Polly Lane, the General's wife, wore the dress on the day Oregon became a state, Feb. 14, 1859. It was presented to Lane House by Mrs. Mickel's mother, Marjorie Lane Shantz, a granddaughter of Nathaniel Lane, eldest son of the General. Mrs. Shantz' father was Dr. Harry Lane who was mayor of Portland from 1905-1909 and later elected to represent Oregon as US Senator. He died in 1917 while still in office.
