# Improvement Looked For In Diamond Lake Fishing

The state Game Department has high hopes fishing will be better this summer than it was last at Diamond Lake.

With the opening of the fishing season there coming up this weekend, Jerry Bauer, aquatic biologist for the department, was the featured speaker Thursday at the meeting of the Roseburg Rotary Club.

Bauer recounted some of the history of the lake. He pointed out that the lake had been first stocked shortly after 1910. By 1920, the fishing was outstanding. He said the biggest trout ever caught weighed 27½ pounds.

But then, sometime later, roach, a trash fish with great propagation propensities, was introduced into the lake. It began eating the bottom food, and before long, the trout population began to fall. In 1946, the trout catch was 37,000. By 1954, it had dropped to 5,000. It was in that year the Commission decided on the biggest poisoning operation ever tried. It drained out about half the water in the lake and used 200,000 pounds of rotenone to kill all fish life in the lake. Then it was restocked.

The restocking in 1955 was with a Canadian type of trout. These Kamloops looked fine for the first year with a catch of 61,000 fish, but

by 1961, the catch had dropped to 30,000.

So last year, the type of fish was changed. The Game Department began stocking with Oak Creek (East Lake trout) and Willamette (McKenzie) varieties. The first is a fall-spawning trout; the second a spring spawner.

Actually, these plantings are part of a test to determine which of the two might be best suited for Diamond Lake. The test will continue through this year, and the 1964 plant will depend on the success of such things as growth, rate of catch and egg production from the species.

Last year, 485,000 trout were planted, and this year another half a million are being put in. Some of this year's plant will probably reach catching size by early July, Bauer said.

In a question-and-answer session afterward, Bauer said no trash fish have been discovered since the poisoning operation.

The 1964 plant will depend on the success of such things as growth, rate of catch and egg production from the species.

Coach Bill Bowerman's classy track and field team, fresh from its tenth straight Far West championship, will be represented by seven outstanding performers Saturday in the California Relays at Modesto.

Scheduled to compete for the Webfoots are two-sport All-American Mel Renfro in the high hurdles, Dave Steen, the national leading collegiate shot putter, in the weights, John Burns and Les Tipton in the javelin, Terry Llewellyn and Paul Stuber in the high jump and Dave Blunt in the 100.

Renfro, second in the nation last year as a sophomore, owns a best high hurdle clocking of 14.0 this spring and has also broad jumped 25-6½, the best collegiate effort of the season.

Steen's pacesetting collegiate shot put effort is 61-8½, and he's been under 60 feet just three times this year. The Webfoot weight ace also rates as one of the top collegiate discus performers, having flipped the platter 177-1¼ last week.

Oregon's two javelin entrants are both consistently over 230 feet with Burns boasting a best of 250-1 and Tipton claiming a toss of 237-10½ as his top effort of the year.
