

Yoncalla Eagles Set To Host Crow In B Quarterfinal Clash Thursday

Yoncalla's Eagles, shooting for their first B baseball crown, will have their work cut out for them Thursday when they host the Crow nine in the state B quarterfinals. Game time at Yoncalla is set for 7:30 p.m.

Yoncalla has reached the quarterfinals for the past three years before losing out to their northern neighbors each year. In 1960 the Eagles were nipped by McKenzie's Eagles, while in 1961 and 1962 the local power came out on the short end against the powerful Coburg Broncos.

Crow is making its first bid for the state crown. In reaching the quarterfinals Crow won the Trico-B League title by beating the defending state co-champion Coburg crew twice during regular season play.

Yoncalla won its fourth consecutive Bico-B League crown in a tight chase with the Canyonville Tigers. The Eagles ended with a 7-1 league mark, losing a single game to the Tigers. Canyonville finished one game behind the champs with a 6-2 record.

During the season the Eagles have compiled a respectable 12-4 record, with the first loss coming at the hands of the Crow nine in the season's opener.

The two teams have played twice earlier in the year, with Crow winning both games. In addition to Charlie Hopkins' no-hitter, he came out strong in the second game to record a 12-5 triumph on six hits.

Other B quarterfinal games pit Knappa against Jefferson, Butte Falls against Wasco County and Prairie City against Adrian.

Coach Ted Bennett will send Richard Wales to the mound against the invaders Friday. Wales packs a 6-1 record for the season and is averaging two strike outs per inning. The husky Eagle right-hander has a good fast ball which he mixes well with sharp breaking curves.

Opposing Wales will be Hopkins, ace of the Crow mound staff. Hopkins relies on control and a blazing fast ball. The last time the Eagles faced Hopkins they found themselves the victims of a no-hitter. Hopkins has been the mainstay of the Crow attack throughout the season and was a unanimous Trico-B League all-star selection.

Mike Latham will be held in reserve for the Eagles in case Wales runs into trouble, while Robert Purdy ranks as the No. 2 chucker for the invaders.

Completing the battery for the Eagles will be Rick Luttrell, and John Counts will handle the catching chores for Crow.

The infield for the Eagles will

find David Vian at first base, Roger Carney or Gordon Smith will be at second, Jimmy Wiley will cover the ground at short and Scooper Lee will work at third.

Probable starters in the outfield include Jim Byron or Latham in left, Dennis Boan in center and Rod Jackson in right.

Jackson is the leading sticker for the Eagles with a .400 batting average for the season. Providing additional power will be Byron at .352, Lee at .344 and Vian at .341. Wales and Lee give the Eagles a strong long-ball punch.

In addition to Hopkins, Crow placed outfielder Ron Lewis and third baseman Chuck Thompson on the Trico-B all-star team. Earning honorable mention spots on the all-conference team were Jerry Lewis, Purdy, Dan Sturdevant, Joe Tracey and Al Stuck.

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Bowlers Feted At Annual Banquet

Members Get Helpful Hints From Record Breaking Pro

Tom Hennessey's appearance highlighted the 10th annual Roseburg-Sutherlin Men's City Bowling Association banquet Tuesday night at the Fairgrounds.

Hennessey, first bowler to capture both the singles and all-events crowns the same year in the American Bowling Congress Classic Tournament, held a lively question and answer session with the local legions before retiring to Indian Lanes to give a three-line exhibition.

The famed pro told local enthusiasts that bowling had been good to him as it has provided him with a chance to travel throughout the world.

In discussing his years with the famed Budweiser Beer team of St.

Louis, which won the ABC team championship seven out of eight years, he told many highlights of his years with the team—including the 3,858 team series which is the highest ever bowled.

Hennessey classed Con Carter, his teammate and also on the Brunswick Advisory Staff, as the greatest bowler of all time.

The topflight pro, roller of seven sanctioned 300 games and 10 non-sanctioned perfect lines, stressed the importance of concentration and knowing how to relax while bowling.

Hennessey is now in his 20th year of bowling and has been a pro since 1951. During his first season he carried a respectable 167 average.

Also on the program was Bill McCulloch, ABC representative for the Northwest. McCulloch encouraged local bowlers to plan to attend the 1964 ABC National Tournament at Oakland, Calif., and plugged other upcoming tournaments on the west coast.

