

Taxpayers Will Need Extra Money To Pay New Tax Rate

SALEM (UPI) — Most Oregon taxpayers are going to have to dig deep in their pockets for extra money early next year when they file their 1963 income tax returns if the new tax hike goes into effect.

Tax Commission legal and accounting personnel were pondering the problem today.

They did not know which of several plans to adopt.

They were waiting to see if the new tax increase will be referred by the voters.

Tax Commission Chief Legal Counsel Carlisle B. Roberts said the new income tax would not become law until Sept. 2. This is 90 days after adjournment of the legislative session.

Legally the session ended at 12:09 a.m. June 4, the 142nd day of the session, although legislative records will show adjournment at 11:59 p.m. June 3, the 141st day.

Fallout Limitation Treaty Urged As Ban Replacement

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Republican spokesman said the United States and Britain should seek a treaty with Russia to limit radioactive fallout.

Rep. Craig Hosmer, Calif., urged an end to negotiations aimed at achieving a ban on atomic testing. He said "the whole course of Soviet intransigent non-negotiation in good faith on a comprehensive test ban is totally convincing evidence they do not want such a treaty."

Hosmer said in a speech prepared for the House that the United States and Britain should try to work out a treaty that Russia would accept, such as an agreement limiting fallout.

"It is long past time to get off the Geneva test ban merry-go-round," Hosmer said. He sug-

gested the talks take place somewhere other than Geneva, which he called an historically non-productive site.

Other congressional news:

Rights: Senate Republicans sought agreement on strategy that could mean life or death for President Kennedy's forthcoming civil rights program. Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., said he thought a majority of the 23 Republican senators would pledge support for "substantial" civil rights legislation, and for gagging a filibuster to get it passed.

Education: A group of congressmen intend to introduce legislation in the House soon to ban use of federal funds to assist segregated schools. The bill would amend five existing laws.

Ranch Ramblings

Lamb growers in the county will be interested in knowing that the lamb pool shipped on Saturday, June 1 brought 21½ cents, this would be \$21.10 net to the grower.

Also of interest to growers in the area will be the lambs shipped by Jim Lewis, our local buyer, which were shipped on Sunday, May 26 at a price of 21 cents. I think that we can be real happy in both cases for the lambs here in the county. The 21 cents price is within a half cent of Portland top, and when we figure that it costs 60 cents freight to get those lambs to Portland it wouldn't appear that there is much room for improvement in the price locally as compared to Portland.

Feeder Sale Eyed
We expect to be pooling all through the rest of June and the directors of our lamb and feeder sale are anticipating a feeder sale at the end of June or early in July for those of you who want to clean up some lambs at that time. We will be sorting for both fat and feeders and if we have an adequate number of lambs we hope to be able to interest some packer buyers in attending the sale.

The lamb show was on Saturday, June 1, and was well attended and participated in. We will try and give you details next week as to the winners particularly in each of the groups as it isn't possible to do it now as this column is written prior to the show.

Again, I would like to mention to all of you folks that are in the wool pool that as soon as you shear your sheep, notify us so that we can put you on the list as completed. We must know that you have sheared, before we can include you in the shipment. If we are able to ship around the 10th to the 15th of June, then those who have finished shearing and have notified us that have finished will be the ones who will be shipping. If you have sheared, but don't let us know we can't very well tell you to bring your wool in when we don't know that it's ready.

Haying Time Here
Haying is well upon us. A lot of the better quality of hay has been cut. Too often we put off cutting hay in the spring because of the chance of a shower, and then by the time we get around to cutting it, it is so ripe that it isn't really very good quality hay. Grasses and clover mixed should be cut for the grass, and these should be cut when the grass blooms or before. After the grass blooms, the protein quality drops rather rapidly. It becomes coarse and makes much less palatable and nutritious feed for livestock. There will be some increase in total tonnage, but in pounds of digestible nutrients it usually will decline following the flower stage of the grasses. As for alfalfa, it should be cut at one tenth bloom or before. This means that when a few blooms are showing in the fields, it should be cut. In the early cuttings it seems to be quite helpful to cut it before it reaches any bloom at all. Much of the alfalfa has a tendency to get too coarse before we get it down and, consequently this makes for a poor quality of feed.

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Blueberry Bran Buds Muffins
1 cup Bran Buds (whole bran cereal with wheat germ)
¼ cup milk
1 egg
¼ cup soft shortening
1 cup sifted flour
2½ teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
¼ cup sugar
¼ cup fresh blueberries, washed and drained
Combine Bran Buds and milk; let stand until most of moisture is taken up. Add egg and shortening; beat well. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar; mix in blueberries. Add to Bran Buds mixture, stirring only until combined. Fill greased muffin pans 2/3 full. Bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 25 minutes. Serve immediately.

Nelson told the audience that advertisers did not have influence on news play.

Guiding Principles Set For Oregon Hospitals
PORTLAND (UPI)—Officials of the Oregon Association of Hospitals have announced that a set of guiding principles for most hospitals in the state will be put into effect June 15.

The OAH said purpose of the move was to assure high quality care and provide a standard for computing hospital bills. It said the statement of principles provided a standard system of charging for services, but did not set uniform rates.

Sister Francis Ignatius, president of the Portland Council, said hospital rates vary according to location, wage costs, size and other factors.
