

# Yankees Record Costly Victory—Mantle Injured

That's what rival American Leaguers call it and sometimes you have to wonder because it seems that even when they lose they win.  
Take Wednesday night when they lost the services of three-time Most Valuable Player Mickey Mantle for three weeks to a month. Disaster? Possibly in the future but not right now. Because

the Yankees not only beat the Baltimore Orioles 4-3, despite the loss of Mantle, but also regained possession of first place.

What's more, they scored the winning run on a tap back to the pitcher's mound that should have resulted in an inning-ending double play. No wonder American Leaguers insist somebody up there loves 'em!

The critical play came with the bases filled and one out in the eighth inning. The score was tied at 3-3 and Yogi Berra was making one of his infrequent appearances as a pinch-hitter. He tapped the ball back to the mound and Stu Miller fired it to catcher Dick Brown for the forceout at the plate.

So far, so good but in another instant so long, Orioles.

## Tresh Jars Brown

Because Tom Tresh, running from third base, jarred the ball out of Brown's hand as he prepared for the relay to first base. The ball squirted loose and in another second or two Roger Maris went chugging over the plate—the way from second base—with the winning run.

Whitely Ford yielded 13 hits but pitched his way out of numerous jams and wound up with his seventh win against three losses. Jackie Brandt and Brooks Robinson homered for the Orioles but Maris achieved a milestone when he hit No. 200 of his career for the Yankees.

The Los Angeles Angels beat the Chicago White Sox 8-2 after a 3-0 defeat, the Minnesota Twins defeated the Kansas City Athletics 4-0, and the Detroit Tigers topped the Cleveland Indians 5-4 in other AL action. The Boston-Washington game was rained out.

In the National League, the Chicago Cubs swept the San Francisco Giants 9-5 and 5-4, the Milwaukee Braves beat the New York Mets 11-9, the Pittsburgh Pirates whipped the Cincinnati Reds 5-4 and 4-3, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 6-0, and the Los Angeles Dodgers conquered the Houston Colts 5-1.

## Homers Win Game

Home runs by Jim Landis and Dave Nicholson and the nine-hit pitching of Johnny Buzhardt enabled the White Sox to win the first game of their two-nighter with the Angels. But the Angels rallied for seven runs in the sixth inning of the nightcap to split the double bill and give Ken McBride his fifth win. Albie Pearson went 2-for-5 in the first game and 4-for-5 in the second.

Richie Rollins knocked in three runs with a homer and two singles and Bob Allison hit his 15th homer for the Twins, who shut out the Athletics for the second straight game. Jim Roland went seven innings before retiring with an injured elbow and Bill Dailey finished the game.

Norm Cash's ninth-inning homer and Terry Fox's sturdy relief pitching for the last 1-2-3 innings gave Detroit's Jim Bunning his fourth victory. Jim Grant suffered his sixth loss against three wins for the Indians.

## Pee Wee Baseball Registration Set

Darl Thornton, coordinator of the Roseburg Pee Wee baseball program, announced that registration for summer ball will begin June 17.

The entire week of June 17-22 will be for registering, with the times and places to be announced in the near future. The Pee Wee season will run through Aug. 9.

Teams in three age groups will compete and leagues will be formed. The age groups are 8-9, 10-11 and 12-13.

The program is being sponsored by the Roseburg Kiwanis Club, the city and the school district.

Thornton will be at the head of the program for his first season. He is backfield coach for the Roseburg Indians in football, graduated from Idaho State College where he majored in physical education, and has played junior college, high school and Legion baseball.

# Harper Resigns To Take Position At Oregon State

Bill Harper, who has guided the destiny of Roseburg High School baseball teams for the past 11 years, resigned Wednesday night to join the staff of Oregon State University.

Harper, who will join the physical education staff at OSU this fall, said he hopes to be able to work into the athletic department in a couple of years. There is a possibility he will be able to draw some coaching assignments during his first year at OSU.

His letter of resignation was accepted by the Roseburg School Board Wednesday night.

