

JFK Notes Need For Military-Political Ties

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (UPI)—President Kennedy said today the Cuban crisis last fall demonstrated that military policy and power must be tied closely to political and diplomatic decisions in the future.

"Whatever the military motives and implications of that reckless attempt to place offensive missiles on the island of Cuba may have been, the political and psychological motives and implications were equally important," Kennedy said.

The chief executive flew to Colorado Springs on the first leg of

a four-day Western inspection and speaking trip. In a commencement address at the U.S. Air Force Academy Stadium here, Kennedy told the young Air Force officers that the nation would need military commanders "who can foresee the effects of military moves on the whole fabric of international power."

Cope With Challenge

"We need men who can cope with the challenge of new political situations as well as new enemy weapons — who can keep their forces flexible as well as reliable, and alert without being trigger

happy," he said. "For we live in a world where the principal problems are not susceptible of military solutions alone."

In his prepared remarks, Kennedy attacked the suggestion that an Air Force career was "mortgaged to an obsolete weapons system, the manned aircraft."

The President said there was no truth to the forecast that Air Force officers of the future would be "nothing more than so-called 'silent sitters'."

Fly Fastest Planes

"Some of you will fly the fastest planes, reach the highest alti-

tudes and lift the heaviest payloads of any aviator in history," he told the graduates. "Some of you will hold in your hands the most awesome destructive power that man has ever conceived."

"Some of you will work with the new leaders of new nations which were not even nations a few years ago. Some of you will support guerrilla and counter-guerrilla operations that combine the newest techniques of warfare with the oldest techniques of the jungle."

"And some of you will help to develop new planes that spread

their wings in flight, detect other planes at unheard of distances, deliver new weapons with unprecedented accuracy and survey the ground from incredible heights."

Thus the President pictured what he called the "onrush of technology" which he predicted would lead to a constantly expanding role for the U.S. Air Force.

Kennedy also said the greatest value of "these new weapons of massive retaliation" lay in their ability to deter the very war which would require their use.

Pacific Northwest Strike Move Idles Plant In Roseburg

International Woodworkers of America pickets were posted at the United States Plywood Corporation plant in Roseburg at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday, as 350 employees of that plant went on strike in line with a general strike of IWA workers against U. S. Plywood plants throughout the Pacific Northwest.

Workers at all other Roseburg area plants remained on the job Wednesday.

Norman Lee, business manager of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Local No. 2949 said plans here call for LSW members to remain on the job until further notice. He said there were no strike actions anticipated in the near future.

The IWA employees at all other plants in the Roseburg area also remained on the job. Assistant business manager Verdo Ligon said there were no other walkouts indicated for the immediate future by IWA workers here.

Area Talks Set

Lee said the LSW will hold talks with rank and file union members at all plants in the area this week to discuss general conditions. IWA's local business manager Marvin Williams remained in Portland for union-wide discussions of the situation Wednesday, but was scheduled to return to Roseburg Wednesday night.

About 5,000 members of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers (LSW) unions went on strike at midnight Tuesday against 13 operations of U. S. Plywood Corp. and St. Regis Timber Co.

Negotiations between the unions and the so-called "Big Six" lumber firms in the Pacific Northwest and Northern California broke down Tuesday afternoon.

A spokesman for the unions said negotiations were terminated with the two firms and "discontinued" against the other four large companies—Weyerhaeuser, Crown Zellerbach, International Paper and Rayonier.

Talks also were discontinued with the Timber Operators Council (TOC), which represents 196 separate operations from Alaska to Northern California. No strike against the TOC or the four large firms was planned at the time, a spokesman said.

Contracts between the employers and the unions expired last Saturday.

One company remained in negotiations with the unions — Scott Paper Co. Talks were scheduled for Thursday.

An LSW spokesman said talks would be carried on with Georgia-Pacific Corp. at "some future time." The company is not a member of the big six.

Demands Cut

The IWA said it had scaled down its demands from a 40-cent hourly increase over three years to 35 cents. The LSW had asked 60 cents per hour over the three years.

Unions also sought pay for travel time and benefits in some job classifications.

Harvey Nelson of the IWA said the employer group had offered in wages, 8.5 cents per hour for 1963, five cents for 1964 and 2.14 cents per cent in 1965. About 79,000 workers are in the two unions in the West.

Nelson indicated this would be a "selective" strike — that is, against those employers who are able to withstand a strike.

The last general strike was in 1954.

A spokesman for the Big Six said no action was planned immediately to meet the strike. However, he said that the members would meet today to plan a course of action. He said it was not known if a lock-out was planned by the four members of the Big Six.

