Kuldip Singh Is A Medic Who Wants To Be A Singer

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Kuldip Singh is back in movietown. It is this news is something less than startling, it is well to remember that he flared to brief fame four years ago after an appearance on Groucho Marx' old show, "You Bet Your Life."

Kuldip (pronounced cool-dip) is a native of India and a practicing Hindu. Neither of these facts prevented him from becoming a singer. However, his parents figured singing in American night clubs was somehow beneath a well-bred Indian boy, so he returned home. Thereafter, according to Kuldip, he studied medicine at the University of Bombay and is a licensed physician in India—at the startling age of 23.

"We have a different educational system in India," he explained. "We go straight from what you call high school here into four years of medical school and skip the four year pre-med courses."

That may satisfy the county medical people in Bombay and points south, but it doesn't cut the mustard in Los Angeles. Kuldip, for all his medical skill, can't practice here.

In order to do so he would have to become a bronze-skinned version of Drs. Kildare and Casey, first undergoing an internship and a residency before practicing brain surgery, or whatever, in this country. But Kuldip does not thirst for the scalpel.

He still wants to be a pop singer.

"There never has been a Hindu singer recognized throughout the world," he pointed out. "There have been African, European, American and Japanese singers, but no Indians of renown."

"I would like to be the first to represent my country in this field."

As a starter Kuldip (whose real name is considerably longer and (terrifyingly complicated) will play the male lead in "Flower Drum Song" when it opens in San Diego this July.

Hanna Firm May Receive Civil Claim

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department said here it is considering civil action to recover \$1,816,000 from the Hanna Smelting Co., controlled by former Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey.

A spokesman for the Justice Department said the General Services Administration (GSA) billed the Hanna Smelting Co., of Riddle, Ore., for the amount but was unable to collect it.

GSA then turned the case over to the Justice Department's claims division.

GSA contended that the money represented capital expenses for which Hanna improperly charged the government in the price of nickel under a stockpile contract running from 1954 to 1961.

GSA said that Hanna included the unauthorized capital outlay costs in the price of nickel it sold to the government. It was listed as operating expenses according to the government.

The contract raised a political furor last year during a stockpile investigation conducted by Sen. Stuart Symington, D-Mo.

Here is a letter from Massachusetts that is typical of many that I receive. It says, "You write about squeeze plays all the time. How can I recognize one and then work one? I play lots of bridge,

but an definitely not an expert."

The answer to the first question is that any time you have all the tricks, but one, you have a potential squeeze situation. As to working one of the simplest method is to give the cards a chance.

South ruffs the third diamond and leads three rounds of trumps. He has all the tricks but one, and no problem if hearts break for him. Suppose hearts don't break?

Well maybe there is a squeeze and the way for South to find out is to lead his last trump and apply the pressure. He leads the last trump and discards a low club from dummy.

South may not have recognized a squeeze, but East will have. He has had to discard two clubs already and must now unguard either his jack of hearts or queen of clubs.

In either case South will run off the rest of the tricks. If East sheds

a heart South will surely know about the four heart tricks. If East lets go another club South will run off three heart tricks and when he finds dummy's last heart isn't good South will take three club tricks whether or not he had followed the discards.
