# Scout Outing Ends In Tragedy

## 'Bama Governor Spurns Kennedy, Bars 2 Negroes

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (UPI)—Defiant Gov. George C. Wallace stood adamantly in a doorway today and refused to admit two Negro students to the University of Alabama. The two were taken to their assigned dormitories to await an attempt to register formally later in the day.

Wallace, spurning a last-minute order from President Kennedy to "cease and desist," strode into the bright sunshine and in a clear voice read a proclamation barring the two Negroes.

Then, in an apparent last-minute change of strategy by the government, the two Negroes, Vivian Malone and James A. Hood, left the scene of the historic confrontation and went to their dormitories, assigned earlier by the university.

Wallace, standing in the doorway of Foster Auditorium where the Negroes normally would register, three times refused a Justice Department attorney's request to admit them.

Miss Malone and Hood sat quietly in a car a few feet away as the drama was enacted.

Another Attempt Planned  
U.S. Deputy Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach told Wallace the government intends to register the students later in the day.

At least 2,000 troops sent into Alabama by Kennedy when rioting broke out in Birmingham in early May remained on duty at Ft. McClellan, Ala., about 100 miles away.

Katzenbach delivered Kennedy's proclamation to the governor inside the auditorium.

A few minutes later, Wallace came outside to read his proclamation in front of the large brick building which was ringed by tough Alabama troopers, part of the force of 800 the governor had ordered into Tuscaloosa for the showdown.

Reads Proclamation  
In a firm but tense voice, the governor read his proclamation.

"I stand before you today in place of those other Alabamians whose presence would have confronted you had I been derelict. It is the right of every citizen to be heard through his chosen officials of the government to stand courageously against whatever he believes to be the exercise of power beyond the constitutional rights conferred upon our federal government."

"Again I state this is the exercise of the heritage of freedom and liberty under law coupled with responsible government," Wallace said.

When the three government cars pulled up in front of Foster Auditorium, the Negroes remained in the back seat of a tan sedan with John Doar, an attorney for the Justice Department.

Both Negro students sat calmly through the long statement by Wallace.

When it became apparent that Wallace did not intend to step into the government contingent, Katzenbach, Doar and Miss Malone walked quickly to the right and around Foster Auditorium to her dormitory, Mary Burke Hall.

Students Not Involved  
Guthman said later he wanted to make it clear that the students themselves were not repelled at the door. But he reiterated that the governor refused to step aside.

"We'll bring them right through the front door (of Foster Auditorium)," Guthman said.

Wallace made no effort to block the admission of Miss Malone or Hood to their dormitories.

Rigid security precautions were in effect all over the campus where rioting broke out six years ago when Negro Lutherine Lucy registered. She later was expelled for saying university officials had condoned the violence that accompanied her enrollment.

Katzenbach asked Wallace three times to reconsider his determined position and allow the students to enter because, he said, he carried a proclamation from the President of the United States calling for obedience to a federal court decree ordering the two enrolled.

Wallace refused to budge. He said he was on hand—as he had vowed he would be for weeks—to "prevent the entrance because it is illegal and unwarranted."

Edwin Guthman, a spokesman for the Justice Department, said repeatedly that the Negroes would be registered today.

"They will be taken through the door before which the governor stood," he said.

Could Use Troops  
When asked if the government would call for troops to do the job if necessary, he declined to answer.

Kennedy's proclamation, signed in Washington, was a final technical step required before the President could use federal troops.

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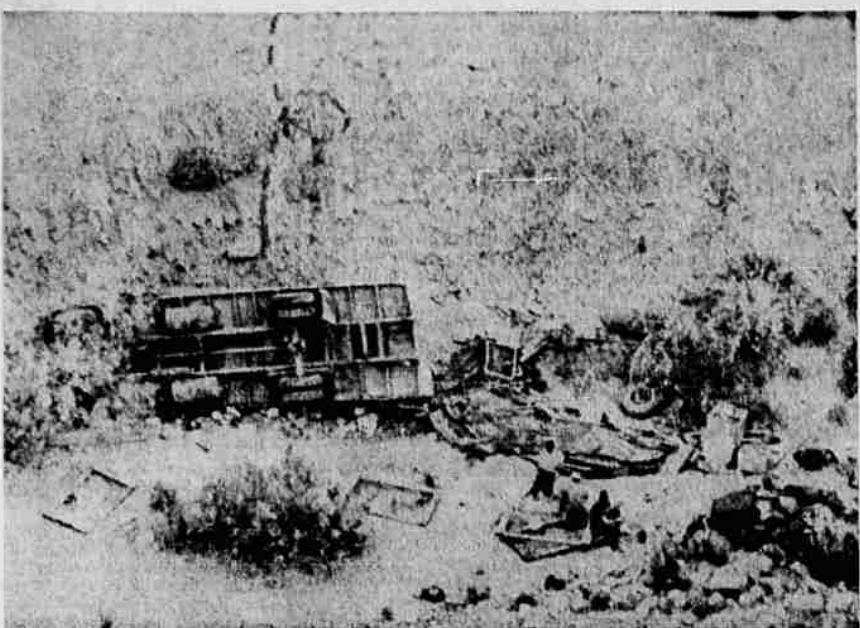

