

Robinson Carries Baltimore To Win Over Cleveland 9

It's an old baseball joke that the third baseman should pay his own way into the ballpark, but the Baltimore Orioles would gladly pass the hat for Brooks Robinson if he were ever stopped at the gate.

As far as the Orioles are concerned, the 26-year-old Robinson is the best third baseman in the American League—and getting better all the time. He went over the 300-mark for the first time in his career in 1962 and this season he's belting away at a .312 clip.

With Robinson playing a major role, the Orioles have won five straight games and 10 of their last 11 to move into a 1½-game lead in the AL.

Robinson hit a two-run homer and a pair of singles in three trips to the plate Friday night to lead the Orioles to a 7-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians and

Area Stars Claim Titles

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Flashy Leon Lincoln of Jefferson shattered the 220-yard dash record and two other marks were broken as the Oregon high school class A-1 and A-2 track meets got under way Friday.

The meets ended today with final events. Preliminaries were held on the opening day.

Two final A-2 events were held. Ron Salmon of Myrtle Creek won the high jump at 6-0 and Don Goertzen of Sutherlin captured the pole vault at 12-11½.

Lincoln, a senior, won his heat in the 220 in 9.9 and anchored the Jefferson 880-yard relay team to a 1:29.3 clocking, the best in the preliminaries.

Grants Pass, the pre-meet favorite, qualified men in seven final events. Jefferson, figured to be runner-up prior to the meet, gained spots in six events.

The two other records were smashed in A-2 competition. Gene Faircloth and Mike Rosa, both of Reedsport, accounted for them. Faircloth won his heat in the 880-yard run in 1:57.0 and Rosa went 22-4½ in the broad jump.

The old marks were 2:00 by Randy Taylor of St. Francis of Eugene in 1961 and 22-2½ by John Laduke of Siuslaw in 1960.

Portland State Downs Linfield

SALEM (UPI)—Veteran Gordon Riese pitched a four-hitter as Portland State defeated Linfield 8-1 in the first game of the best-of-three District 2 NAIA baseball playoffs Friday.

The Vikings and Wildcats concluded their series today.

Portland State, champion of the Oregon Collegiate Conference, beat Northwest Conference title winner Linfield in two straight contests last year and went on to finish second in the national playoffs.

Benton Favored By 8-5 To Stop Carter Tonight

NEW YORK (UPI) — George Benton of Philadelphia, second-ranking middleweight contender, seeks his 10th straight victory tonight in a nationally televised fight with sixth-rated Rubin (Hurricane) Carter of Paterson, N. J., at Madison Square Garden.

For this 10-round battle of knockout specialists, Benton is favored at 8-5 because of his combined ruggedness, skill and punch.

World champion Dick Tiger of Nigeria will be an interested spectator at the ringside as he scouts the two hardest-hitting contenders in his 160-pound division.

Whether 30-year-old Benton wins or loses, he will have achieved at least one objective: His first main event at the Garden in his 14th year as a professional.

Twenty-six-year-old Carter, with the shaven head and pirate's mustache, has had only 18 professional bouts; but four of them

were Garden main events. Because of his explosive hooking attack, Carter probably would have been favored over Benton tonight, had he not been stopped by Jose Gonzalez (6) because of a badly cut right brow in his latest fight, March 30.

That was the Hurricane's first kayo loss and his third defeat. Eleven of his 15 wins were by knockouts. His most spectacular victory was a first-round knockout over Cuban Florentino Fernandez last Oct. 27.

Benton seeks his 48th victory and 28th knockout in 56 fights. He has never been stopped. And he hasn't been beaten since Nov. 2, 1960, when he lost a controversial decision to John McCormack at Glasgow, Scotland.

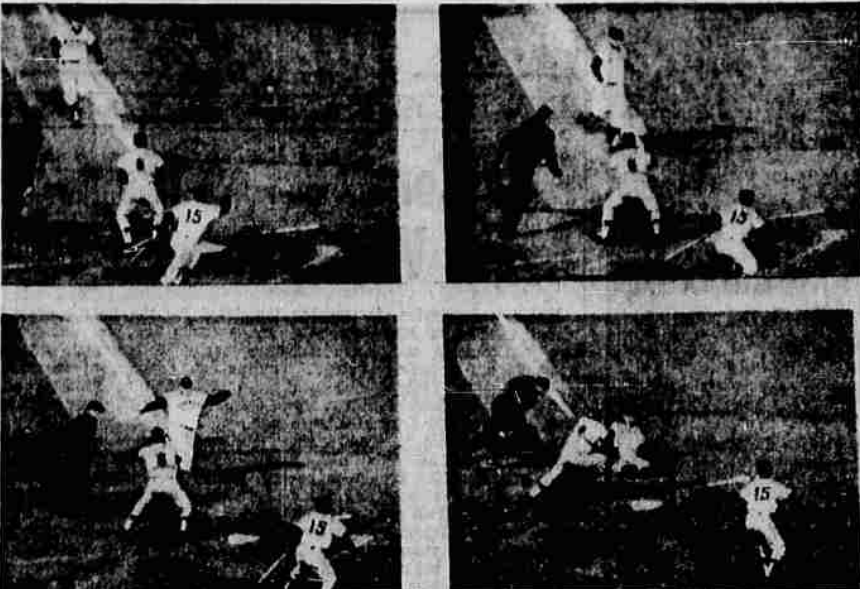

Seemingly out of nowhere the Rangers came to roost today atop the Southern Division after winning 13 of their last 17 games. The Texans became the fourth team to hold first place in the tighter Southern Division since the beginning of the season.

Hawaii knocked San Diego out of first place Friday with a 7-2 win while the Rangers tallied two runs in the ninth to beat Denver, 6-4.

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7-1 Win Over LA Dodgers Gives Frisco 2-Game Lead

Let Alvin Dark sprinkle a little salt on all those criticisms of Orlando Cepeda and they won't taste half bad.

In fact, they may taste almost as sweet as the San Francisco Giants' Friday night 7-1 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers that enabled Dark's team to take a two-game lead in the National League race.

And, in case Dark needs some pepper to go with the salty words, let him mark down in that little black book in which he jotted his players that "Orlando the unwanted" merely put the blitz to no-hit ace Sandy Koufax and provided the big blow that snapped the Dodgers' eight-game winning streak.

Friday night Cepeda hit a shot into right center field for a three-run double that put Koufax on the ropes and was the big blow of the Giants' first-inning five-run rally. Felipe Alou followed with a two-run homer and then Juan Marichal did the rest with a sparkling four-hitter that gave the Giants their first victory of the year over the Dodgers.

Koufax, who pitched a no-hitter against the Giants the last time he faced them, suffered his second loss against six wins. It was Marichal's sixth victory of the campaign and gave him a 7-5 lifetime mark against the arrival Dodgers. He lost his bid for a shutout in the sixth inning as pinch-hitter Don Zimmer homered but he struck out 10 and walked only one before a crowd of 40,676 at San Francisco.

The St. Louis Cardinals walloped the New York Mets, 10-4, the Pittsburgh Pirates whipped the Milwaukee Braves, 7-2, the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Cincinnati Reds, 5-1, and the Houston Colts topped the Chicago Cubs, 6-5, in other NL games.

In the American League, the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Cleveland Indians, 7-4, the Minnesota Twins topped the Chicago White Sox, 8-6, the New York Yankees beat the Washington Senators, 5-3, the Boston Red Sox beat the Detroit Tigers, 5-2, and the Kansas City Athletics scored a 3-1 victory over the Los Angeles Angels.