The new officers for the year were introduced by outgoing president Howard Petersen. New president of the association is Bob Hanberg, with Jerry Bauer and George Baldwin selected to serve three-year terms as vice presidents. Petersen was elected to fill the vacancy as association secretary which was created by the untimely death of Glen (Doc) Welman. Ed Davis will act as treasurer until 1965.

Plans for a Hall of Fame for association bowlers and a Bowler of the Year award were discussed. Three names already mentioned for the Hall of Fame are Wellman, John Anderson and Ted Beutner. All three of the nominees are deceased.

Major qualifications for nomination to the Hall of Fame are: distinguished service to the Roseburg-Sutherlin City Men's Association, distinguished service to the sport of bowling and outstanding accomplishments in bowling.

The Bowler of the Year award will be presented for the first time at the 1964 banquet to the association bowler with the highest average in a single sanctioned four or five-man team league who has bowled a minimum of 78 games.

The trophy will be displayed at the bowling establishment where the winner bowled, and if one man wins the award three years in a row it will be retired.

Highlights of the past year were mentioned by Petersen, with special recognition being given to the three association sponsored tournaments.

Bill Donnelly entertained with his ever-popular cartoon drawings portraying favorite expressions of bowlers under familiar circumstances.

Closing out the evening was the presentation of the trophies to the winners in the City Association tournament and the drawing for door prizes. Bob Smith served as emcee for the evening.

Singled out for special awards were Frank Kees and John Chancellor. Kees was awarded a trophy for the highest series of the season at Indian Lanes—a blistering 742. Chancellor's 710 topped the bowlers at Roseburg Bowl.

'Miracle Mile' Set For Saturday Meet

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Track and field promoters around the world have been trying for two years to get Peter Snell of New Zealand and Jim Beatty of the United States together to run the "miracle mile" race of the century.

But it took Tom Moore, director of the California Relays at the little city of Modesto, Calif., to swing the deal.

The race will be staged Saturday night and in addition to Snell and Beatty, three other sub-four minute milers, Bobby Seaman, Jim Grelle and Cary Weisiger, will be in the race.

Snell holds the world's record at 3:54.4, and Beatty is the fastest of the other campaigners at 3:58.1.

This could be the race where someone may push the record down around the 3:50 mark—and it will be witnessed by something less than 9,000 fans. That's the seating capacity for the stadium where the relays are held.

So how does Moore go about lining up this attractive card? "Our income from the sale of seats is only \$20,000," says Moore. "But we have a budget for the relays of \$35,000. We make up the deficit by having our merchants donate the awards, then purchase advertising in the program and getting on the list of sponsors."

Moore, a world champion hurdler at University of California a quarter of a century ago, offers no special inducement to athletes to compete in his relays. In fact he doesn't spend nearly as much as most of the other big relays.

"I think many of the athletes like our track," he says. "And maybe they like the honey at the home atmosphere. When we first started the relays 22 years ago, we had a hard time getting competitors to come here."

"But this year we had to turn down such great teams as Kansas, Western Michigan and Missouri because we didn't have the room for them. They wanted to come, but we had to limit the field to the teams with the best times this year."

The relays teams will be from Southern Illinois, Los Angeles Striders, Oregon, Texas Southern, Oregon State, Stanford, Florida A. & M. Athletic Club and San Jose State. They have the best times in the country.

Those league-leading San Diego Padres are tougher than ever now that big George Freese is back in town.

Freese played a big part in bringing the 1960 National League pennant to Cincinnati, but neither the Reds nor he ever really bounced back after he broke his leg in spring training of 1961.

Now the Reds have sent him down to regain his batting eye and in his first game for the Padres Tuesday night he crashed a pair of homers and a double.

He got plenty of help from his mates as the Padres rapped five homers and 20 hits on the way to a 12-1 romp over Portland.

Elsewhere, Dallas - Ft. Worth stayed within a game and a half of the Pads in the southern division with a 6-4 win over Oklahoma City. Tacoma pulled the same distance ahead of Seattle in the northern loop with a 5-3 win; Spokane parlayed a trio of homers into a 7-3 win over Hawaii, and the Salt Lake - Denver game postponed by cold weather.

Freese's heavy hitting accounted for four San Diego runs at Portland, while Rogelio Alvarez drove in five more with round-trippers in the third and eighth innings. Mel Queen's three-run blast in the seventh took care of the rest of the tallies.