The popular Indian coach, although his teams have been unable to claim a district high school championship, has enjoyed tremendous success as an American Legion Junior baseball mentor, winning the state championship in four

of his eight years at the helm of the Lockwood Motors nine.

He will remain head coach of the Lockwood team this summer, then move his family to Corvallis in late August.

This will not be Harper's first trip to the OSU campus, because his name was well known there as an athlete during his college days with the Beavers. He was graduated from OSU in 1951.

Following his graduation from college, Harper played one year of organized basketball with Stewart Chevrolet of San Francisco, a member of the National Industrial Basketball League, AAU.

He came to Roseburg in the fall of 1952 as head baseball and assistant basketball coach. From 1956-59 he served as head basket-

ball coach, taking the Indian cagers to the state tournament in 1958.

His record in the high school baseball circles includes three trips to the playoffs for the district title. On all three occasions, including this season, the Indians have been nosed out by the South Eugene Axemen.

In Legion activity, however, it's been a different story. Harper became coach of the Roseburg Legion squad nine years ago.

During the past eight years, his teams have won the district title seven times, have been in the state finals six times, and have won the state championship four times. They came in third in the Regional Tournament in 1959 before dropping the title to the Arizona team and finished third in the National playoffs in 1958.

Harper is a native of Modesto, Calif., and a graduate of Modesto High School, class of 1943. Prior to entering OSU, he served three years in the army air corps. In addition to his duties as a member of the OSU physical education department, he plans to do post graduate work toward his master degree this fall.

Harper and his wife Anne have two daughters, Barbara, a fifth grader, and 4-year-old Kim.

The popular Indian coach said that although pleased with his new job he regretted very much leaving Roseburg, because, "The people here have been just tremendous."

## Fishing Outlook Is Good For State

PORTLAND (UPI)—Here is this weekend's Oregon fishing outlook, prepared by the State Game Commission:

**Northwest:** Necanicum River good for hatchery cutthroat; some hatchery trout being taken in Nestucca River. Spring Chinook being taken in Tillamook Bay and a few in Trask River. Fair to good angling for rainbow trout in Mt. Hood area streams; best prospects in mid-Willamette Valley Abiqua and Butte Creeks, Big Luckiamute River, upper North Santiam and Little North Fork.

**Southwest:** Diamond Lake good to excellent; North and South Umpqua fair; Trout and Tenmile Lakes good; Coos River fair; Coquille River tributaries good; upper Rogue River and Illinois river fair; Salmon angling good in Rogue River above Gold Ray Dam, and in Coos Bay angling in lower Deschutes River, Kingsley Reservoir, Hood River and Rock Creek Reservoir, Ochoco Reservoir good; Prineville Reservoir fair; Deschutes river at Cove fair; Crooked River improving; Pelton Reservoir fair; East Lake fair to good; Paulina Lake fair; Elk Lake good; Suttle Lake, Blue Lake, Little Cultus Lake, Craine Prairie, Big Lava Lake, upper Deschutes River and Metolius Rivers good.

**North:** Bull Prairie Lake excellent; John Day system streams fair; Umatilla River fair; Columbia River below McNary Dam slow for bass and fair for sturgeon; Morgan Lake excellent; upper Grand Ronde good; Catherine Creek, Wallowa River slow.

**Southeast:** Owyhee Reservoir excellent for crappie and fair for bass. Most other lakes and streams fair to slow.

## Severson Selected As Head Baseball Coach For Indians

Don Severson was appointed Wednesday night to replace Bill Harper as head baseball coach for the Roseburg High School Indians.

Severson's appointment was made by Superintendent of Schools M. C. Deller, acting on the recommendation of athletic director Al Hoffman.

Deller also announced the hiring of former Roseburg High star Gerald Droscher as Severson's assistant.

Severson graduated from the University of Oregon in 1953 and received his master's degree in physical education from U of O in 1958. He has been in the Roseburg system since 1952 and has been head of the physical education department since 1956. He is a native of Albert Lee, Minn., and a 1941 graduate of Albert Lee High. He
