

Douglas County Bank Awarded Contract For City Bond Issue

The Douglas County State Bank Monday night was awarded a contract for the purchase of \$123,000 worth of general obligation bonds by the city of Roseburg.

Funds from the bonds will be used for the purchase of park lands in the SE Oak and SE Washington Avenue bridge area, for improvements to the city swimming pool and for installation of an irrigation system at the Stewart Park golf course.

Douglas County State Bank bid the bonds in at a net interest rate of 3.346 per cent over the 20-year period. Total interest costs will be \$46,660.70.

Other Bidders

Other bidders were First National Bank of Roseburg, with a net interest rate of 3.400 per cent; and U.S. National Bank of Portland, Roseburg branch, with a net interest rate of 3.4539 per cent.

In other action, the proposed improvement of a one-block stretch of SE Washington Ave. on the hill above SE Chadwick Street, was postponed indefinitely until residents of the street initiate action calling for the improvement.

City Engineer Ken Meng presented preliminary plans for the project, about \$10,000 in cost. The city would pay about 30 per cent of this cost, for a 28-foot-wide street with a sidewalk on one side.

Residents of the area who appeared at the meeting Monday night showed no desire to proceed with the plans, so Mayor Thomas Garrison called for tabling the matter until residents of the street become interested in the project.

Bids Opened

The council opened bids for installation of sanitary sewer extensions in the NW Lynwood Street area and on W. Pilger Street. Collins Construction Co. was the lone bidder on both projects, and both bids were rejected as being above the engineer's estimate. Bids will be called for again on both projects.

The council approved plans for the construction of two streets in

the area near St. Joseph's Catholic Church. One will be an extension of W. Bertha Street, which serves the Douglas County Housing Authority's Rosewood Homes Project adjacent to the church. The second will be a new street, to be known as W. Francis Street, which will join W. Harvard Boulevard near the west side fire station, running along the property line of land recently acquired by the church and joining in with the W. Bertha Street extension.

It is felt these new streets will serve to greatly relieve the traffic bottleneck caused by heavy traffic in the area during church functions.

State Talent Contest Draws Grange Youth

A group of talented Douglas County young folks who swept the field in the District Grange Youth Talent Contest held at Dorona in April, will compete for state honors tonight.

The state contest is being held in connection with the State Grange meeting now under way in Oregon City. The contest will be staged at the Oregon City High School.

County competitors, all district winners, are the "Buckhorn Brats," six-piece Dixieland combo from the South Deer Creek Grange; vocalist Terry Anderson, accompanied on guitars by Charles Anderson and Buddy Lumpkin, also from Deer Creek, and David and Dan Barnett of the North Douglas Grange with their variety act, "Man and Woman."

Many Grangers from the local area are attending the state session which began Monday and plan to be present at the contest, according to Hilda Walters, youth chairman.

The most recent addition to the Douglas County Park system is located on the South Umpqua River near Milo.

As yet unofficially named, but known as the Milo Wayside Site, the land was, until a few years ago, used as a State Highway Department maintenance station and thus has a ready-made parking area, reports Wilbur E. Wierprecht, park supervisor.

An old three-stall truck garage located on the property will be sold. The area features a fine

grove of shady conifers, a year-around creek and some 800 feet of frontage on the South Umpqua River.

Roseburg Firm Low On Medford Project

Murphy Construction Co., Rt. 2, Box 627, Roseburg, was apparent low bidder at \$187,990 basic bid for construction of the Jackson County Public Health Center in Medford.

Five bids were submitted, four of which were within \$790 of each other on the basic proposal received at the County Courthouse in Medford. Two firms' bids were identical. Ausland Construction Co., Grants Pass, and Loren Ritchie, Medford, each offered bids of \$187,990 basic. Third low was Barnhart Construction Co., Medford, at \$188,525, and high bidder was Harold Salter, Rogue River at \$191,536.

