

## State Finances Get Boost From Veterans Bond Funds

SALEM (UPI) — The general fund today had a \$5.5 million shot in the arm to keep the state from going into the red in the 37 days remaining in this biennium.

The Senate approved transferring the sum from the veterans bond sinking fund to the general fund, where it can pay for state services.

The money represents the remainder of funds the state advanced to the veterans program years ago to get it started.

The bill went to Gov. Mark Hatfield for certain signature, since he originally proposed the transfer. Some services were cut back because of a shortage.

**Long Day**

The House and Senate worked through long calendars.

The House passed a bill revising penalties for murder, since the bill would make parole possible in first degree murder cases only after 10 years of imprisonment. It would drop the maximum sentence for second degree murder from life in prison to 25 years.

Rep. Berkeley Lent, D-Portland, called it purely a "sop" to win

votes support for abolishing capital punishment. He said the figures were arbitrary.

The vote for passage was 35-25. The bill returned to the Senate for concurrence in house changes.

**Amendments OK'd**

Bills reinforcing farmer bargaining groups and overhauling local budget procedures went to the governor after the House accepted Senate amendments.

The Senate passed a House bill requiring doctors to report cases of children who have suffered physical abuse.

It also passed House bills taxing charter boats, and limiting landowners liability in an effort to encourage the opening of private lands to the public.

The House passed two bills intended to improve salmon research. One was the State Fish Commission budget, including \$128,000 in general fund money for research and \$2.3 million in federal money for hatchery programs.

The other requires that salmon tag money be divided equally between the Fish Commission, which conducts much of the research, and the Game Commission.

Seventeen veteran organizations and auxiliaries are participating in the annual event, which starts at 10 a.m. in the VA Hospital Auditorium.

Memorial Day address will be delivered by Harrison Winston, attorney. Wilbur Ford of the VFW will be master of ceremonies. Program highlights will include music by the Joseph Lane Junior High School Band under the direction of Larry Towns; invocation, Father Marion Corbin of St. Joseph's Catholic Church; pledge to the flag, led by Methodist Boy Scout Troop 4;

vocal solo, Mrs. Gene Cooksey accompanied by Mrs. Homer Grow; presentation of General Logan's Orders (from which Memorial Day originated), by Lt. Rolland D. Davis, Co. D, 186th Infantry, Roseburg National Guard; and benediction, the Rev. Verne Robinson of the Congregational Church.

**Parade Planned**

Traditional parade to the bridge which crosses the South Umpqua on the hospital grounds is planned, with the band participating, followed by dedication services at the bridge for veterans who lost their lives in the water. These rites will be under the direction of the Daughters of Union Veterans

of the Civil War and American Gold Star Mothers.

Final highlight will be a parade to the VA Cemetery where the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier replica will be decorated and dedication services conducted. In connection with this tradition, John Groat of the DAV will serve as guard at the tomb.
