S.P. Granted Fare Hike

SALEM (UPI) — The Oregon Public Utilities Commission today authorized Southern Pacific Railroad to increase its intrastate passenger fares 10 per cent beginning June 16.

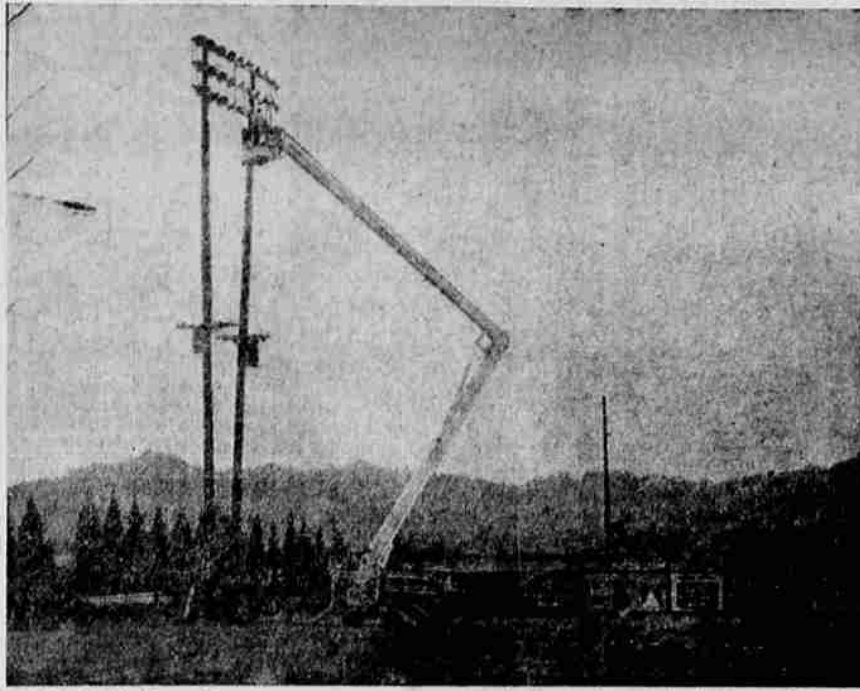
The increase will net SP \$7,600 a year, the PUC stated.
