

Madison Snares Title McKenzie, Crow Win In Prep Playoff Battles

PORTLAND (UPI)—Madison of Portland, McKenzie and Crow used strong pitching performances to win state prep baseball titles at Multnomah Stadium Thursday. Madison captured the A-1 crown with a 5-0 victory over Pendleton on the strength of a two-hit pitching job by Rick Wise. Dennis Baldridge's two-hit performance led McKenzie to a 1-0 win over Bandon and the class A-2 title, and Crow's Charlie Hopkins hurled a one-hit, 9-1 win over Wasco County in the class B championship contest.

Villanova Favored To Win Track Meet

NEW YORK (UPI)—Villanova, with a power-packed array including at least three possible record breakers, was expected to get off to a good start today in quest of its fourth straight IC4A track and field championship.

The Wildcats from Philadelphia, who have won the team crown in this meet bringing together all the major Eastern track powers five times in the last six years, figure to move into a strong position in today's qualifying trials in 13 events at Randall's Island Stadium.

Finals in these 13 events and five more are scheduled for Saturday.

All told 49 colleges have entered a total of 591 athletes in the 87th renewal of the IC4A event. The only major Eastern track team missing are Army and Navy, who have a conflicting dual meet on Saturday, but on hand will be Michigan State, the only Big Ten member of the IC4A.

Possible record smashes for coach Jim Elliott's Villanova team are Noel Carroll in the 800, Pat Traynor in both the mile and the steeplechase, and Rolando Cruz in the pole vault.

Yale is the only team given an outside chance of upsetting Villanova.

Snell Attempts To Set New 800 Mark Tonight

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Peter Snell, holder of the world mile record, takes a crack at his half-mile mark of 1:45.1 tonight in the Southern Pacific Amateur Athletic Union (SPAUAU) meet.

The New Zealander will be opposed by Jim Grelle, the 1963 Pan American games 1,500-meter champion; Jim Dupree, former Olympian from Southern Illinois; John Dunkelberg of Charlotte, N.C.; and Warren Farlow of the Southern California Striders.

Snell, who ran a 3:54.0 last weekend at Modesto, Calif., will run his next mile race at the Compton (Calif.) Relays June 7.

The Modesto performance was only five-tenths off his world mark and was the third fastest time in a recorded history.

Among other track stars will be Jim Beatty, who ran third to Snell at Modesto. Beatty will compete in the mile at the SPAUAU meet held at Occidental College against George Jessup of Los Angeles State, Darryl Taylor of Long Beach State and Leroy Neal and Bill Anderson of Occidental.

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Parnelli Jones Captures Speedway Crown

Race Standards Smashed As Record Field Enters Memorial Day Classic

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Auto racing's old era hasn't died, but the new one has begun.

Parnelli Jones, the youthful favorite, Thursday won the richest 500-mile auto race ever run—in record time, at record speed, and for a record purse.

He rode the old car and a standard racing engine of design and power in use at the track for years. He averaged 143.137 miles per hour.

But he beat a Scotsman, grand prix sports car driver Jimmy Clark, by only .34 seconds. Clark, in a rear-engine car powered by a Ford stock motor, averaged 142.752 miles per hour.

Clark challenged so strongly in the last few laps that he trailed Jones, a 28-year-old crowd favorite, by only .34 seconds.

Clark was bitter over the defeat. His manager, car designer Colin Chapman, complained that Jones made gains under the yellow light, supposed to slow the field, and thus gained the advantage to win.

But Jones said he did not gain under the yellow. He tried only to protect himself, he said. In the final 20 laps, Eddie Sachs spun twice, and Roger McCluskey, half a lap away from third place, once, McCluskey's mishap, which put him out of the race, came in front of Jones while the winner was on his last lap.

"McCluskey cut in under me," he said, "and spun, and I didn't know what was going to happen. I saw an opening and I just gunned it and got out of there."

The first six finishers bettered

the old speed record of 140.293 set by Roger Ward a year ago. A. J. Foyt, Houston, Tex., was third at 142.210; Ward fourth at 140.866; and Jim McElreath, Arlington, Tex., sixth at 140.862.

Others in the top 10 were Dan Gurney, Costa Mesa, Calif., 140.071; Chuck Hulse, Downey, Calif., 139.524; Al Miller, Roseville, Mich., 139.524; and Dick Rathmann, Roselle, Ill., 138.845.

No one was hurt during the fastest race ever run and 14 cars officially were running at the finish. Bobby Marshman, also was running but pulled into the infield before he crossed the finish line and Eddie Sachs lost a wheel as Jones was on his last lap.

It was a great win before almost 300,000 fans, for a purse expected to run more than \$450,000, with almost \$150,000 expected to go to Jones.

Jones, who led for 167 laps, earned \$25,050 at \$150 for each time he was in front across the line. Clark led for 28 laps for \$4,200, McCluskey led for four for \$900, and Jim Hurtubise for one, for \$150.

Aguirre Returns Home To Blank Angels

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Hank Aguirre should have stayed home. Local baseball fans mourned today as they shuddered over what he did to the Los Angeles Angels.

The Azusa, Calif., native son celebrated his first homecoming of 1963 in the livery of the Detroit baseball club Thursday by hurling the Tigers to a 3-0 shutout in which he gave up only four singles.

Aguirre learned his baseball on the sandlots of San Gabriel Valley and at east Los Angeles Junior College but was signed by

the Cleveland organization originally and later traded to Detroit. Manager Bob Scheffing originally had planned to use Jim Bunning as his Memorial Day pitcher but switched to Aguirre who had hoped to look forward to hurrying before his family and friends.

And he delighted 22 relatives in the stands with his brilliant exhibition in which he gave up only one walk. Only once, in the sixth inning, did he allow a man to get as far as third base and then he retired the next two batters to end the lone threat.

Aguirre's performance was the first Detroit shutout against Los Angeles since July 9, 1961, when Frank Lary delivered a 1-0 blanking.

While he pitched well enough to win most games, ex-yankee Bob Turley was charged with the loss although he gave up only one run in the six innings he worked on a leadoff homer in the third by infielder Jake Wood.

During his mound stint, Turley struck out nine Tigers to equal the best effort by any Angel pitcher this season. And the can-

ny veteran twice had to pitch himself out of trouble as he loaded the bases in the second and sixth innings. The second time he filled them with none out but still emerged without giving up a run.

Gus Slams One

Gus Triandos homered off Art Fowler, the fourth Angel hurler, in the eighth inning and the Tigers picked up another run charged to Fowler in the ninth when Rigney used two more pitchers to run the Angel total to a half-dozen moundsmen.

The league-leading Baltimore Orioles open a three-game series here tonight with Dan Osinski, 2-1, starting for the Angels and Milt Pappas, 4-0, for the visitors.

The Angels were hopeful that history would repeat itself against the Orioles despite their quick start to the top this season. Last year Los Angeles won seven of nine games against the Orioles here and ended the season with a 10-8 record against them. In their only series this year at Baltimore, the Angels won two of three games.

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