Homers accounted for most of the damage at Fort Worth, too. Sandy Valdespino whacked one with two out in the ninth and two aboard to decide it after Cesar Tovar hit a solo shot for the Rangers in the sixth.

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Yanks' M-M Punch Explodes To Topple Kansas City, 7-4

Are M&M back in business? And, if they are, how long will it be before some of those American League "contenders" are out of business?

The questions are enough to give the New York Yankees' rivals the jitters today because it could mean that Ralph Houk's world champions are ready for their long-awaited big push.

Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris have been awfully quiet for \$172,000-worth of home run hitters this season and it's no coincidence that the Yankees have made several false starts while other teams shuffled in and out of the AL lead.

But Mantle's big bat exploded Tuesday night and the thunder was so loud it apparently managed to wake up Maris, too.

Mantle, the MVP of the 1962 season, who started Tuesday night's game with six homers and a .292 batting average, hit a three-run homer in the first inning and a two-run homer in the fifth in the Yankees' 7-4 victory over the Kansas City Athletics.

Has Respectable Totals

The outburst gave Mantle respectable season totals of eight homers, 20 runs batted in and a .303 average. And then, lo and behold, the long-slumbering Maris woke up with a homer of his own.

Si Roger's season totals still show only five homers, 10 runs batted in and a .239 average but his history is that he follows Mantle off on a "tear."

Jim Bouton went 5-2-3 innings before turning over a 7-3 lead to credit for his fifth win. The Yankees remained one game behind the Chicago White Sox and Baltimore Orioles, who are tied for first place in the AL.

The White Sox scored their third straight victory when they shaded the Washington Senators, 4-3, the Orioles beat the Detroit Tigers, 4-2, and the Minnesota Twins whipped the Boston Red Sox, 8-2, in other AL games. Los Angeles at Cleveland was rained out.

Strikes Out Sixteen

In the National League, Jim Maloney struck out 16 batters including a record-equalling eight in the fourth inning as the Cincinnati Reds beat the Milwaukee Braves, 2-0, the Pittsburgh Pirates beat the Houston Colts, 6-5, the Los Angeles Dodgers topped the New York Mets, 4-2, and St. Louis edged out the Chicago Cubs, 5-4, and the San Francisco Giants defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2.

Mike Herschberger singled home the White Sox' first run and contributed a single to a three-run sixth-inning rally that also included 3d singles by Floyd Robinson and Ron Hansen and a double by Joe Cunningham. Relief pitcher Hoyt Wilhelm preserved Johnny Buzhardt's fourth win despite being tagged for a two-run homer by Don Lick.

Gaines Paces Orioles

Dick Hall struck out Bill Freehan and Dick McAuliffe to end an eighth-inning Tiger threat and enable the Orioles to score their seventh victory in their last eight games. Joe Gaines homered in the second inning and drove in another run with a sacrifice fly to lead Baltimore's seven-hit attack. The win raised Chuck Estrada's record to 3-1.

The Twins routed rookie Dave Morehead with seven runs in the third inning and breezed behind Wilhelm's pitching of Jim Perry, who won his second game of the season. Lu Clinton and Dick Stuart homered to produce the Red Sox runs.

Final Tributes Paid To Davis

ELMIRA, N.Y. (UPI)—Sports fans and celebrities, congressmen and thousands of friends from throughout the eastern United States gathered here today for the funeral of football great Ernie Davis.

More than 11,000 persons filed past his open casket as it lay in state Tuesday, according to city officials.

A group of 30 players and coaches of the Cleveland Browns National League football team were to fly here for the funeral and act as honorary bearers.

Their route from Chemung County Airport was through roadways and streets lined with flags flying at half-staff in tribute to the 23-year-old Negro athlete who got his start in football here as a boy.

One of the players who planned to fly in with the Browns was halfback Bobby Mitchell, who was traded from the Cleveland club to Washington when Davis signed an \$80,000 yearly contract with the Browns.

Davis never realized his ambition to play professional football. Following his graduation from Syracuse University last summer doctors discovered the leukemia that led to his death last Saturday in a Cleveland hospital.

Davis, born in Uniontown, Pa., began his career in sports here as a standout on the Elmira Free Academy football team in 1956-58. He went on to star as a two-time All-American at Syracuse University and was awarded the coveted Helmsman Trophy as the nation's outstanding gridiron star of 1961.

Arthur Modell, president of the Cleveland ball club, flew here Tuesday for a tearful mourning of his player.
