

# Dodgers Climb To Top; SF Giants Lose Again

Sunday night baseball may never replace drive-in movies but the customers sure liked it because they got a chance to cool off and see the hottest pitching staff in the majors at the same time.

A crowd of 17,437, well above Houston's day-time average, took in major league baseball's first Sunday night game in history Sunday night and whooped in delight as the Colts handed the San Francisco Giants their seventh straight defeat, 3-0.

The whole idea of Sunday night games was to beat the intense day-time heat in Houston and it worked out fine when the game was played in pleasant 79-degree temperature compared with 95 degrees during the day.

Houston's pitchers have been even hotter than that recently, yielding a total of only two runs in the Colts' last three games.

Knucklebatter Skinny Brown, a 28-year-old American League veteran, was Houston's pitching star Sunday night when he took over for starter Dick Farrell in the third inning and held the Giants to one hit over the last 6 1/3 innings for his first victory of the season.

**Yields Lone Single**  
Brown, who struck out six and did not walk a batter, gave up only a fourth inning single to Willie Mays, who was wiped out stealing.

The veteran right-hander, picked up in May as a free agent after being released by the Yankees, was summoned from the bullpen after Farrell pulled a back muscle. Farrell had given up three hits.

The Colts scored two of their three runs off loser Jack Sanford, now 7-5, with Carl Warwick singling home the first one, John Bateman singling home the second and Howie Gosz' double accounting for the final one in the eighth.

**Dodgers Beat Cubs**  
The first-place Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Chicago Cubs, 11-8, despite three homers by Ernie Banks; the New York Mets took the opener from the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-7, but lost the nightcap, 10-4; Philadelphia defeated Cincinnati, 8-7, in 10 innings, then dropped the second game, 3-1, and Pittsburgh blanked Milwaukee, 4-0, but lost the finale, 5-3.

In the American League, the Chicago White Sox took over first place with a 4-3 victory over the Kansas City A's while the Baltimore Orioles tumbled to second place when the Boston Red Sox beat them, 8-2, in 14 innings. The New York Yankees downed the Detroit Tigers, 6-2, the Los Angeles Angels defeated the Minnesota Twins, 4-2, and Cleveland beat Washington, 7-3.

# Roseburg Legion Splits Twin-Bills

## Westbrooks Twirls 3-Hit Shutout To Pace Victory In Home Opener

Everything didn't come up roses for the Lockwood Motors Legion Juniors over the weekend, but outlook definitely improved over the opening games down south.

After winning only one of three games and being plagued by errors in the openers, the local crew displayed moments of greatness over the weekend by winning three and losing two to even the record for the year at 4-4.

Friday Lockwood Motors opened the rugged three-day stand with a lopsided 13-2 victory over Corvallis, then came Saturday to split a twin-bill at Albany before returning home Sunday to divide a pair against North Bend.

The host Cummings Movers of Albany whitewashed the local nine in the seven-inning opener Saturday by a 4-0 count, but Roseburg bounced back with a 7-3 victory in the nightcap. Sunday Ron Westbrooks starred on the mound as he blanked the Tower Motors Team of North Bend, 9-0.

However, the invaders came back to avenge the loss by dumping Roseburg, 5-3 in the second game.

Westbrooks' performance rated as the top pitching job turned in during Saturday or Sunday's action. The flashy Myrtle Creek southpaw displayed uncanny control as he went seven innings without issuing a free pass. The invaders tagged Westbrooks for three hits, but after the first batter in the second inning he retired 18 batters in a row with the aid of two double plays.

Westbrooks fanned nine North Bend batters. The victory evened his record at 1-1 for the season.

Williams joined Saturday Dick Williams joined the winners as he pitched the five-inning nightcap at Albany. Williams struck out but three Cummings Movers, walked three and allowed five hits. However, some timely hitting provided the talented Roseburg right-hander with plenty of runs. Williams also has a 1-1 record on the mound.

Jim Beamer, Bob Manning and Lance Casebeer provided the hitting power during the four games. Beamer came to life after a slow start and posted a perfect 4-4 record at the plate against North Bend, driving in three runs.

Saturday the local team was blanked on four hits by Albany's Rich Hibbard. Roseburg's Jerry Boucek found himself down by one run in the first inning when Mike Edwards was safe on a fielder's choice. Ron Malone walked, Dave Stanley singled to load the bases and a wild pitch brought Edwards home.

The Cummings Movers took a 3-0 lead in the fourth when Malone blasted a two-run homer to deep right-center field. The final run came in the sixth frame on a double by Russ Isom, a throwing error and a single by Jim Klankie. Klankie and Isom each had two hits for the winners.

Manning put Lockwood Motors in the lead in the first inning of the second game when he slapped the ball over the left field fence 330 feet from home plate.

Still the battle was far from over as Albany picked up a pair of runs in the second and another in the third. In the second inning Jim Cooley walked to start the rally,

but was forced at second on an attempted sacrifice by Ron Williams. With two away Isom was safe on an error. Two successive errors allowed the tying run to score, and Klankie smashed a single through the box to bring Isom home and leave the bases loaded. A double by Stanley and a single by Cooley gave the Cummings Movers a third run in the third frame.