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Violent Rioting Erupts In Iran

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI)—Violent anti-government rioting by Moslem religious groups opposed to political and economic reforms erupted in Iran today.

Eight persons were reported killed and at least 30 injured in clashes with police and troops.

Demonstrators set fire to several government buildings and vehicles.

The government said it had the situation under control, but machine gun fire could be heard throughout Tehran and tanks were patrolling the streets. Machine

guns were set up at key points throughout this capital and other cities.

First unofficial reports said two demonstrators were killed and 30 injured in Tehran. Another six were reported killed in rioting in the oil-rich holy city of Qum, but this report was not confirmed by the government.

The rioting broke out following the arrest of Moslem religious leader Ruhollah Khomeini. He was arrested after similar riots Tuesday.

Seven rows of machine gun-equipped troops lined up in front of the palace of Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi, whose land reforms and political changes including giving women the right to vote are bitterly opposed by the old line, conservative religious groups and landlords.

Other troops cordoned off all major roads leading to the palace and other government buildings.

All government offices were closed and the city took on the appearance of a besieged fortress.

Minister of State Jehangir Tafazzoli told United Press International, "So far we have received no definite report of any deaths having occurred in today's riots."

Denies Death Reports

Tafazzoli said one report that "many were killed and injured" is so "exaggerated as not to merit any denial... it is absolutely false and without foundation."

Gen. Hassan Pakravan, assistant premier and the security chief, told a news conference this morning the government has decided to take drastic measures to crush the opposition.

Pakravan said the movement to disrupt order was financed from outside Iran, and he hinted that United Arab Republic President Gamal Abdel Nasser was behind it.

Asked specifically if he felt Nasser was responsible for the disorders, Pakravan said indications were very strong that Nasser was masterminding the religious demonstrations against the Iranian government.

Oregon OES Names Area Woman Chief

The youngest Oregon worthy grand matron of Order of Eastern Star was elected Tuesday in Portland.

She is Mrs. John (Virginia) Wright of Myrtle Creek. Her installation into office will take place Thursday at the Memorial Coliseum in Portland. The public is invited to the 8 p.m. affair. Mrs. Wright will preside over the grand chapter's 75th anniversary celebration next year.

The new worthy grand matron is a native of Douglas County. She joined Eastern Star with her husband in 1947. Since then, she has been extremely active in Valentine Chapter. She has held all five star points and all four elective offices. She was the chapter's worthy matron in 1956. In 1955, she received her first appointment in grand chapter, serving as grand page. The following year, she served as the honor guard and in 1958, she served as Grand Martha for the state. She was also Southern Oregon vice president in 1956.

The whole Wright family has been active in Masonic work in Myrtle Creek. John Wright served as master of Maple Lodge in 1936, and their daughter, Bonnie has been to Bethel 18. The girl would have been installed as honored queen this term, except that she is leaving June 30 for a year in Germany as an exchange student. Strike At Reedsport Halts U. S. Plywood Construction

The United States Plywood Company's Reedsport operations were silenced at 7 a.m. Wednesday by pickets of the IWA and Pinkerton guards, who are sharing the strike vigil, correspondent Mrs. Dawn Peseau said.

Affected at the present time are 65 production employees engaged in the production of veneer and chips; 70 or 80 loggers, employed by two contract logging operations; and 50 construction workers, under the jurisdiction of the Coos Bay Locals of the Millwrights Union, Electricians Union, Boilermakers Union and Steamfitters Union.

Every effort is being made, according to Joe Ayers, superintendent of the U. S. Plywood construction operation, and Jim Bagley, general manager of the Reedsport plant, to clear the way for construction to resume. The construction work is handled by the company and two contractors on electrical work and the boiler house.

The construction is on the new sheeting plant, which will manufacture finished plywood products. It is expected to employ an additional 80 men when completed.

The company has maintained a separate entrance designated for construction workers only. According to Bagley and Ayers, construction workers only were admitted at this entrance.

The International Paper Co. operations were continuing Wednesday morning. That firm employs about 650 men in the plywood mill, sawmill and logging operations. They also have construction work under way on a new sawmill, as well as a pulp and paper plant on a separate site.

Paper Mill Strike Appears Possible

PORTLAND (UPI)—A strike by 20,000 employees at 48 pulp and paper mills on the Pacific Coast appeared as a possibility today after they rejected a proposed contract in a referendum vote announced Tuesday.

The contract offered by the Pacific Coast Association of Pulp and Paper Manufacturers was a 2.745 by members of the United Papermakers and Paperworkers and the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers.

The mills are located in Oregon, Washington and California.

George A. Robertson, a union spokesman, played down the possibility of a strike. He said the union would ask for further meetings with the association in an attempt to resolve the differences.

