Title Bout Set Tonight

NEW YORK (UPI) — Emile Griffith predicted today he'll win the world welterweight crown in his return title fight with champion Luis Rodriguez at Madison Square Garden.

"And it'll be by a knockout if Rodriguez makes a fight of it instead of running and holding," the ex-champion declared.

The 15-round bout will be nationally televised, starting at 10 p.m. EDT.

Beating men apparently share some of Griffith's confidence. They've made him a 13-10 favorite to win.

But they apparently doubt the ability of either Emile or the Cuban champion from Miami Beach to score a knockout. It's 3-1 that the bout goes 15 scheduled distance. Neither champion nor challenger has ever been stopped.

Griffith, 25, of New York, is the 11th man to win the title twice in the welterweight division's 138-year history. None took it three times.

Emile is favored to turn the trick despite the fact that he lost the 147-pound crown to 26-year-old Rodriguez on a unanimous decision at Los Angeles March 31.

The verdict was unanimous but controversial. Co-managers Howard Albert and Gil Clancy charged that Griffith was "robbed."

Although tonight's fight is the second title tilt for Griffith and Rodriguez, it's actually their third and "rubber" match. Emile won a 10-round non-title decision over the Cuban in 1960, before Griffith had become champion.

Both are good punchers. Griffith scored 14 knockouts while winning 35 of his 36 bouts. Luis registered 21 knockouts among his 50 victories in 53 fights.

Other in the American League, the Chicago White Sox defeated the Kansas City A's 7-1, the Detroit Tigers downed the New York Yankees 8-4, the Minnesota Twins topped the Los Angeles Angels 6-1, and the Cleveland Indians spanned the Washington Senators 8-1. The Baltimore-Boston game was postponed by rain.

Duke Snider's three-run homer off reliever Diomedes Olivo in the ninth inning earned the Mets their come-from-behind victory after Cardinal starter Ron Taylor had limited them to two hits through the first eight innings.

Don Drysdale cooled off the Cubs with a seven-hit performance that brought him his seventh victory of the year. Drysdale fanned nine in dealing the Cubs their third loss in the last 14 games.

Denis Menke's eighth inning single broke a 5-5 tie between the Braves and Pirates and Hank Aaron's 17th homer highlighted an insurance three-run rally by Milwaukee in the ninth.

Pee Wee Registration To Begin Here June 17

Plans for the 1963 Pee Wee baseball season in Roseburg are nearing completion with registration scheduled to begin June 17, reports supervisor Darl Thornton.

The program is being sponsored by the City of Roseburg, the Roseburg Kiwanis Club and the Roseburg school district. Boys competing must be at least eight years of age and can be no older than 13 as of June 1, 1963. The 13-year olds are also eligible to compete in Babe Ruth baseball, and are encouraged to do so if possible.

Four school fields will be used this summer for Pee Wee play. The diamonds being used will be Fullerton IV, Eastwood, Riverside and Finlay Field at the high school.

Boys in the Fir Grove and Fullerton IV elementary areas will participate at the Fullerton field and will be coached by Larry Seance, sixth grade coach at Fullerton.

Playing at the Eastwood diamond will be the boys in the Benson, Rose and Eastwood school areas. James Toffel, coach at Rose Grade School will be in charge of these boys.

Riverside, Wilbur and Winchester area boys will play at Riverside. Dennis Dutton, a teacher and sophomore coach at the high school, will be in charge there.

At the high school will be the boys of the Green, Melrose and Lucret elementary school areas. Glenn Frakes, coach at Lucret, will serve as head mentor for the boys at Finlay Field.

All boys will register at the designated times at the playing field for their area. Boys 12 and 13 will register at 8 a.m., boys eight and

Cool Paces Legion 9 To Win At Corvallis

Smooth sailing was in store for the Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors Friday night at Corvallis as they romped to a rousing 13-2 triumph over the host team.

The pitching of Ran Cool and Darrell Cellers highlighted the nine-inning affair for local fans, with Cool posting his second victory of the young season.

In his second start in a Roseburg uniform, Cool served the offerings for the first five innings. During his stint on the mound the talented Drain southpaw whiffed 12 Corvallis batters, gave up a single to right-center of the bat of Terry Vaughn in the fourth inning and issued four walks.

With Lockwood Motors leading 8-2 at the end of five frames, coach

Bill Harper pulled the surprise of the evening — sending Cellers to the mound. Cellers, listed as an infielder, turned in a near perfect relief performance as he whitewashed the host team for the final four innings.

Tossing four innings of no-hit ball, Cellers fanned six batters and gave up one walk. Two other runners reached base, but both as a result of Roseburg miscues. Cellers displayed a variety of curves throwing overhand, sidearm and submarining a few, plus fooling the Corvallis batters with his moving fast ball.

While Cool and Cellers were in control on the mound, catcher Jim Beamer provided the power at the plate. Beamer led the hit parade with a towering round-tripper in the sixth inning and a double in the eighth for a 2-6 record. Beamer's homer cleared the left field wall some 350 feet from home plate. The rugged Lockwood Motors backstop accounted for three RBIs.

At the plate Roseburg banded nine hits off the offerings of two Corvallis choppers, and in addition capitalized on 10 errors and seven bases on balls to score 13 runs.

The winners started off with two runs in the first inning, and were never headed. Tom Morrison led off the game with a walk and moved to second on a ground out. Morrison advanced on a passed ball and Bob Manning worked his way for a free pass. An unsuccessful fielder's choice on Beamer's grounder allowed Morrison to score the initial run, while Manning followed when he and Beamer executed a double steal.

In the third a walk to Morrison,

a passed ball and two errors put the Roseburg crew ahead 3-0. Two more runs crossed the plate in the fourth as Jerry Boucock picked up the first hit of the game — a screaming double down the left field line. Ray Shepherd was safe on an error and Mike Blomberg singled Boucock home. Shepherd scored on an error.

Corvallis broke into the scoring column with two runs in the fourth after Cool had retired the first two batters. Vaughn started the rally with a hit and Bill Robertson followed with a base on balls. Sandy Green's soft grounder to Lance Casebeer at second base was muffed to fill the bags. Two successive walks forced the lead runners across before Cool struck out Dave Morris to end the inning.

Roseburg more than got even for the two runs with three in the fifth on a double by Casebeer, a single by Ron Westbrooks, one Corvallis error and three walks. Beamer's four bagger accounted for the single run in the sixth, while four runs crossed the plate in the eighth on three hits and three Corvallis bobbles. Collecting hits in the final rally were Beamer, Don Evans and Cellers.

The victory evened Lockwood Motors' record at 2-2 for the season. Tonight the local team will be at Albany for a doubleheader at 6; then will return home Sunday to host the North Bend Legion team in a 1:30 p.m. twin-bill.