Plans call for a single-story structure with about 9,350 square feet of floor space. Murphy Construction has been notified it will be awarded the contract.

Roseburg Council Takes Action To Control Oiling Of Streets

The Roseburg City Council, after nearly two hours of deliberation Monday night, voted to allow private "dust oiling" on two city streets, but made it clear steps will be taken to discourage such work in the future.

The council called for city at-

orney Paul Geddes to draw up an ordinance on such street work which would include a penalty for non-compliance with the ordinance.

Stand Clear

In addition, the council made it clear that any future "dust oiling" projects should be carried out under city supervision, and should be done only with a type of oil which is approved by the city.

Chief cause of the controversy at Monday night's meeting was the amount of oil being carried onto paved streets on the west side of the city from some streets dust oiled with a type of oil the city will not approve for future projects. West side Councilman Fred Kelly said this oil has turned West Roseburg into "a sea of oil."

"The people who have paved their streets are being penalized by having this oil dragged off other streets into their areas," Kelly said. "This type of oil is not only corrosive to cars, it is harmful to asphalt."

The council voted to allow dust oiling (a coat of oil being applied to settle dust) on W. Center Street

and NE Eastwood Street, but included a condition that next year the property owners should be prepared to install an asphalt coating, or better, on their streets.

Warning Planned

The general feeling of the council seemed to be that dust oiling should be allowed in some areas this year because the residents were not forewarned asphaltting or better would be required so they could make financial preparations for such a project. That feeling, however, also included the general plan to let residents know they should be prepared to enter such a project next year.

There was a strong contingent of W. Center Street residents on hand to voice their case for oiling. One resident of the street said the dust problem was the worst it had been in 13 years.

The council approved the use of kerosene oil for the dust oiling on these two projects.

Each street which wishes any similar dust oiling projects will be handled on an individual basis for the remainder of the year, the council decided.

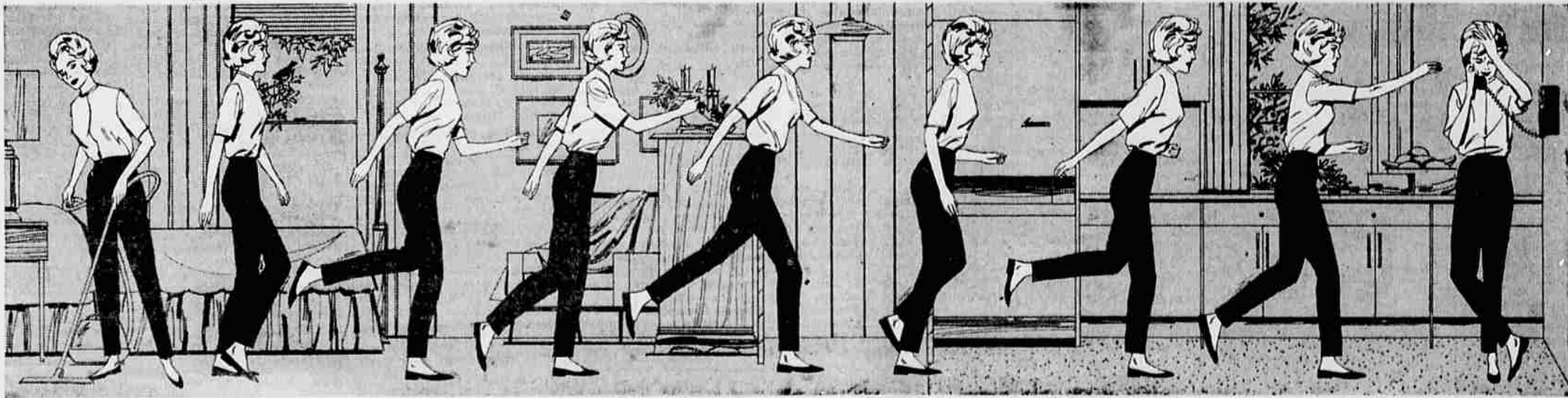