"This is the third time in the 29 years of bargaining history between the parties that a final offer of the employers has been rejected," he said.

"As yet, there has never been a strike in the West Coast industry."

The proposed contract called for a pay increase of 7 1/2 cents an hour plus 2 cents in fringe benefits.

U. S. 'Speaking' Again With Haiti

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (UPI)—The U. S. Embassy announced late Tuesday that Charge d'Affaires Edward G. Curtis has been instructed to resume normal relations with President Francois Duvalier's government.

Although the United States had not broken off relations with Haiti, embassy officials had not been speaking to the government.

The embassy announcement said Ambassador Raymond L. Thurston, who is in Washington for "consultations," will remain there for a few more days.

The embassy said also that about 30 members of the U.S. naval and air missions whose withdrawal has been demanded by Duvalier were preparing to leave the country.

Jury Decides Guse Guilty

The jury took just 24 minutes to convict Joseph Frank Guse, 27, of 1351 SE Mill St., Roseburg of burglary on a dwelling on trial before Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodrich Tuesday.

The trial opened at 10 a.m., with selection of a jury and presentation of its case by the state. Guse's attorney, George Neuner, moved for a directed verdict at the close of the state's testimony, but this was denied by the judge.

He did not put on a defense, and Guse did not take the stand. The jury took the case at 2:38 p.m. and returned its verdict at 3:22. Sentencing was set by Judge Woodrich for 9:30 a.m. Thursday.

Guse was charged with burglarizing the office of the R. A. Briggs & Son Logging Co. on SE Ramp Rd. Feb. 18 by forcibly breaking an outer window of the building and entering with intent to commit larceny.

One check, allegedly taken in the burglary, which was passed with an alleged forged signature at the Food Mart in Roseburg was introduced in evidence. The check was in the sum of \$234.88. An office employee of Briggs testified the signature was not that of anyone authorized to sign payroll checks on the Briggs firm.

A forgery charge against Guse still pending.

Rodeo Ride Postponed

Because of uncertain weather conditions and the illness of a chaperone the ride of the Douglas County Rodeo queen and her court from Yoncalla to Sutherlin has been postponed, according to an announcement from the rodeo association. If possible the ride will be held at a later date before the rodeo.

Freida Blamed

Hurricane Freida, which ripped through the Oregon coastal area last Oct. 12, is still being felt in Douglas County, with the most recent impact of the violent storm causing a planned cutback in the Douglas County budget for 1963-64.

The hurricane's connection with the budget comes in the form of O&C timber funds, which the county is estimating will provide some \$370,000 less income than for the previous year.

The cutbacks will be in the road fund, which shows a decrease from \$5,175,703 for the year ending June 30 to \$4,484,450 for the coming year. The County Budget Committee determined the most logical places to make the cutback would be in bridge construction, new paving and capital outlay for the road department.

Major increases in the general fund section of the budget for the coming year will be in the juvenile department and the health department.

The juvenile department budget is up from \$62,130 to \$81,810. Prime cause of the increase is the addition of a pilot project boys' camp. The juvenile authorities will locate a special camp for boys whom they feel should not be sent to the MacLaren School for Boys, but for whom they are unable to find foster homes.

The pilot boys' camp will be located on county park property near the Winchester Bridge which is being closed for park purposes because of highway construction.

The health department budget shows an increase from \$148,024 to \$226,670. The bulk of this increase will go for installation of sanitary land fills throughout the county. This project is being undertaken to do away with health problems caused by persons dumping garbage at various locations throughout the county where there are no facilities for sanitary treatment. The state sanitary authorities are cooperating with the county on this project.

The county parks department budget is down to \$146,724 for the coming year. The \$200,000 Winchester Bay project had pushed it up to \$331,543 last year.

The public welfare budget is down from \$286,648 to \$264,613 because of changes in the amount of state participation in medical aid to the aged and improved general economic conditions, which decreased the general assistance portion of the budget.

Total anticipated revenues from O&C funds for the coming year will be \$3,740,950, as compared to \$4,016,950 last year. Of these funds, \$2,105,242 are allocated in the general fund and \$1,475,950 in the road fund.

The decrease is brought about by the fact the blowdown timber being sold as a result of the Oct. 12, 1962, hurricane has been selling for less than standing timber.

Forest Service Paymen Up

Anticipated U.S. Forest Service payment to the county is up from \$1,100,000 to \$1,320,000.

In the schools section of the county budget, the county will put \$763,478.50 in the county school fund and \$376,051.90 in the rural school fund as a tax offset.

