County's Top Scholars Honored At Rotary Club Dinner Tuesday

Approximately 40 top high school scholars from Douglas County schools turned out Tuesday night at the Umpqua Hotel to be honored by the Roseburg Rotary Club.

They heard some words of wisdom about their futures from the president of Oregon Technical Institute and applauded one of their number who was named recipient of the Rotary Club annual scholarship.

This was the second annual banquet staged by the club to honor the top 10 per cent of the graduating classes of all county high schools but Reedport. They are guests of the club.

Taking the spotlight for the night was Larry Kingry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry William Kingry of Roseburg. He was named winner of the Rotary scholarship which will pay full tuition for one year to a state school. Young Kingry, a senior at Roseburg High, will attend Oregon State University to study industrial arts education.

Featured speaker of the evening was Dr. Walter Purvine, president of OTI in Klamath Falls. The crux of his message was that the youths present should continue their education because of the increasing demands of the world today.

One of the reasons, he said, was the rapid change taking place in

the world. He noted that half the working population in the United States today is employed by industry which didn't exist 10 years ago. He said a third of the present jobs will be outmoded by science in 1970.

Another reason, he said, was the increasing demand for specialization.

Talent Needed
With the native talent and post-high school training go a responsibility, he continued. That responsibility is to both lead and assist others.

He concluded by insisting this cream of the Douglas County scholastic crop "do something beyond the high school level." The boys, he said, should decide on the job or profession they want and tailor their training to it. For girls, he said, the demand for higher education is becoming increasingly great because half the adult women of the nation are now working.

"We in the nation need you and need you with your intellect at its highest possible level. But you need you and your intellect more," he said.

'Illustrated Songs' Heard By Kiwanis

An unusual program of visual beauty and musical inspiration was presented to Roseburg Kiwanis Club members Tuesday noon.

Rev. Orris L. Doty, pastor of the First Christian Church of Coquille, and Rev. Don Smith, pastor of the West Side Christian Church of Roseburg combined in the unusual presentation.

Called by its originator, the Rev. Mr. Doty, simply, "Illustrated Songs," the presentation might better be described as "Inspiration in Song and Scene."

It consisted of the showing of more than 100 colored slides on two coordinated and rheostat-controlled projectors with organ and vocal or recorded orchestral accompaniment.

Nearly all of the slides — most of them strikingly beautiful outdoor and ocean and beach scenes of Oregon — were taken by the Rev. Mr. Doty. They had been arranged so one faded out and another took its place in synchronization with the words or music of the different songs.

Numbers which the Rev. Mr. Doty sang, accompanied by the Rev. Mr. Smith at the organ, were "America the Beautiful," "God Bless America," "Jesus Savior Pilot Me," "How Great Thou Art" and "Beyond the Sunset." Recorded orchestra numbers were "Ebb Tide," featuring Oregon coastal scenes almost exclusively and "Claire de Lune."

In addition to taking the pictures, singing the vocals and arranging the presentation, the Rev. Mr. Doty built the synchronizing equipment.

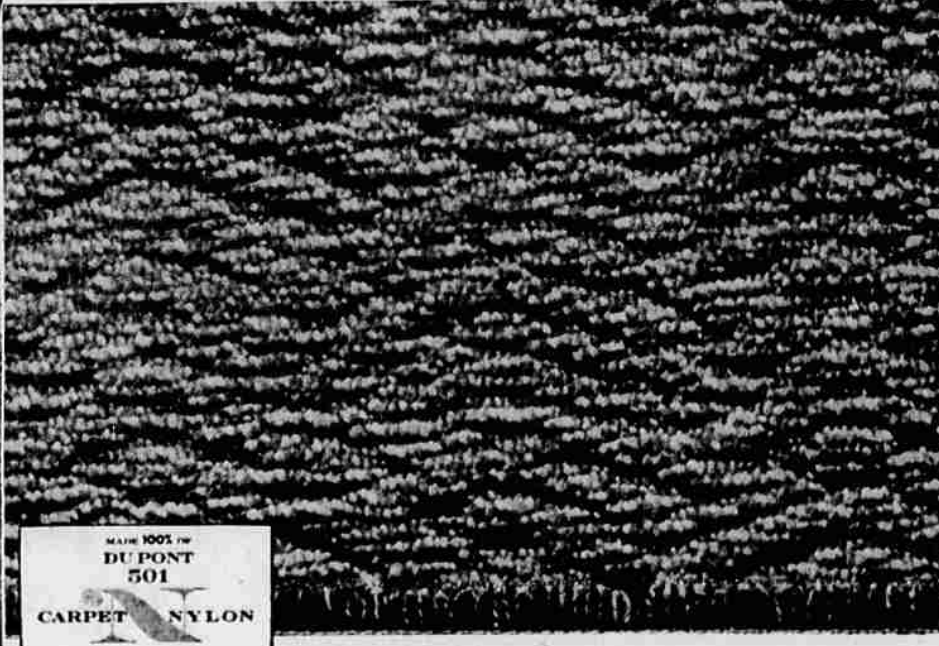

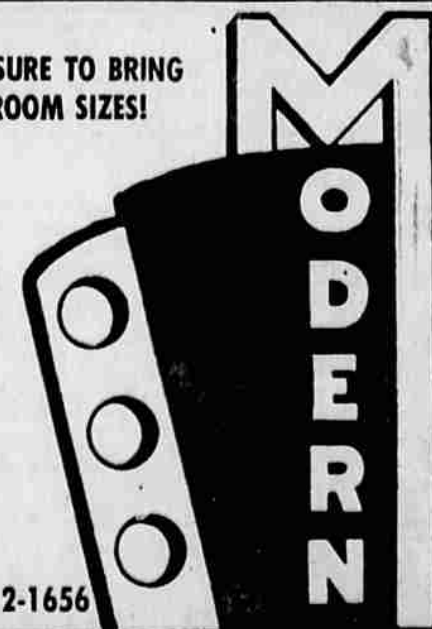