**Roseburg Rally**  
Roseburg bounced back with a six-run explosion in the fourth. Casebeer's four-bagger over the fence in deepest centerfield started the big rally. With one away Westbrooks was safe on an error, Boucek walked and Williams singled to load the bases. Mike Blomberg walked to force in the tying run and leave the bases bulging.

At this point Cooley came in to pitch. Another walk put the local team in front, while a fielder's choice, a wild pitch and an error on a dropped ball at the plate provided Lockwood Motors with insurance runs.

Sunday the Roseburg crew caught fire behind Westbrooks pitching to roll to the 9-0 victory in the opener. In the first inning the winners built up a two-run margin as Blomberg was safe on a fielder's choice after Morrison had walked, Manning reached base on an error and Beamer collected his first hit of the afternoon to drive in Blomberg. Casebeer walked to load the bases and Bruce Wassom got a scratch hit with Manning racing home.

In the second inning Morrison singled and Blomberg beat out a bunt with Morrison moving to third on a throwing error. A balk brought Morrison home. Manning walked and Beamer singled to score Blomberg.

The Roseburg wrecking crew ended the scoring with a five-run rally in the fifth. The runs came on four hits, one error and a walk. Manning's towering triple to deep left field was the big blow, driving in two runs. Singles were collected by Beamer, Artie McDonald and Dave Sevall.

Roseburg's two-game win skein was brought to a screeching halt in the second game as the invaders from North Bend built up a 5-0 lead en route to downing the host squad, 5-3.

**No-Hitter Spoiled**  
Mike Murray had a no-hitter going until the fifth inning when Jim Beamer came to pinch hit with one man out and drilled a single past third. With two away Murray found the going rough as McDonald, Casebeer and Kinyon picked up base raps, and Sevall was safe on an error before Dan Rohde came on to get Mike Markham to pop up to the catcher to end the game. Rohde had been tagged with the loss in the opener.

North Bend drew blood in the first inning when Wayne Anderson was safe on a hobble, advanced on a pair of wild pitches and scored on Carl Denhart's single. In the second a single by Dan Westbriht, a sacrifice, a wild pitch and a base blow by Anderson put the invaders in front 2-0.

Two more runs scored for North Bend in the third. Mike McKenzie led off with a double and advanced on a wild pitch. Denhart worked his way for a free pass, then stole second. Mike Westbriht singled McKenzie home and Denhart scored on a run-down of Mike Westbriht between first and second.

A bunt single by Murray, a throwing error on a bunt and a pair of walks gave Tower Motors an insurance run in the fourth.

Roseburg's three runs crossed the plate in the fifth inning uprising, and the tying run was left stranded at second base.

With eight warm-up games under their belt, Lockwood Motors will open in Doug-Lane League play Tuesday before the home fans. Tuesday Willamette of Eugene will invade for a 6:30 p.m. doubleheader at Legion Field. Coach Bill Harper has named ace Letty Ran Cook (2-0) and right-handed Williams (1-1) to oppose the northern invaders.

## Emile Griffith Wins Crown On Controversial Decision

NEW YORK (UPI) — Emile Griffith, the first three-time welterweight champion, may defend his latest crown at Las Vegas, Nev., or some other western city on Friday, Sept. 20, matchmaker Teddy Brenner disclosed today.

That's the date on which the television fights shift from Saturday nights back to Friday nights. An ice show will be occupying Madison Square Garden at the time.

"We'd like to have him on television that night," Brenner explained, "in a defense against the winner of a London fight between ex-champion Luis Rodriguez of Miami Beach and Brian Curvis of Wales."

Brenner said he understood that London promoter Jack Solomons is considering a Rodriguez-Curvis fight this summer.

Griffith, 25, of New York, won the title for a record third time Saturday night on a controversial split 15-round decision over Rodriguez at the Garden before 8,081

## Crunican Sets Record In Junior Olympics

Mike Crunican continued to build his reputation as one of the top prep middle distance stars in the state as he emerged a double winner in Saturday's Junior Olympic meet in Portland, at the finish line.

The Roseburg star topped the field in the mile run with a 4:29.4 clocking and set a new state Junior Olympic record in the 880. In the 880 Crunican covered the distance in 1:58.7 to better the old mark of 1:39.6 set by Lewis Powell of Portland in 1958.

The janky Roseburg ace nipped David Alcott and Ron Byers, both of Portland, at the finish line. Crunican competed in the 16-17 age bracket.

In the boys 14-15 division Ken Cooper of Roseburg finished third in the 440-yard dash and Oakland's Steve Ray took a second place in the eight-pound shot competition.

The Joseph Lane and Fremont 440-yard relay teams failed to place among the top three in the meet. Among the girls, Rixi Nicholson, Roseburg, earned a first place in the 16-17 running broad jump with a leap of 14.7, won the hurdles and she finished second in the 100-yard dash.

Debra Mewk, Roxburg, placed third in the girls 11 and under 50-yard dash. Competing in the 14-15 division Lesley Smith of Roseburg placed third in the 50-yard low hurdles, Patty Cacy of Roseburg was second in the 75-yard dash and Sheryl Dickman of Roseburg tied for first in the running broad jump with a leap of 14.94.

Elaine LeGore and Dawn Ray of Oakland grabbed off second and third spots respectively in the girls 14-15 eight-pound shot — put action.
