Joshua O. vs. Nina F. Wright. Married in Yakima, Wash., in 1961. Desertion charged. Plaintiff asks that defendant's former name of Lambert be restored.

Divorce Decrees

Esther J. from Clay J. Roberson. Ordered that neither party shall marry for six months.

Minnie Jean from Theodore Jack Long. Plaintiff granted custody of minor child and \$50 monthly support. Defendant ordered to convey unto plaintiff 1961 car, household goods and furniture. Plaintiff ordered to pay remaining of obligations against automobile and defendant to pay other obligations. Neither party to marry for six months.

Irene Francis from Ivan Ray McGinty. Plaintiff awarded custody of two minor children; real property described as Lot 11 of the East Block 1, Plat A, Sutherland Land and Water Co., Douglas County; also award of 1953 motor vehicle, household furniture and appliances. Defendant awarded 1961 motor vehicle, trailer and miscellaneous mechanical and shop tools.

Shirley from Glenn Engel. Custody of two minor children awarded to plaintiff with \$40 monthly support for each child. Plaintiff awarded furniture and fixtures and 1960 car. Defendant to pay attorney fees and suit costs.

Julianne Lucie from Kenneth LeRoy Hong. Plaintiff's former name of Julianne Lucie Smith restored.

Adah LaVerne from Frank William Wetzel.

Alfred R. vs. Marjory J. Tuckey. Divorce decree and custody of two minor children awarded to defendant; plaintiff to pay defendant \$80 monthly support for each child. Property settlement ratified, plaintiff to get camper trailer, 1962 pickup, engineering and survey equipment now in his possession. Defendant awarded interest of the parties in residence, and household furnishings. Property located at Lot 3, Block 4, and west 10 feet of Lot 3, Block 4, in the Thomas Kerr Tracts, and adjoining Lots 1 and 4, Block 4, less the west 10 feet in the same tracts, subject to mortgage, which defendant agrees to pay. Defendant also awarded 2-door sedan, savings account in trust for children. Plaintiff to pay off listed debts, continue insurance policy in effect for the children and pay attorney fees.

Phyllis H. from William C. Warden. Plaintiff awarded custody of minor child and \$50 monthly support.

Divorce Suits Filed

Virginia A. vs. Jack R. Barnett. Married in April 19, 1953. Cruelty charged. Plaintiff asks divorce, award of 1949 automobile, and restoration of her former name of Virginia Ann Decker. On motion and affidavit of plaintiff, defendant enjoined from molesting or interfering or threatening plaintiff, or coming on the premises she now occupies. Show cause order issued as to attorney fees and suit costs.

Kai-son Jeung vs. Po Ling Jeung. Married in Canton Province, China. Plaintiff charges desertion, and cruelty. He alleges that at the time of their marriage he was a citizen of the United States and made his home in this country; that it was contemplated between them at the time of marriage that the plaintiff would retain his home here and that defendant would come to this country to make her home; that before arrangements could be completed defendant advised plaintiff she no longer loved nor cared for him and desired to be free. Plaintiff contends defendant's address is Hong Kong, China.

Dismissal

Thelma L. vs. Ronald E. Merrill.

On motion of plaintiff, voluntary non suit ordered and case dismissed without prejudice.

CIRCUIT COURT

Complaints

Herman Griffin vs. Douglas County Lumber Co. Plaintiff demands judgment for \$8,650 general damages and \$2,577.05 special damages for injuries allegedly suffered Oct. 8, 1962, while in the employ of the defendant, in a fall beneath a table onto a waste conveyor belt at defendant's plywood plant.

Lynn Bayless, by and through Nina Robison, guardian ad litem, vs. Seaboard Life Insurance Co. of America. Plaintiff demands judgment against the defendant for \$388.60, plus interest and attorney fees, for injuries allegedly suffered in an accident Dec. 7, 1961, in a fall from monkey bars on the Wilbur School playground of School District 4. Damages asked from insurance company of the school district.

Carl Johnson vs. Albert Strain. Plaintiff demands judgment against defendant for \$3,342.83 for damages and loss of use of his log truck, which allegedly was damaged in an accident involving a truck of the defendant. The accident occurred Sept. 25, 1962, on the Coos Bay Wagon Road 30 miles west of Roseburg.

Albert Potter vs. Edgar G. and Francis D. Engle, dba Engle Logging Co. Plaintiff demands judgment against defendant for \$38,000, and special damages of \$3,507.55 for injuries allegedly suffered Dec. 26, 1962, while he was engaged as a whistle punk for the defendant, and was struck by a haul-back line. He claims injuries were of a permanent and progressive nature, that he was 53 at the time of the accident.

Joe McLemore vs. C & D Lumber Co. and Glen Widling, dba Sawdust Service. Plaintiff demands judgment against defendant for \$32,000 general damages and \$9,221.25 special damages for injuries allegedly suffered Nov. 30, 1961, while he was an employee of C & D Lumber and loading sawdust chips onto a truck of Widling near Riddle. He claims he was struck by a 4-by-4 when it was hit by the truck, hurling him through the air against a concrete platform. He claims injuries were of a progressive and permanent nature and that he was 48 years of age at the time of the accident earning \$500 monthly.

Judgment
Russell R. Biehl vs. Alras Development Co. Plaintiff granted judgment, on default of defendant, for \$700.60 plus interest and attorney fees and costs.

David H. Cameron, Department of Employment Commissioner, vs. Harland E. Barron. Plaintiff granted judgment for \$180, plus costs, on default of defendant.

Judgment and Decree
Lodovico and Lena Calenzani, aka Lodovico and Lena Calenzani, vs. Maxine D. Martos, formerly Maxine D. Thompson, Jerry Martos, aka LaFayette Martos, and Darvyn D. Thompson. Plaintiff awarded judgment against defendants for \$1,058.67 plus interest, attorney fees and costs, and decree of foreclosure on property located in East Glide Subdivision No. 2.

SURPRISE

ROSEMEAD, Calif. (UPI)—Mrs. Alice Perez was pulling out weeds in her yard Sunday when a passer-by asked if she were aware she was growing marijuana plants. The surprised 36-year-old housewife, who had moved into the home last month, immediately called sheriff's deputies. They found and destroyed more than 30 marijuana plants, some as high as three feet. Mrs. Perez was not held.

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
