Lumber Market Production Up, Orders Sliding

Production of lumber is up, but
orders are down for the first four
months of the year for the Doug-
las fir region compared to a simi-
lar period in 1962.

Orders at fir sawmills totaled
2.66 billion feet in 1963 compared
to 2.74 billion feet for the first
third of 1962, according to G. C.
Edgett, executive vice president
of the West Coast Lumbermen's
Association. Much of this loss in
orders is in cargo business to the
East Coast, he said, where Cana-
dians have taken 72.6 per cent of
the business this year due to un-
equal advantages enjoyed in these
markets for the foreigners.

The weekly average of West
Coast lumber production in April
was 160,477,000 board feet or 100.9
per cent of the 1958-62 average.
Orders averaged 162,911,000 b.f.;
shipments 160,638,000 b.f.; weekly
averages for March were produc-
tion 169,479,000 b.f., 106.5 per cent
of the 1958-62 average; orders 152-
487,000 b.f.; shipments 161,316,000
b.f.

Four months of the 1963 cumula-
tive production 2,746,724,000 b.f.;
four months of 1962, 2,677,626,000
b.f.; four months of 1961, 2,561-
792,000 b.f.

Orders for four months of 1963
break down as follows: Rail and
truck 2,000,509,000 b.f.; domestic
cargo 429,534,000 b.f.; export 129-
337,000 b.f.; local 106,860,000 b.f.

The industry's unfilled order file
stood at 592,734,000 b.f. at the end
of April, lumber inventory at 1-
044,766,000 b.f.

Figures covering the first quar-
ter of 1963 have been revised.

Record Numbers Visit Legislature

The State Legislature, now near-
ing the end of its session, has set
a record for the number of persons
visiting it, the Oregon State High-
way Department said today.

Thus far this year, more than
21,000 persons have visited the Cap-
itol, according to the Highway De-
partment's Capitol Guide Service.
Most of these persons have includ-
ed a legislative session in their vis-
it.

More than 240 school groups to-
taling more than 12,500 youngsters
have made the tour, plus 83 other
groups with more than 3,800 per-
sons. These groups, plus some 4-
700 individuals, represent the
largest number of visitors ever to
register with the guide service this
early in the year.

Legislative years traditionally
draw more visitors than non-legis-
lative years, but this was changed
in 1962 when the exceptionally
heavy summer tourist season helped
set a new attendance record for
the year of 67,385.
