

Official's Error Robs Shinnick Of Jump Mark

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Everybody agrees that Phil Shinnick of University of Washington broke the world record when he broad jumped 27 feet, 4 inches at the California Relays in Modesto the other night.

But officials are just wasting their time and falsely raising the hopes of the 20-year-old athlete if they think they ever can get the record certified.

For those who came in late, somebody forgot to turn on the wind velocity gauge for the jump — and that eliminated all chances of a world record right there.

"I can't see any way the international federation could recognize the world record," said a sad Harold Berliner, high official in world track and field circles. "We know he jumped the distance, but there's no way to prove how strong the wind was blowing."

The allowable wind velocity is 4.473 miles per hour. And it had been blowing between three and seven miles and hour just before the jump. So there's no way of telling if it was a legal jump.

Berliner says he asked the man who was supposed to gauge the wind, Leon Glover Jr., about the error.

Yankees, Dodgers Take To Road Following Winning Home Stands

Now is the time for the New York Yankees and the Los Angeles Dodgers to show their muscles in the major league pennant races.

The Yankees trailed the Baltimore Orioles by 2 1/2 games and the Dodgers were 2 games back of the San Francisco Giants when all the teams took time out Monday to catch their collective breaths.

Both the Yankees and the Dodgers will be on the road for the next two weeks, making their immediate tasks all the more difficult.

The Dodgers have won 18 of 25 games at home thus far this season but are 8-11 on the road. The Yankees completed a 9-2 home stand Sunday to bring their season record at Yankee Stadium to 13-6. However, they are only 10-8 on the road.

Starting with a night game at Boston tonight, the Yankees will play 15 road engagements in the next 14 days. Their most important stop will be at Baltimore next week, when they square off against the Orioles in three straight night games.

Orioles Are Hot
The Orioles, winners of eight straight and 13 of their last 14 games, play three-game sets at Kansas City and Los Angeles this week before returning home for their scraps with the world champions.

The Dodgers launched a 15-game road trip last weekend at San Francisco, losing two of three games to the Giants. They move on to Milwaukee for the start of another three-game series tonight then have stops at Cincinnati, Houston and Chicago before resuming their war with the Giants at Los Angeles June 10.

Maury Wills wasn't with the Dodgers when they headed east, remaining in Los Angeles for X-ray treatment of a foot injury. If the calcium deposit on the second toe of Wills' left foot doesn't respond to treatment he may require surgery. That would knock the base-stealing champion out of action for another three weeks.

Houk Optimistic
While the Dodgers were having their share of troubles, manager Ralph Houk of the Yankees was extremely optimistic when he left for Boston.

"We've got good reason to feel pretty good as we start on this long trip," he said. "We've just finished a fine home stand, the lineup is solid for the first time and the pitching has been looking up."

When it comes to pitching, though, you can't beat that Baltimore staff. Milt Pappas, unbeaten in four decisions, is pacing all American League pitchers with a 1.59 earned run average. Teammate Steve Barber (8-3) is third with a 2.27 ERA mark and Robin Roberts, another Bird is sixth with a 2.65 average.

Is it any wonder that Baltimore fans are talking pennant so early in the season?

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'Champagne' Tony Lema Captures Memphis Open Crown With Playoff Win

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — Champagne Tony Lema lived up to his name and his promise Monday and ordered three bottles of "the best you've got" for newsmen after he won the \$50,000 Memphis Open.

The tall, unassuming California pro nabbed the \$9,000 first prize from Tommy Aaron in a sudden-death 73rd hole playoff. Both ended 72 holes with 270.

The victory was the first of the season on the PGA circuit for Lema, who has placed well in money in every tourney he has entered. He now ranks second on the tour money list with more than \$44,000.

"I'm satisfied with my playing," grinned Lema. He finished the 36-hole finale over the 6,500-yard course with 68-68 for a total of 136. "I thought I had a good chance all the way through," he added.

Aaron in Trouble
Lema's first drive in the playoff landed on the right of the fairway, where he chipped up to about 40 feet. Aaron's smash ended in the rough to the left, and the 26-year-old South Carolina pro knocked the ball from the rough across the green and into a sand trap.

Aaron knocked a flyer across the green again, then came up onto the green about 10 feet from the cup. Lema — two strokes behind — cupped his putt from three feet and took the crown.

Tied in the third slot were Bruce Crampton and Harold Kneese, both with 274. Kneese had taken a slim one-stroke lead on the field at the end of the morning round.

Unlucky in Playoffs
Aaron said he thought he "played good all day. But I've never won a sudden death—not as an amateur or anything."

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Tacoma Belts Bevos, 8-3

The Tacoma Giants today were whistling a variation of that old standard, "what a difference a day makes."

Only Giants would change the title slightly and call it, "what a difference a week makes."

Just a week ago Tacoma held a slim half-game lead over the Seattle Rainiers in the Pacific Coast League's Northern Division pennant chase. Today, and seven games later, that margin has grown to a comfortable three and one-half games.

The Giants added to their lead Monday night when they scored six runs in the first inning and coasted to an 8-3 victory over the Portland Beavers.

At the same time, the slumping Rainiers ran into a strong eighth inning performance by Howie Reed and dropped a 5-0 decision to the Spokane Indians.

Elsewhere, Hawaii's Ron Moeller tossed a sparkling four-hitter as the Islanders squeezed by Salt Lake City 1-0 and Dallas-Fort Worth pounded out 12 hits to dump Oklahoma City 7-3. San Diego was idle and Denver lost a 7-2 exhibition decision to the Kansas City Athletics.

Jackie Davis capped Tacoma's first inning explosion when he smashed a home run 400 feet over the left centerfield fence with two teammates on base.

The Giants starter, Jerry Thomas, survived a shaky third inning and went the distance for his fifth victory of the season. Portland scored all its runs in the third on a triple by pitcher Lew Krausse, doubles by Jay Hankins and Ken Harrelson, and a single by Manny Jimenez.

Spokane's Reed was in trouble only in the fifth inning when Seattle loaded the bases with two outs and in the eighth when he gave up a pair of singles with only one out. But each time the Rainiers were unable to come up with the big hit to spoil the shutout.

Jim Barbieri paced Spokane's nine-hit attack with three singles and two RBIs.

Despite Moeller's fine pitching performance, Hawaii needed an unearned run to pick up the win at Salt Lake City. Shortstop Jimmy Stuart's error and Mick Harrington's single gave the Islanders the game's only run in the fourth.

Moeller struck out 13 batters and was never in serious trouble in recording his first decision of the season.

Cesar Tovar and George Banks paced Dallas-Fort Worth's victory with three hits and two RBIs each.

The Rangers' starter, Lee Stange, gave up two runs in the first inning and then retired 16 Oklahoma City batters in a row before he weakened in the seventh and needed help from the bullpen.

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
