Sheep Dog Trials Will Be Feature Of County's Fat Lamb Show

Exhibitors in the open and junior divisions of the Douglas County Fat Lamb Show will be competing for trophies and \$450.00 worth of premiums.

Premiums are also at stake in the sheep dog trials which are open to any working sheep dog in Douglas County, reports show committee chairman Bill Strader.

In the open division of the lamb show, the top five places for pen of five will receive \$50, \$40, \$30, \$20 and \$15. The next 10 places will receive \$10. Premiums for wool breeds and down breeds in the open singles will be \$7.50, \$6, \$5, \$4, \$3 and \$2.50 for the next five places.

The same premium schedule will be in effect for wool breeds and down breeds in the singles category of the junior division exhibits.

Strader announced the following schedule of events for Saturday: 10 a.m., junior singles judging (wool breeds and down breeds);

10:40 a.m., 4-H showmanship; 11 a.m., open singles judging (wool breeds and down breeds); 11:30 a.m., junior judging contests; 12 noon, lamb barbecue; 1 p.m., dog trials, pen judging and wool judging; 3 p.m., trophy presentation; 3:30 p.m., release of entries.

Strader emphasized that exhibitors need not be members of the association. But all animals must be on the property of the exhibitor at least 60 days prior to June 1. Only lambs born since Dec. 1, 1962, are eligible.

Judging will be based on: Judgment of the dog, obedience to signals from the handler, time to pen sheep and assistance from handler. Time limit is 12 minutes.

A trophy for champion sheep dog will be awarded.

Solons Save Saturday Mail Deliveries

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. J. Vaughan Gary, D-Va., and Sen. A. Willis Robertson, D-Va., have met, smiled, conferred, and, with the help of several other House and Senate members, worked out a compromise which means: —Saturday mail deliveries, allegedly imperiled in a congressional economy drive, will not be shut off or curtailed.

The congressional money machine, which broke down last year with results more comic than tragic, is greased, oiled, and ready to grind out the billions again.

What Gary, Robertson and Co. agreed on at their Alphonse and Gaston performance Tuesday was an appropriation of \$6 billion to run the Post Office and Treasury departments in the 12 months starting July 1. To the relief of all concerned, their talks were unmarred by the slightest unpleasantness.

It is not that Gary and Robertson aren't Southern gentlemen and the best of old friends. But they happen to be chairmen of House and Senate appropriations subcommittees handling funds for the Treasury and Post Office departments.

Last year their subcommittees

were the first to collide in a test of strength between House and Senate check writers that tied up all money bills until almost the end of the session.

The squabble, in which neither Gary nor Robertson had any real role, was over which committee's members would walk to the other side of the Capitol for compromise talks to iron out differences in Senate and House appropriations bills.

Again this year, Treasury-Post Office was the first regular money bill of the session. Successful conclusion of the Treasury-Post Office conference talks demonstrated that the truce which ended last year's protocol squabble still is intact.

Wool Prices Expected To Show Moderate Decline This Year

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Agriculture Department said today world wool prices are expected to decline moderately during the remainder of 1963 because of competition from manmade fibers.

In a review of the wool situation, the department said that during the early months of 1963, world prices were the highest since late 1957 and early 1958 for the finer grades of wool, and the highest since early 1960 for the medium and coarser grades. Demand was stable for the lower than normal supplies, due to lower carryover stocks and smaller production.

The department said consumption can be expected to remain

steady through 1963. Total use of all fibers is increasing, the agency said, but wool's share is decreasing.

The higher level of wool prices probably will result in a greater blending or substitution of manmade fibers. This, in turn, the department said, will cause a moderate price decline during the rest of 1963.

Domestic use of wool, cotton, and manmade fibers in 1962 totaled 58.4 pounds per capita. This was 8 per cent more than a year earlier. The per capita domestic use of all three fibers increased—wool, 5 per cent; cotton, 4 per cent; and manmade fibers, 16 per cent. Of the total per capita domestic consumption, wool accounted for 3.1 pounds, cotton 22.9 pounds, and man made fibers 12.4 pounds.

The crop reporting board said planted acreages of the nine vegetable processing crops for 1963 total 1,531,000 acres. This compares with 1,657,000 acres planted to the same crops in 1962 and 1,643,000 in 1961.

The declines for tomatoes, sweet corn, green lima beans, and cabbage for kraut from 1962 more than offset increases indicated for

green peas, and winter spinach.

The Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) estimates world cattle numbers total a record 1.1 billion head, and hog numbers total a record 496 million head.

The cattle total is 19 million head more than in 1962, up 169 million head from the 1951-55 average, and 99 million head above 1956-60.

The hog total is 6 million head greater than in 1962.