## Utah Truck Plunge Takes Twelve Lives

ESCALANTE, Utah (UPI)—The harsh, rocky, mountainous area covered by brown camping equipment and bright yellow rubber boats. And by the bodies of 12 persons as tragedy ended a Boy Scout outing into rugged southwestern Utah.

The bodies were of nine Scouts, two university professors and a woman reporter who, along with 34 others who were injured, were tossed in all directions when their truck plunged down a precipitous mountainside.

The day that had started so joyfully for the Scouts—just out of school for their summer vacation—thus ended mournfully on a lonely, primitive road in the "no man's land" 35 miles southeast of here.

When Garfield County deputies arrived at the scene four hours after the accident, they found the dead and injured pinned beneath the overturned truck and buried under their camping equipment and rubber boats.

Young David Hall of Provo, one of the injured, described the accident: "The truck wouldn't shift and started rolling backwards and everyone started screaming. Everyone got tossed around, but I was lucky."

Garfield County Sheriff George Middleton said as the truck headed up a rough road carved out of the mountainside, the driver tried to shift gears and the vehicle began rolling backward. Then the brakes failed and the truck spilled over the end of the road, tossing the passengers in its open-bed down a steep precipice.

The Scouts, their leaders, the woman reporter and a group of girls who "hitched" a ride were headed for hole-in-the-rock on the Colorado River. There they were to meet another group of Scouts who had hit the river farther north. The two Scout groups then planned to float down the Roily River to "crossing of the fathers."

Rescue operations began after two of the injured boys, Bryan Boush and Tom Heil of Provo, walked back along the trail toward Escalante until they met a rancher who brought them here.

The trip into the remote and rugged area was planned and sponsored by Socotra Expedition Corp., which provides tours for Mormon youngsters.

Vatican Prepares For June Conclave  
VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Vatican workmen boarded up doors, stairways and windows today in preparation for the conclave June 19 to choose a successor to Pope John XXIII.

The XXIII or 80 cardinals expected to attend the conclave will be sealed off from the outside world when they elect the new spiritual leader of the world's 500 million Roman Catholics. Locked and sealed doors and wooden barriers will restrict them to the limited area around the Sistine Chapel.

Workmen completed the installation Monday of the tall chimney on the roof of the chapel through which smoke traditionally informs the world of the results of each ballot.

The church continued today to mourn Pope John's death June 3 with a funeral mass in St. Peter's Basilica and absolution to a symbolic catafalque on which rested the triple-tiered papal crown.

Members of the sacred College of Cardinals were discussing the choice of a successor. More than 50 of the 82 cardinals have arrived in Rome for informal discussions preliminary to the conclave.

Age and illness was expected to keep a few of the princes of the church from attending the historic event.

## Macmillan Aides Seek To Save Government In Growing Scandal

LONDON (UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's aides rushed back to London today to help map plans to save the government in the growing sex and security scandal resulting from the affair between former War Minister John Profumo and a London playgirl.

Macmillan summoned his ministers to an emergency cabinet meeting Wednesday as crises against the government swelled with press reports that cabinet members knew of Profumo's relationship with red-haired Christine Keeler as much as three months ago.

Macmillan's chief lieutenant in the House of Commons Ian MacLeod cut short a visit to Washington to return to London.

Foreign Secretary Lord Home sped back from a vacation in Scotland.

Lord Privy Seal Edward Heath delayed until Wednesday a planned visit to Oslo, Norway, to confer with Norwegian Foreign Minister Halvard M. Lange.

The Daily Express and the Times of London claimed Profumo, who resigned last week, had discussed a letter to playgirl Christine Keeler with the ministers hours before he denied in the House of Commons that his relations with her were improper.

Profumo, 48, quit the government last Wednesday after admitting he lied to Commons on March 22. His resignation created a mushrooming sex and security scandal which has brought demands that Prime Minister Harold Macmillan resign.

Involves Red Diplomat  
The security implications center on the fact that Profumo and Eugene Ivanov, former assistant naval attaché at the Soviet Embassy here, carried on affairs with Miss Keeler, a 21-year-old redhead described in court last week as a call girl.

Macmillan showed no sign that he would give in to demands for his resignation. The 69-year-old "Unflappable Mac" was expected to enter a House of Commons debate on the scandal next Monday full of fight in an effort to clear his Conservative party's name.

