

Roseburg Legion 9 Tops Ashland, 6-1, Hobbled By Strong Central Point

Errors plagued the Roseburg American Legion Juniors as they opened the 1963 season with a swing through southwestern Oregon.

The Lockwood Motors crew came back with a 1-2 record from the road trip, with the victory coming in the season's opener, 6-1, at Ashland as lefty Ran Cool set the host team down on one hit and 18 strikeouts.

After winning Saturday's game with a minimum of trouble, the local crew found themselves on the short end of 7-6 and 4-3 scores in Sunday's twin bill at Camp White against the Central Point Cheney Studs.

Cool and Mike Blomberg, a pair of players from Drain, emerged as the heroes in Saturday's battle. Cool was in top form as he batted 18 Ashland batters for a new career record for the little southpaw. His previous high for a seven-inning game had been 17.

In going the distance Cool displayed a moving fast ball and a variety of curves to hobble the host team. The lone hit was a bunt single by Clyde Nelson in the fourth frame, and Cool issued two walks. Blomberg came through in the power department with the first home run of the season. The powerful left fielder drilled a liner over the right-center field fence in the fourth, driving in Dave Sevall in front of him.

First Run

Roseburg opened the scoring in Saturday's game in the second inning as Tom Morrison led off with a walk, stole second and went to third on Lance Casebeer's scratch single. Bob Kinyon hit a grounder to the short-stop and on the try for a double play the second baseman dropped the ball as Morrison raced home.

In the fourth the local crew extended for four runs. Kinyon walked to start the rally and went to third on Sevall's single to right. Eddie McDonald lofted a fly to center field with Kinyon scoring over the catch. Blomberg then blasted his fourth home run. Bob Manning kept the rally alive with a triple and Jim Beamer followed with a double.

An insurance run crossed the plate in the sixth on a fielder's choice and two errors.

Ashland's run came in the fourth on the bunt single by Nelson, an error and a fielder's choice.

The story changed radically at Camp White Sunday as the Cheney Studs rapidly proved they were not to be taken lightly. The host team jumped out to 2-0 leads in the first innings of both games.

In the opener the Central Point team started off fast as Mike Glines was safe on a throwing error and Lou Alvarez was hit by pitcher Dick Williams. The two runners advanced on Dave Twedell's sacrifice bunt and both scored as Neil Rivenburg laced a single to left.

Roseburg came back with a single run in the second when Morrison blasted a triple to right and scored when the throw got by the short-stop. Two counters in the third put the visitors on top. Williams led off with a single and McDonald laid down a bunt just out of reach of the pitcher for a base hit. Both runners advanced on a wild pitch and both scored on Blomberg's smash to center field.

McDonald injured. However, the rally proved costly to the Lockwood Motors crew as McDonald suffered a severely sprained ankle sliding into home plate and the flashy short-stop may be out of action for several days.

Central Point exploded for five runs in the fifth on four hits and three Roseburg errors. John Weiser was safe on a hobble to start the rally, but was forced at second by Bob Stroh. Successive singles by Glines, Alvarez and Twedell, plus a throwing error accounted for two runs. Darrell Summerfield was intentionally walked to load the bases, and Rivenburg forced in a run when he worked his way for a free pass. Another error allowed the fourth run to score before Clay singled in the final tally.

Roseburg made a comeback in the seventh as Sevall led off with a single, then was replaced on the basepaths by Jon Burnham. Ron Westbrook walked and an error on a strike out loaded the bases with two away. An error on Beamer's grounder scored two runs, and set the scene for a dandy rhabarb.

With runners at first and third, Beamer purposely got caught in a run-down, with Manning scoring from third. However, the plate umpire declared time out had been called because a Roseburg bat and

batting helmet were laying too close to the field. After a slight flare-up of tempers the tying run was sent back to third and Beamer returned to first. Beamer tried again, but Cheney Studs weren't biting a second time, and when Morrison was called out on strikes the contest was over.

In his losing effort Williams was tagged for five hits, walked two, hit one batter and struck out six. Clay gave up six hits and walked two while whiffing 10. Both teams had six errors in the game.

Errors Costly

Errors put the local team in trouble in the five-inning second game as four errors and two walks added up to two runs in the first inning.

Roseburg took the lead with a three-run outburst in the third, but single runs by Central Point in the third and fourth frames spelled defeat.

The rally for the local squad started with a walk to Burnham. Burnham went to second on a sacrifice by Blomberg and scored on Manning's line-shot double to left. An error kept the hopes alive and Mike Markham stole second. Kinyon singled to deep right scoring two.

Willie Jones led off for the Cheney Studs in the third with a single, but was picked off at second by Markham on a steal attempt. Neal Ellis followed with a double to right-center which touched off another argument. Coach Bill Harper, and most of the Roseburg team, tried in vain to convince the base umpire that Ellis had been out

sliding into second—and from the view in the stands an argument was in order.

While the Roseburg team was busy voicing its beef, Ellis raced to third. From third Ellis came home on an error on the relay of an attempted twin-killing.

