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U.S. Trying To Avoid Showdown With Wallace

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — The U. S. Justice Department, fearing another "Ola Miss" crisis, sought today to head off a face-to-face encounter at the University of Alabama between Gov. George C. Wallace and federal officials.

The department asked a federal district court Friday for an injunction to prohibit Wallace from carrying out his announced plan to personally turn away Negroes from the school. Judge Seymour Lynne set a hearing on the case for June 3, just a week before two Negroes are scheduled to enroll in the university.

There was no immediate reaction from the fiery segregationist, already under criticism from state leaders for his dramatic stand on the issue.

River Time-Travel Study Progresses Past Roseburg

A team of water resources experts under the direction of the U. S. Geological Survey had progressed through Roseburg today in its time-travel survey on the South Umpqua River.

The team is following a dye dumped into the river at given points to check the rate of travel of the stream to determine effect on flow if a dam were installed above Tiller.

The team started at the Tiller Bridge about noon Thursday and has been working day and night tracing the dye since. It had arrived at the Washington Ave. Bridge at noon. It was expected to reach the Forks by tonight and its destination at Elkton on the main Umpqua sometime Monday.

Antoinette's White Wig Draws Republican Blast

Sugar Imports May End Price Increases

The department announced receipt of the "very large" new commitments late Friday, and said the "speculative bubble" in sugar "is bound to burst in the face of this plentiful supply."

Castro's Visit In Russia Rated Diplomatic Triumph

MOSCOW (UPI) — Western diplomats said today the communist marking the official end of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro's visit to Russia was an "impressive diplomatic triumph" for Premier Nikita Khrushchev over his foes in Red China.

So far as is known, Castro still is in Russia. He is believed to be discussing economic aid with Khrushchev today in the Black Sea resort of Pitsunda.

However, the secrecy that veiled Castro's flight from Cuba to Russia suggested that the first announcement of his departure will be withheld until he is safely back in Havana.

The publication of the communist indicated all his major business in Russia was finished. Its major points were:

HOUSES DIVIDED ON ISSUE

Deadlock Over Net Receipts Stymies Conference On Taxes

SALEM (UPI) — The Senate-House tax conference entered its eighth day of deadlock today still unable to agree on an income tax formula.

Neither the House nor Senate were in session today as the legislature awaited settlement of the dispute over how to raise the additional \$60 million needed to finance a \$405 million general fund budget for the biennium beginning 36 days from now.

While tentative agreement apparently had been reached on some points, the deadlock still centered around the net receipts issue.

House conferees Richard Eymann, D-Marcola, and F. F. Montgomery, R-Eugene, stood firm for a net receipts tax, a 10 per cent standard deduction and a flat \$20 dependency credit.

Court Hears Claims From Vincent Fire

The 1951 Vincent Creek fire which swept through Douglas County, still isn't forgotten.

The U. S. District Court in Portland is considering testimony now presented by the state of Oregon and the Oregon Forest Fire Association seeking recovery through appropriation of money for emergency fire fighting expenses incurred by the claimants to extinguish the forest fire.

The state is asking \$184,101.94 from the United States. The fire burned over land administered by the Bureau of Land Management.

The 28,000-acre fire burned on some 11,000 acres of federal land within the fire protection district. It was estimated that total expenditures in bringing the operator-caused fire under control was \$469,101.89. Two logging companies paid \$285,000 of this, which left \$184,101.89 uncollected.

The Senate, represented by Sens. Glen Stadler, D-Eugene, and Donald Husband, R-Eugene, balked at the net receipts, wanted a 5 per cent standard deduction, and split dependency credits of \$22 - \$24 for personal exemptions and \$18-\$20 for dependents.

The conferees tentatively had agreed to a cigarette tax, with \$3 million of the revenue to go to cities, a 5 per cent medical deduction with no top limit, and a fractional structure with a top rate somewhere between 6 and 7 1/2 per cent.

The Senate and House sides agreed to discuss revision of Oregon's capital gains law, and a 1 per cent increase in the corporate excise tax.

The conference battle began May 18 after the House refused to accept Senate amendments which struck the net receipts feature from the House-originated income tax measure.

The first conference committee deadlock on May 21 when Rep. Victor Atiyeh, R-Portland, said he could not abandon the cigarette and net receipts tax proposals.

Other committee members included Sen. Boyd Ottaviano, D-Madras, Sen. Robert Eldstrom, R-Salem, and Eymann who is the only holdover on the present committee.

County Court Receives Pilot Version Of Dunes Ordinance

The Douglas County pilot version of a special zoning ordinance for the Oregon Dunes coastal area was presented for adoption by the County Court Friday afternoon.

This zoning ordinance, developed as a joint effort of Douglas, Lane and Coos counties, was drawn up by Douglas County Planning Coordinator James Slattery.

It deals with the area along the general line of Highway 101 in the al Seashore Park, and is the first commercial tourist zoning classification to be drawn up in the state.

Chief aim of the zoning regulations is to allow commercial and tourist attraction developments in the area without detracting from the natural beauty of the area and to keep it from turning into an endless line of road-side businesses.

The intent, as listed in the zoning plans, is that, "This zone is intended to provide for the uses that serve the tourist needs of the community. Such zones will be located and designed, and the uses will be so restricted as not to conflict with any scenic values of an area."

The prime area in Douglas County to be developed for commercial tourist purposes will be in the Lake Talhocken section. This north coast zoning unit takes in 32,000 acres of land, the bulk of which is agricultural-forest lands.

Lane and Coos counties are expected to adopt similar programs in the near future.

The zoning of the area ties in closely with plans for creating a national park along the dunes seashore, and is one of the prime requirements in the plan submitted by U. S. Rep. Robert Duncan.

Diamond Lake Fishing's Fine On Opening Day

The fishing is excellent at Diamond Lake.

This was the report today from George Reynolds, a Forest Service representative in charge of operations at the lake.

He said everything seemed to be adding up to a perfect fishing weekend. The skies are cloudless and the fishing is good, a far cry from the opening day last year.

Reynolds told correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby that at 8 a.m., 1,100 cars had arrived at the lake carrying 3,500 people. The lake was floating 715 boats with 1,900 fishermen aboard. And the fish were biting all over the lake, Reynolds said.

A majority of the catches were being made on trout planted last year. But a few of the older Kamloops were also being snagged. Average length of fish appeared to be 12 to 14 inches, Reynolds said.

He pointed out that the law allows fishermen to catch up to 10, but only five of them may be 12 inches or over. Reynolds said the problem today is that most of the fish are too big, so the average catch appears to be six fish.

Park Group Sets Outdoor Meeting

The Roseburg City Park and Playground Commission will move outside into the warm spring air for its meeting Tuesday night. The meeting will be held at 5 p.m. at the Stewart Park pavilion.

On the agenda will be a discussion of the tennis courts, centering around maintenance responsibility and the future of the tennis program.

In Stewart Park itself, the commission will discuss plans for the softball field, including lighting, a review of the proposed plan for the horseshoe pits and general road improvements. The group will also discuss plans for installing rest room facilities on the golf course fairways.

Quintus Park facilities will also be discussed.