The government rushed a security report on the Profumo affair to counter outcries by the opposition Labor Party. Macmillan, on his return from a vacation Monday, let it be known he had asked Lord Dilhorne, the lord chancellor, to investigate security angles even before the scandal broke publicly.

Give No Source  
Neither the Express nor the Times gave a source for the report that cabinet ministers knew of a letter Profumo sent to Miss Keeler.

The Express said "at least four ministers" discussed the letter with Profumo. It identified the ministers as Chief Party Whip Martin Redmayne; Ian MacLeod, leader of the House of Commons and joint party chairman; Attorney General Sir John Hobson, and another unidentified minister.

The Times named only Redmayne and MacLeod.

Parks Vandalism Reported In Area  
Vandalism to several county parks has been reported to the sheriff's office by W. E. Wierprecht, county Park Department superintendent. Grass was torn up by a car at Whistlers Bend park, and windows broken in a building at the Winchester Access Park. There also was some damage at Hess Park.

County parks are closed from 10:30 p.m. to 4:30 a.m., except where overnight camping is permitted.

## Reston Road Crash Claims Local Youth

Ricky Lee Shafer, 18, of Rt. 4, Box 490, Roseburg, was killed in a one-car accident at 8:05 a.m. today on the Reston Road. Shafer was the eighth traffic fatality this year in Douglas County.

Investigating state police report Shafer, a Douglas High School graduate this spring, was alone in the car. The accident occurred about two miles north off Highway 42 on the Reston Ridge Road, near Tenmile Creek.

Shafer was born April 12, 1945. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Shafer of the same address. The body was removed to Long & Shukle Memorial Chapel and funeral services are pending.

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## \$350 Is Top Prize For Rodeo Parade

"Thar's gold in them thar hills, podner"—gold in the hills around north Roseburg when the prizes are handed out for the best entries in the annual Rodeo parade Saturday.

Richest strike will be the grand sweepstakes of \$350 to the best all-around entry. First, second and third prizes will be given in seven categories. First place prizes will be a minimum of \$50, second prizes \$30 and third prizes, a trophy.

There's plenty of room left for prospectors, according to Frank Lowery, chairman of the parade.

Entry blanks should be turned in to Lowery by Wednesday.

Prizes and the parade itself are being sponsored again this year by North Roseburg merchants.

The parade will get under way at 10 a.m. It will start on NW Garden Valley Boulevard at Mulholland Drive and travel to Riverside Elementary School, turning right on Cedar Street. The next turn will be left on Chestnut Avenue to North Stephens Street, traveling north on Stephens to Safeway Store. A map of the parade route will be in Friday's annual News-Review rodeo section.

The six categories will include bands and marching units; mounted groups; mounted, two or less riders; novelty; floats; and commercial.

Grand marshal for the parade this year will be Capt. Shipwreck, a Eugene television personality. A warmup preview of the parade will be given on television at 8:30 a.m.

The sweepstakes money last year was a big boost to the Knights of Pythias Girls' Drum and Bugle Corps. The \$250 prize helped send the girls to the Seattle World's Fair, according to Lowery.

Hand Grenades Taken At Rilea  
ASTORIA (UPI)—Law enforcement agencies today sought 49 hand grenades, 24 of which were described as very dangerous, that were taken from nearby Camp Rilea.

The theft was discovered during a routine inspection last weekend. The grenades and 420 rounds of .50-caliber machine gun ammunition were taken from an ammunition bunker at the National Guard camp.

The .50-caliber ammunition was discovered in some brush not far away.

Sheriff Carl Bondietti said 24 of the canister-type grenades were phosphorus grenades which he said would cause total casualty within a radius of about 50 feet and do severe damage for twice that distance. The other 25 grenades were of the gas type.

The grenades are about as big as a pint-sized can. The phosphorus grenades have yellow bands around them and the others have red bands. The grenades are ignited by pulling a string.

Former N-R Publisher Dies Unexpectedly In California  
Bert G. Bates, former publisher in Roseburg, died suddenly Monday night at his home, 2830 Sunset Blvd., Bakersfield, Calif.

Death from a heart attack reportedly was sudden and unexpected. The Roseburg native was preceded in death by a sister, Mrs. J. F. Velma Dillard, Roseburg, and a brother, Ross, San Francisco, all the sons and daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Bates.

News Published  
Born in Roseburg, where his father was a printer and later publisher of the Roseburg Daily News, Bates attended Roseburg High School, then joined with his father in editing the Roseburg newspaper. He was author of a widely known humor column, "Prune Pickins," a feature of the newspaper and later published in book form, illustrated with many drawings by the author who, in addition to his ability as a writer, was an excellent cartoonist and musician.

He remained active in newspaper work following the merger of the Daily News and the Roseburg Review in 1921 until sale of the newspaper in 1930. He then went to
