SF Giants Pad NL Lead As LA Dodgers Stumble

Remember how the great Citation used to toy with the opposition, allowing horses to pull within a length of the lead before showing 'em his heels?

The San Francisco Giants seemingly are employing the same tactics in dealing with the Los Angeles Dodgers in this year's National League pennant race.

The Dodgers trailed the Giants by only one game Wednesday morning but then Alvin Dark's defending champs put together a pair of victories over the Cincinnati Reds to roll past the Memorial Day "quarter pole" with a 2½-game lead.

The Giants, though, are cutting 'em close these days. They needed solo homers by rookie second baseman Cap Peterson and Felipe Alou, plus Bob Bolin's sturdy relief pitching, in outlasting the Reds 5-4, in the holiday's only night game. They beat Cincinnati by the same score Wednesday night.

Peterson hit his first major league home run in the fifth inning off loser Joe Nuxhall to boost San Francisco's lead to 3-0. Alou led off the sixth with his 11th homer of the season and Billy O'Dell drove in what proved to be the winning run with a single later in the inning.

O'Dell, coasting along with a three-hit shutout at that point, was nicked for two runs in the bottom of the sixth. The Reds tallied two more in the seventh before Bolin came out of the bullpen and struck out Leo Cardenas with two on. Bolin later retired the last six Reds in order to preserve O'Dell's eighth victory without a loss.

Pirates by winning the nightcap 6-5, after absorbing a 7-1 loss, and the St. Louis Cardinals whipped the Houston Colts 9-5.

In the American League, the Minnesota Twins downed the Washington Senators 3-2 for their 10th straight victory; the New York Yankees nipped the Boston Red Sox 6-5 in 10 innings; the Kansas City A's walloped the Baltimore Orioles 7-2; the Detroit Tigers blanked the Los Angeles Angels 3-0, and the Chicago White Sox beat the Cleveland Indians twice, 8-4 and 4-2.

Hook Pitches Shutout
Jay Hook pitched a two-hit shutout and Duke Snider drove in both runs with a homer and a

single to snap the Cubs' four-game winning streak. In the opener, the Cubs sent 16 men to the plate during a wild fourth inning. They collected six hits, seven walks and 10 runs during the frame to ease Larry Jackson to his seventh win.

The Pirates won their opener behind Don Cardwell, who scattered five to win his first game since the opening week of the season. Wes Covington hit a two-run pinch homer for the Phils in the nightcap but the winning run was produced when Tony Taylor squeezed home Bobby Wine.

The Cardinals took advantage of five Houston errors; to score eight unearned runs. Ray Sadecki picked up the victory, although he needed relief help from Ed Bauta. Stan Musial hit a three-run homer for the Cardinals.

OSU Spikers End Long Drought, Batter Oregon's Ducks, 79-66

EUGENE (UPI) — Oregon State's track forces ended 15 years of frustration Thursday with a stunning 79-66 victory over arch-rival Oregon, the defending national collegiate champion.

The Webfoots had won 17 dual meets in a row from the Beavers since Bill Bowerman became Oregon coach in 1948. Oregon, in fact, had tripped coach Sam Bell's Beavers 89-85 in a meet earlier this year.

The pivotal events Thursday were two Oregon specialties, the mile and the two-mile. Oregon State's Morgan Groth won them both, the mile in 4:04.3 and the two-mile in 9:13.7. Teammate Jerry Brady was at Groth's shoulder in the latter.

Keith Forman, Oregon's sub-four minute miler, ran third in his return after being sidelined for two weeks by a foot injury.

The Beavers swept the intermediate hurdles and picked up five points when Oregon was disqualified in the 440 relay for passing far out of its lane.

Oregon had a pair of double winners in Mel Renfro and Dave Blunt. Renfro won the broad jump at 24-2 and the high hurdles in 14.1 seconds. Blunt captured the 100 in 9.6 and 220 in 21.4.

Three meet records fell, two to Oregon. Gerry Moro won the pole vault at 15½ and Paul Stuber high jumped 6-11¼. OSU's Gary Stenlund broke meet and Hayward Field records with a javelin throw of 259-1½.

Tentative Big Game Regulations Eliminate Controlled Deer Hunts

The game commission pulled in on the check reins for deer hunters but allowed similar elk and antelope hunts as last year as it set the tentative big game regulations for 1963 at its public hearing in Portland Friday and Saturday, May 24 and 25.