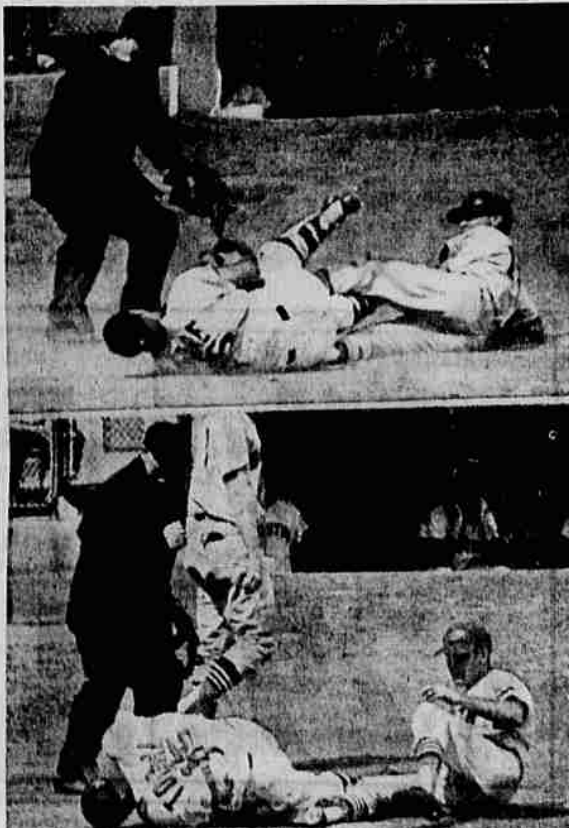
The winning run in the fourth was the result of three errors. Alvarez was safe on an error, took the next two bases when a pick-off throw got by the first baseman and scored on a throwing error at the plate after Summerfield had beaten out an infield hit.

Westbrooks, who came on in the third inning in relief of Burnham was charged with the loss. Larry Pepper picked up his second win of the young season for the Central Point team.

Tuesday the Lockwood Motors team will attempt to get back in the winner's circle when it invades Sweet Home for a double-bill at 7 p.m.

Herbel Leads Giants' Surge; Beavers Split With Spokane

Bob Garibaldi gets the headlines but Ron Herbel writes the scripts for the front-running Tacoma Giants of the Pacific Coast League's northern division.

Unheralded Herbel, a 25-year-old righthander from Brighton, Colo., was signed to a contract by the San Francisco Giants for practically peanuts while it took bonus loot in excess of \$130,000 to lure Garibaldi off the Santa Clara Campus.

Now it looks like the Giants might have given the bonus stipend to the wrong pitcher. Garibaldi received rough treatment from Denver yesterday and ended up losing 6-2 to the Bears. He was relieved by John Pregoner in the seventh after giving up five runs.

In the nightcap, Herbel pitched the full seven innings and scattered four hits in downing the Bears, 3-1. It brought Herbel's record to 6-5 while Garibaldi was losing his second game after winning six.

But records don't tell the full story. The game was Herbel's seventh route-going performance of the PCL season. This is the best in the league. Herbel also owns an earned-run average in the vicinity of 2.60. Garibaldi's ERA is 4.30-plus and he has pitched five complete games.

Denver unleashed a 15-hit attack on Garibaldi, Pregoner and two other Tacoma pitchers in the opener. Outfielder Ethan Blackaby paced Denver's attack with three safeties which ran his hit streak to seven in a row against Tacoma. Denver leftfielder Corky Withrow swatted a two-run double.

In other games, Moe Drabowsky of Portland threw a three-hitter at Spokane for a 1-0 victory after Spokane won the opener 11-3; Hawaii scored three times in the eighth to nip Dallas-Ft. Worth 9-8 but the Islanders dropped the nightcap 9-5, and San Diego reliever John Flavin walked in the winning run for a 4-3 Oklahoma City victory.

USC Wins Playoff Series From OSU

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Southern California captured the NCAA District 8 baseball title Saturday by defeating Oregon State 7-5 in the second game of a doubleheader after losing the first contest 8-6.

The win gave Southern California a 2-1 series victory and advanced it into the NCAA championship tournament at Omaha June 10-14.

Southern California wrapped up the nightcap with two runs each in the seventh and ninth innings. Willie Brown hit a two-run single in the seventh. Bud Hollowell hit his second home run of the day and Brown scored on a throwing error in the ninth.

In the first game, Oregon State scored six runs in the first inning on seven walks and a two-run single by Jimmy Jarvis.

Dennis Straub went the nine-inning distance for the Beavers, striking out 15.

Schroeder Captures Crown In Roseburg Amateur Play

Stew Schroeder, Corvallis, emerged victorious in the Roseburg Amateur Golf Tournament Saturday at the Roseburg Country Club.

Schroeder fired a blistering one under par to defeat Leighton Tuttle, Portland, in the championship finals, 4 and 3. Tuttle plays out of the Columbia-Edgewater Golf Club.

To reach the finals, Schroeder topped John Snyder, Lebanon, 3 and 2 in the semifinals, and Tuttle edged Rob Swingle of Corvallis, 4 and 3.

The lanky Corvallis golfer replaces Tom Shaw as champion of the Roseburg tourney. Shaw, representing the University of Oregon, captured the crown in 1962 before turning pro.

Albany's Chuck Sivers won the first flight championship as he defeated Bob Ring of Roseburg, 4 and 3. Mike Dunham, Corvallis, took the honors in the second flight by defeating the pre-tourney favorite, Ken Leonard, Portland, 1 up, in the finals of the second flight.

Roseburg's lone flight victories came in the sixth and ninth flights. Steve Smith, a member of the Roseburg High School team, defeated George Luoma, also of Roseburg, 4 and 3 in the sixth flight. Don Josh won the ninth flight by edging Roger Swengel, Roseburg, 2 and 1.

Carl Schmidt, Medford, had the low gross score in the senior medal play with a three round total of 229. Mary Clark of Grants Pass followed with a 236 and Don McPike of Portland was third with a 237.

The low net score in the senior medal play was posted by William Ralston of Lake Oswego who had a three-day total of 215. Al Henninger, formerly of Roseburg and now living in Sacramento, and Judd Coryell of Portland had identical 219 net scores for the three rounds, while Charlie Kash of Winston followed with a 222.

Medalist honors in the qualifying action Memorial Day were won by Dennis Murphy of Eugene. Murphy fired a 71 to top the field.
