Gooney Birds Delay Photos

HONOLULU (UPI)—One of the best laid plans for speedy picture coverage of astronaut L. Gordon Cooper's return to earth went awry because of thousands of love-happy gooney birds on Midway Island.

Press officers at Hickam Air Force Base here had planned an efficient courier service—sending a jet to the tiny island to collect pictures from a helicopter off the aircraft carrier USS Kearsarge. The jet was to have returned immediately to Honolulu.

But the Navy, which controls Midway, nixed the plans. A spokesman said this was a "pe-

trous" activity and the likelihood of ingesting one or more gooney birds into a jet aircraft is particularly great.

The military substituted a propeller-driven Constellation that needed several hours longer to make the round trip to Midway. Thus, the first photos did not arrive in Honolulu until some 10 hours after Cooper's landing.

The gooney birds cause trouble every year about this time. Great flocks suddenly show up at the island airstrip to court, build nests and start families. They frequently stroll or fly into rapidly moving aircraft.

Stock Market Shows Signs Of Divergence

NEW YORK (UPI)—Bradbury April 5th.

K. Thurlow of Winslow, Co. & Stetson notes that after several sessions of churning, the stock market has begun to show signs of a divergent behavior which may be the forerunner of important things to come.

Thurlow observes that many of the better quality blue chip stocks that led the advance from last October have begun to look tired, and this is reflected in the notably slow progress of the Dow-Jones industrial average.

"More recently many of the bellwether stocks have broken their six months' uptrends. This behavior has occurred in the face of obviously mounting bullishness and could be taken as an early warning signal that a change in trend may be in the making."

Thurlow is struck by the fact that while over 90 per cent of the stock market forecasts have been bullish, the Dow-Jones industrial average has not been much higher than it was on

an important factor in the profit picture for the chemical industry, the Value Line Investment Survey believes that earnings prospects for the year are still good.

"Over-capacity is the root cause of price weakness," the survey notes, "but there is a solution to the problem. It is product development—the discovery of new products out of research where competition cannot easily follow."
