

Red Cross Swim Program Begins At City Pool June 8

The Red Cross' Learn-To-Swim program at the Roseburg Municipal Pool is scheduled to begin June 18.

June 8 has been set as the opening date for the regular swimming season at the Municipal Pool. The pool will open at 1 p.m.

The Red Cross program will consist of three sessions, with each lasting three weeks. Registration for the opening session will be held June 13 and 14. The second session will be held July 9 through 26 and the final classes will begin July 30 and end Aug. 16.

All students must be registered previous to the first day of the classes. Registration for the second session will be July 3 to 5 and for the third session will be July 25 and 26.

Students can register at the Municipal Pool between 2 and 5 p.m. on the above listed days.

Each parent must register his own child, and a fee of \$1.20 must accompany each registration. This fee is assessed by the City to be used for pool improvements and partially offset the cost of pool operation during the instructional program.

Children taking the classes must be 8 or older. The schedule for the three sessions is: swimmers and intermediates 10:30 to 11 a.m.; beginner boys, 11 to 11:45 a.m.; and beginner girls, 11:45 to 12:30.

The first and third sessions will be open to the general public, including the outlying areas and communities. The second session will be restricted to youth of the Roseburg area.

Senior and junior life saving and adult Learn-To-Swim classes will be scheduled at a later date.

Improved Novi Specials Rate High For Running Of Indianapolis 500

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—The dream of a dead man might be the biggest story of the 500-mile race this year.

The late Bud Winfield had the dream; he built two cars to go after auto racing's biggest prize. He called them the Novi Governor Specials when they were built some 20 years ago.

Twice his supercharged babies, turning out almost 750 horsepower, won the pole position as the fastest qualifier for the race on the first day of time trials.

Twice, the speedsters had the highest overall qualifying speed. But they never won the race.

Two veteran race pilots, Ralph Hepburn and Chet Miller, were killed in them.

Hepburn died when his Novi bolted like a runaway horse into the wall three times, only days after he declared "I've got the best race car ever built and it's the one that'll win the '500' for me."

Kokane, Atlantic Salmon Count In Oregon's Trout Creel Limit

Oregon anglers are advised that the landlocked kokanee can be the landlocked Atlantic salmon taken by fishermen according to the regular trout bag limits of the state, except where special bag limits may apply. At the present the only restrictive bag limit on these fish is at Mud lake in central Oregon where angling for Atlantic salmon is for fun only, and all Atlantic salmon caught must be returned to the water.

The regular trout bag limit is 10 fish per day, not more than five of which may be over 12 inches in length. A minimum length limit of 8 inches applies in all waters of zone 1 (the coastal zone) and in parts of zones 3 and 4; a minimum length limit of 6 inches applies in all other zones.

This advice is given by the game commission following numerous inquiries from anglers in connection with Atlantic salmon stocked by the game commission in Davis Lake and kokanee stocked by the game commission in numerous waters may exceed the 20-inch mark. Anglers feared these fish might come under the salmon-steelhead regulations of two fish over 20 inches in length.

The game commission advised that the salmon and steelhead regulations apply to migratory species and not to fish which are landlocked with no access to the sea. While it is true the kokanee is a steelhead salmon—in some areas it is called "little red salmon"—these fish are landlocked and nonmigratory and are classed with the trout angling regulations for angling purposes. The Atlantic salmon is not a true salmon. It is a member of the trout family where, in its eastern environment, it is similar to the steelhead trout in habit. In Oregon the Atlantic salmon is landlocked and nonmigratory and, like the kokanee, is classed as a trout for angling purposes.

The Atlantic salmon in Davis Lake, according to reports, are growing exceptionally well and some of these fish will undoubtedly exceed the 20-inch mark in a year or two. Kokanee exceeding the 20-inch mark are taken regularly by anglers in Odell, Crane Prairie and Wickiup.