Eliminated this year from the deer hunts will be all controlled hunts which last year numbered 24,850 tags allowing hunters to take one or more deer, plus the reduction of 37,750 in the number of unit permits to be issued for the 1963 seasons. The unit permit reduction was from 135,100 in 1962 to 97,350 for the coming season.

The commission allowed a three-week general buck season from Sept. 28 through Oct. 20 under the tentative regulations. As in the past, hunters would be restricted to bucks with forked-horns west of the Cascades and bucks with visible antlers east of the Cascades.

One week was lopped off the unit hunts from last year with the season for permit holders set for Oct. 12 through 20. The commission made a general reduction in unit permit quotas, although in the northwest and northeast regions the number remained consistent with last year. The heaviest reduction in unit permits took place in central and southeast Oregon.

where poor fawn production prevailed.

By region, in the northwest the commission would allow the issuance of 51,000 permits compared to 57,000 last year; southwest region 8,300 compared to 17,700 a year ago; central Oregon region, 5,700 compared to 12,800; southeast region, 5,050 compared to 14,500; and in the northeast region, 27,500 compared to 35,100 a year ago.

An early high Cascade buck season from Sept. 7 through 15 would give 8,000 permit holders an opportunity to hunt the high country prior to inclement weather; the Minam Pack area would again be available to Minam permit holders for a nine-day hunt, and the early wildpout - Mapleton hunt would again be available to hunters Aug. 31, Sept. 1-2, and 7-8.

A total of 14 extended hunts would be on the docket, most of which will run for short periods in November. These seasons would be available to unused tag holders with respective unit permits. All extended hunts are in problem areas which would be taken care of by permit holders rather than the controlled hunts of last year.

The general elk season would be comparable to last year, Oct. 26 through Nov. 11 in the coast range and Oct. 26 through Nov. 24 in the Cascades, northeastern Oregon and southeastern Oregon areas. Bag limits would remain the same as last year.

The Clatsop, Wilson, Trask and Dixon units (a permit basis) would be hunted on a permit basis only. Antlered elk seasons in northeastern Oregon units would be almost the same as last year with a slight reduction in permit quotas from 3,400 last year to 3,200 this year. The Mill Creek permit hunt would be Nov. 9 through 17, and the Shaw Mountain hunt would be Dec. 14 through 31.

An increase of 50 tags would be allowed for the antelope hunts with the addition of one new area, the Interstate, available to hunters this year. The season would extend from Aug. 17 through 21. A total 650 tags would be issued for the seven antelope areas. Antelope hunters would be allowed to draw in a party of not more than two.

The commission made several revisions in the southwest region units to more effectively manage the big game resources in this area.

Safety To Be Featured In Championship Battle

LAS VEGAS, Nev., (UPI) — Added safety precautions will be taken Saturday when world light heavyweight champion Harold Johnson and Willie Pastrano meet in a title bout at Convention Center.

The chief second of either fighter will be able to stop the fight by climbing on the apron of the ring and signaling the referee. Also, the chief medical officer in attendance can stop the fight after consulting with a second Athletic Commission doctor at ringside.

Johnson sparred four rounds Monday and Pastrano two as they neared the conclusion of preparations for the bout. Johnson, 34, of Philadelphia now has gone 74 training rounds while Pastrano, 27 Miami Beach Fla., has sparred 46 rounds.

Golfdom's Big Trio Missing From '500' Festival Open

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — One of golf's richest tournaments, the \$55,000 "500" Festival Open, begins today and strangely, one of the "little people" probably will pick up the check.

Only four of the top 10 money winners are in the game this year, and none of the "big three"—Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, and Gary Player—were to compete.

This clears the way for some one who can use the money to earn the \$10,000 first prize.

It might be Doug Ford, for instance, who won the first two tournaments run on the par 71 Speedway layout on which the course record is a nine-under-par 62.

Ford this year is 41st in earnings with \$7,365.

The course record holder and defending champion won't be in the running, either. Billy Casper, who set the mark three years ago before he triumphed last year, is out with a bad hand.

Tony Lema, winner at Memphis last week and second only to

Nicklaus in money winnings at \$44,296, fifth place money winner Julius Boros, eighth place Dan Sikes, and ninth place Dow Finsterwald are the only players in the top 10 who will compete.

But somebody further down the list could come through too, such as Bob Charles, Phil Rodgers, who had a 64 to win the pro-am event, Don January, Johnny Pott, Jack Burke, Tommy Bolt, Billy Maxwell, Dave Ragan, or Jerry Barber.
