Upward

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Commerce Department reported today that personal income continued surging upward in April to reach a record \$455.8 billion annual rate.

This is up about \$2.5 billion from the previous high in March. Personal income includes wages and salaries, dividends, interest, rents and other types of earnings.

The economy's strong showing in this sector is one of the reasons why many feel business is going to have a good year in 1963.

The annual rate of personal income this year is running about 4 per cent higher than this time in 1962.

The April showing received much of its impetus from manufacturing, where wages and salaries rose by more than \$1 billion to a record annual rate of \$96.5 billion.

The increase last month in this department was the largest of the past 12 months. The Commerce Department said the gains resulted primarily from higher employment, since hours worked per week and average hourly earnings showed little change on a seasonally adjusted basis.

The department said gains generally were widespread among individual manufacturing industries with the largest rise recorded in durable goods.

Man Held In Shooting Of Car At Mark's Home

SALEM (UPI)—A man who said he was disgruntled because he was refused welfare assistance has been accused of firing a bullet into the trunk of a car at Gov. Mark Hatfield's home.

Floyd Leroy Thomas, 27, Salem, was arrested Saturday afternoon after police received reports of a gun being fired in Bush Park, across the street from the governor's home. Thomas was charged with vagrancy and carrying a concealed weapon.

Cocoa Beach Goes All-Out For Cooper

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—The high school band lined up two hours early under the hot Florida sun.

Soon the musicians began perspiring. Miss Kay Sprull shepherded the 200 students in the Cocoa Beach Elementary School Glee Club onto the grandstand and ran through "Oklahoma" for the last time.

Children, tanned and waving American flags, got on the curb while their parents stood watching.

"Gordo, welcome back to terra firma," said a hand-lettered sign. "While this is not his home town, he is going to get a hometown welcome," said Mayor Robert Murkshe.

It was this spaceport's welcome home Sunday for Maj. L. Gordon Cooper.

Arrives By Plane

Cooper began his day high over the United States in a C135 jet transport. With him were his wife, Trudy, and their two teenage daughters.

At 11:04 a.m. EDT the plane touched down at Patrick Air Force Base. Ten minutes later the main hatch opened and Cooper, flowers around his neck, ran and fit in a business suit, strode down the ramp.

Mrs. Cooper was at his side. The Air Force honor guard stood at attention.

"You rascal," said astronaut Alan B. Shepard Jr., Cooper's backup pilot, as they shook hands. "You won a race," said astronaut Walter M. Schirra Jr.

"Attaboy, Gordo," shouted someone in the crowd lining the runway.

Thanks Crowd

Cooper strode to the microphone. "Thank you all for coming out," he said. "I finally got back home just as I said I would."

The astronaut underwent a medical briefing, ate lunch at the Officers Club with his family and at 3:30 p.m., EDT climbed atop the rear seat of a cream-colored convertible.

Dr. Robert Seamans, assistant director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) and Mrs. Cooper rode in the car.

The astronaut, who flew 573,000 miles around the world 22.9 times in his "Faith 7" spacecraft, rode at 10 miles an hour along the 5.3-mile parade route.

About 15,000 persons lined both sides of the four-lane highway this town calls Main Street.

Riddle Man Held On Morals Count

Diligent search by sheriff's deputies paid off with the apprehension Saturday of a young man wanted on a charge, brought in a Grand Jury indictment, of procuring a female under 18 for immoral purposes.

He is Jerry Lee Poole, 23, Rt. 1, Box 17, Riddle. He was taken into custody by Resident Deputy Don Soper of Canyonville and Under-sheriff Lyle Dickenson. Poole was found hiding on the floor board of a car owned and operated by his father, deputies said.

The car was stopped en route from Riddle to Canyonville, after officers had a tip he was in the area. He was believed to have been out of state recently. Normally blond haired, he had dyed his hair black, the deputies reported.

Poole allegedly is involved in a procuring transaction with Todd Pruitt, who is in the county jail awaiting disposition of a similar charge, concerning a 16-year-old girl.

Poole's bail was set at \$7,500.
