

Two Big Political Parties Considering San Francisco

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Both political parties are reported eyeing San Francisco as a strong contender for their 1964 presidential conventions, but neither will make its choice until next month.

The Democrats were said to be leaning toward San Francisco and Atlantic City, although party leaders still are awaiting a firm offer from Chicago.

Chicago already appears to be the strongest rival of San Francisco for the Republican meeting.

Neither party has ruled out any bidding cities, however. Detroit, Philadelphia and Miami Beach are still in the running for both conventions, while Baltimore has made a bid to the Democrats and Dallas is seeking the GOP meeting.

A newspaper poll of Republican convention delegates also showed strong support for Goldwater. The poll, conducted by the Indianapolis News, showed 339 GOP delegates favoring Goldwater, 244 for Rockefeller, 24 for Michigan Gov. George Romney and scattered support for others.

The newspaper, in announcing the results today, said the ballots were sent in mid-April to 1,331 delegates and replies were received from 707.

Mrs. Gladys Stewart spent a recent weekend in Eugene at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Bridges.

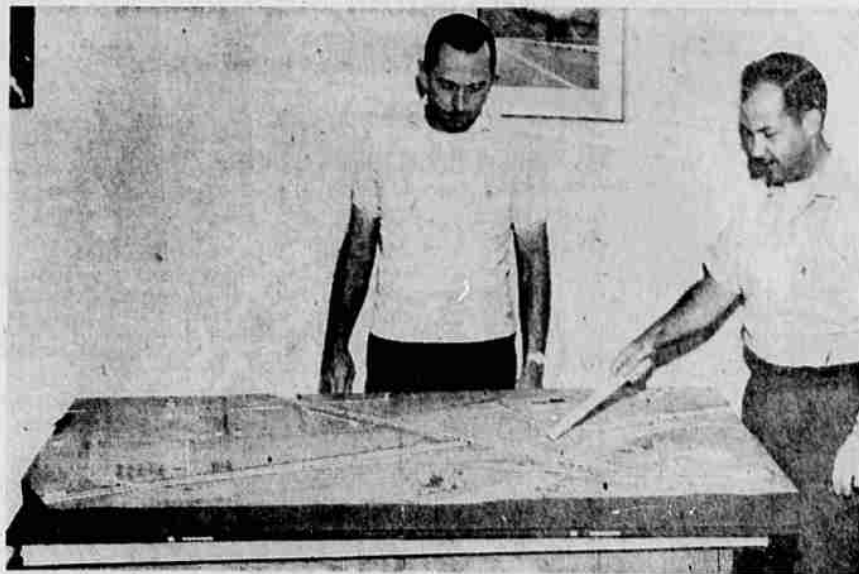

New Tenmile Fire Department Proves Effective In First Test

Tenmile's newly-activated Volunteer Fire Department came through with flying colors in its first test Saturday evening in a fire at the Harvey Dysert residence on Olalla Road.

Prompt action by the department is credited with saving the house, according to Mrs. Walter Coats, Tenmile correspondent.

In true old-time tradition, volunteers responded to the ringing of a locomotive bell mounted at the Tenmile Store, headquarters for the department, and fell in behind the fire truck with its screaming siren. The run to the fire scene was made in just eight minutes, Mrs. Coats reports. Damage was confined mostly to one inside wall of the house, plus extensive smoke and water damage throughout. Cause of the fire has not yet been determined, and no damage estimate has been made.

The alarm was turned in at 5:30 p.m. by Herbert Northcraft, volunteer fireman, who saw flames shooting from a window as he was driving past. The Dyserts, not home at the time of the fire, returned just as mopping up operations were completed. Dysert, already a subscriber to the department's fund drive for equipment, is a more enthusiastic booster than before, according to Mrs. Coats. Another ten minutes' delay would have undoubtedly resulted in complete loss of the house, a modern, one-story frame structure, officials report.

All equipment functioned perfectly and volunteer fire-fighting efforts were well co-ordinated, it is reported. The Tenmile truck, recently purchased, is the old Yoncalla truck put out to pasture when that city obtained new equipment. The department did double duty in its initial effort Saturday, standing by later in the evening at a fire at the Emma Diedrich residence on Highway 42 a mile from the Tenmile Store. No damage was reported.

Integration Marchers Lead Police Dogs

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. told about 30,000 persons taking part in a "Freedom Rally for Birmingham" Sunday night that President Kennedy "had not done enough" to outlaw segregation.

King, leader of the Alabama desegregation movement, told an enthusiastic crowd that the President "had done some significant things on civil rights" but that much more should be done.

After the rally an estimated 1,000 persons marched the four miles through the downtown area to city hall led by two Negroes holding two police dogs on leashes.

The assemblage was quiet and orderly during the march and the half-hour they remained at city hall to listen to the vice chairman of the Los Angeles chapter of the Congress for Racial Equality gave a short talk.

Some marchers carried signs with such slogans as "Equality, when?" and "Freedom in Alabama."

Spectators at Wrigley Field attending the three-hour rally contributed thousands of dollars to support the Alabama non-violence movement. No total was announced immediately.

Entertainer Sammy Davis Jr. pledged \$30,000 — one week's salary from a Las Vegas, Nev., appearance. He said as he embraced King, "This should prove to you good people once and for all that my leader is your leader."

Numerous donations were received ranging from \$25 to \$2,000 from individuals, churches, union locals and other organizations.

Other entertainment celebrities on hand were Davis' wife, May Britt, Tona Franciosa, Dorothy Dandridge, Mel Ferrer, Paul Newman and his wife, Joanne Woodward, and Rito Moreno.

King told the crowd that "the Negro in the South is no longer willing to accept segregation in any form. Segregation is nothing but a new form of slavery covered up with niceties."
