STANFORD, Calif. (UPI)—Neither the Soviet Union nor the United States will ever be able to dominate the entire world, according to the newly appointed U.S. Ambassador to India Chester Bowles.

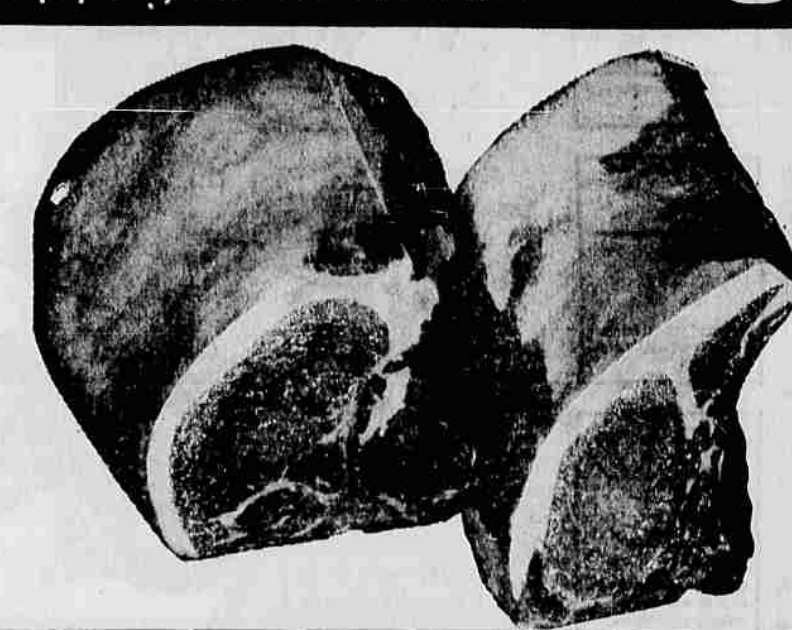
