

Jefferson Wins A-1 Title; Vikings Snare A-2 Cinder Crown Cruncan, Dodge Get 3rds Ross Barkhurst Paces Victory With 18 Points

Alas, being favored seems to be the "kiss of death" for the Grants Pass Cavemen in the state A-1 track meet.

The Cavemen went into the finals Saturday still picked to cart home the top hardware; however, Leon Lincoln of the Jefferson Democrats had other ideas. Lincoln led Jeff's six man squad in building up 46 points.

North Eugene's Highlanders, the defending champions, were second with 41 points and the Cavemen were third with 35.

It was the third year the Cavemen were favored, and twice they went home second.

Roseburg's Indians turned in one of their top showings in recent years with 13 points.

Mike Cruncan was the big gun as he came in third in the mile with a 4:22.2 clocking and sixth in the 880 with a 1:59.7. In the preliminaries Friday Cruncan qualified for the finals in the 880 with a sizzling 1:56.8 which gave him second place behind Hillsboro's Wendell Cox in the first heat.

Cruncan's 4:22.2 and 1:56.8 shattered his own school records. Cruncan had earlier set the school marks with a 1:57.3 in the 880 and a 4:24.4 in the mile.

Tom Dodge picked up the remainder of Roseburg's points with a third place finish in the spotlighted pole vault. Dodge cleared the bar at 13-0 1/2 for third place behind Hillsboro's Wendell Cox in the first heat.

Barry Grant, Roseburg's third entrant in the meet, ran a 51.4 440 in the qualifying round Friday. He placed fourth in the third heat, but failed to qualify for the finals.

Lincoln was the leading individual point getter among the A-1 finalists as he tied his own record in the 220-yard dash — a blistering 21.6 that erased the 21.8 mark set by Reg Brady of Washington in 1933 and tied by Butch Lumby of Grant in 1962.

In addition, Lincoln racked up a first in the 100-yard dash and anchored the winning relay team for a total of 22 1/2 points.

The pole vault record was shattered as expected with Gary VanKoten of Grants Pass and Mark Henningsgaard of Cottage Grove both clearing the bar at 13-7 1/2. VanKoten was declared the first place winner by virtue of fewer misses. The old record had been held by Benson's Sam Whitney since 1954 at 13-1 1/2.

Marshallfield's Bud Walsh was the only other double winner of the A-1 competition. Walsh took top honors in both the high and low hurdles.

Along with Lincoln, who was awarded a trophy as the day's outstanding performer by the 1933 Washington High School state champion team, other top individual scorers for the meet were: Walsh, 20; Bob Shepard, Grants Pass, 16; Mike Diebele, Medford, 16; Cox, 16; Dave Wilborn, Albany, 16; Tom Komers, Lincoln, 12; and Bill Hutton, Bend, 12.

SALEM (UPI)—Versatile Fred Thomas scored 25 points in five events to lead Southern Oregon to its second straight NAIA District 2 track championship Saturday.

The Red Raiders rolled up 107 points. Lewis and Clark finished second with 78.

Thomas won the triple jump in 45.5 and the broad jump in 22.8 1/2, took second in the 100-yard dash, third in the 220 and fifth in the high jump.

Ross Barkhurst Paces Victory With 18 Points

Saturday was a big day for the Myrtle Creek Vikings as they surprised the experts by performing the near impossible feat of winning the state A-2 track crown with only three boys in action.

The trio of Ross Barkhurst, Ron Salmon and Ed Cadman compiled 36 points for the Vikings, while the favorites, Central Linn and Reedsport, could do no better than second and third with 34 and 32 points respectively.

Barkhurst racked up 18 of Myrtle Creek's points with a first place in the 100-yard dash and a second in the discus. Barkhurst won the 100 with a clocking of 10.1, edging Central Linn's Tom McKern who recorded the same time.

The spirited Viking senior came through on his third and final discus toss with a throw of 150 feet to jump up to second place. Robert Grimso of Vermillion won the event with a distance of 158-5 1/2.

Salmon had provided the Vikings with a good start when he won the high jump crown at 6-0 Friday. Salmon missed his first two attempts at 5-10, then cleared the bar on his third try. At the winning height Salmon went over on his second attempt.

In the 880 Cadman picked up eight points for the new champs as he finished close on the heels of the new State A-2 record holder, Gene Faircloth of Reedsport. In the finals Cadman came around with a 1:59, while Faircloth won the race with a 1:57.6. Faircloth's record came Friday in the preliminaries when he circled the track twice in 1:57. The old mark of two minutes had belonged to Randy Taylor of St. Francis since 1961.

Two other A-2 marks hit the dust as Allan Fowler of Creswell got off a broad jump of 22-6 1/2 to topple the mark set Friday by Reedsport's Mike Rosa of 22-4 1/2. Rosa won 22-6 1/4 in the finals. The third record was a 1:32.2 880-relay recorded by a quartet of aces from Central Linn.

Fowler was the A-2 meet's leading point getter as he won the high and low hurdles in addition to his record breaking performance in the broad jump. The three firsts provided Creswell with its 30 points and fourth place in the team standings.

Faircloth racked up 20 points on first in the mile and 880, followed by Barkhurst with 18, Don Salyer of Rogue River with 13 and McKern of Central Linn with 11 1/2.

Other top performances were turned in by Sutherland's Don Goertzen in the pole vault and Glendale's Darrell Worley in the 440. Goertzen won first with a vault of 12-11 1/2. Salyer cleared the same height but had more misses in readjusting the winning mark.

Worley won his heat of the 440 in the prelims with a 51 seconds flat time, and finished second in the finals only to be disqualified for running out of his lane.