Total general fund budget for the coming year is \$3,679,484.78, as compared to \$3,785,320 for last year.

A public hearing on the proposed budget for fiscal 1963-64 will be held at 10 a.m. June 25, in the County Court auditorium. There is no election required, as there will be no tax levy outside the 6 per cent limitation. The tax base will increase to \$811,941.11 for the coming year. The full county budget appears in a legal advertisement in today's News-Review.

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Big Highway Contract Let For Douglas

Morse Brothers Construction Co. of Lebanon and Beckley & Thomas of Roseburg were awarded a contract for \$1,038,888 for construction of the Winchester-South Umpqua River section of the Pacific Highway (Interstate 5) by the Highway Department Tuesday.

Contract for construction of the bridge to make this section of the highway a four-lane divided highway, has already been awarded and work has been started.

When work on the contract let Tuesday is completed the only portion of the highway in Douglas County and north to Portland which will not be completed for four-lane travel will be the section from Winchester to Sutherlin.

The contract awarded Tuesday calls for grading, paving and signing of the Winchester-South Umpqua River section of the highway.

Another contract awarded by the Highway Department Tuesday was to Roseburg Paving Co. for \$18,182 for a section of city street grading and paving in Sutherlin.

Also dealing with Interstate Highway 5, a contract for \$36,510 for roadside improvements between Goshen and Cottage Grove was awarded to Knight & Percy of Salem.

Largest contract awarded by the Highway Department Tuesday was \$5,896,358 to Gibbons and Reed of Salt Lake City, Utah, for work on the Cello-Biggs section of the Columbia River Highway in Wasco and Sherman Counties.

Pilot Escapes Injury In Crash Of Helicopter

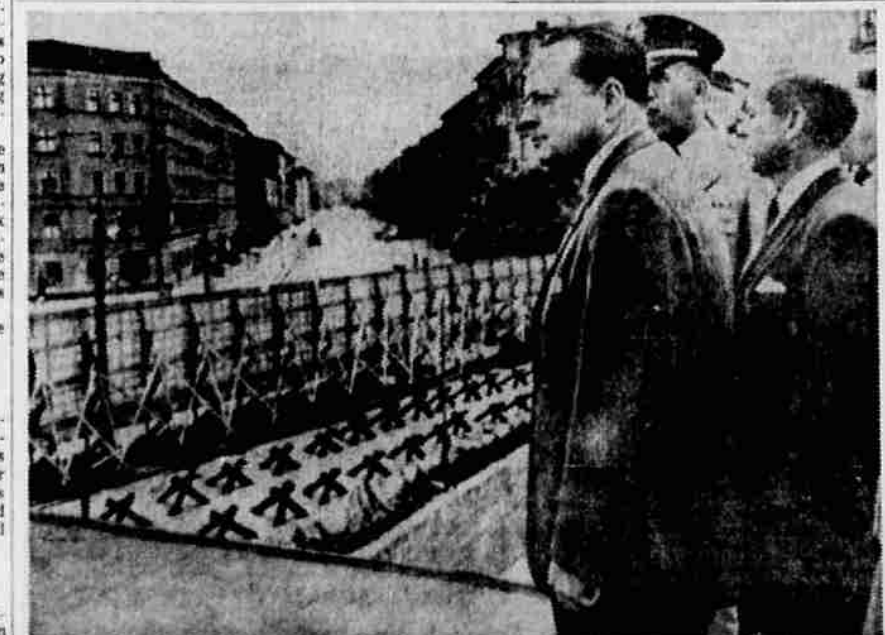
WILLAMINA (UPI)—Capt. Paul James Blair of Oregon Army National Guard helicopter crashed in a field near here Tuesday.

Missing Area Lady Found

Mary Oden, 45, Myrtle Creek, missing in the Whiskey Camp area in the Jackson Creek drainage area near Tiller since Tuesday noon, was found this morning, according to a radio report from searchers to the Sheriff's department office today.

Details were not learned, except that Mrs. Oden was reported in good condition despite her overnight in the woods.

Tiller correspondent Mrs. Milton Hammerly earlier had reported search crews were scheduled to resume organized search this morning.

Mrs. Oden is the wife of a timber tapper on the crew of McCracken Logging Co. of Myrtle Creek. She and her husband have been residing in a trailer house in the logging camp.

The woman apparently failed to return from a walk, after leaving the camp about noon.

Logging crews searched Tuesday was learned. Report was made to the Cow Creek Ranger Station, which, according to Ranger John Wilson, alerted both the South Umpqua and Cow Creek districts.

Men from the ranger stations cooperated with the sheriff's department, under resident Deputy Don Soper, in the search. About 30 forest service men were taking part.
