

Giants Back In Running With 7-3 Win Over LA

The Los Angeles Dodgers had better get a new book on Orlando Cepeda and Ed Bailey or they'll have to read about the World Series again next October.

The Dodgers have one of the best pitching staffs in baseball but Cepeda and Bailey greet 'em like they were batting practice batters. Just take a look at how Orlando and Ed have treated Dodger pitching and you have the explanation for the fact the San Francisco Giants have beaten Los Angeles in three of their last four meetings.

The Giants topped the Dodgers again Monday night, 7-3, with Cepeda crashing a tie-breaking homer in the eighth inning and Bailey belting a two-run homer in the ninth.

Cepeda hit a three-run double and Bailey a two-run homer with a homer and two singles when the Giants beat the Dodgers for the first time this season on May 24. And the same pair hit homers on May 25 when the Giants scored their second win of the season over their arch-rivals.

Cepeda and Bailey have thus knocked in 10 of the 20 runs the Giants have scored in their three victories over the Dodgers.

A crowd of 52,993 at Los Angeles Monday night saw Cepeda's 12th homer of the season snap a 2-1 tie in the eighth. Bailey's two-run homer featured a three-run clinching outburst in the ninth as Don Larsen picked up his first win and Ron Perranoski suffered his second defeat.

Light Heavyweight Battles Featured In Week's Schedule

NEW YORK (UPI) — Light heavyweights command the most attention on this week's boxing schedule although a junior welterweight title bout is slated for Manila.

Since the comparatively light-hitting Willie Pastrano won the light heavyweight (175-pound) crown on a questionable decision over Harold Johnson on June 1—and there can be no return bout—light heavy contenders are eagerly running for a title shot.

Wayne Thornton of Fresno, Calif., is particularly eager for the Pastrano title shot. Fourth-ranking Thornton wants a rubber match with Willie, whom he fought three times for a win, a draw and a loss.

Thornton will make a bid on television Saturday night at Madison Square Garden, where he fights Jose Menno of Buenos Aires, champion of Argentina. Blondish Thornton seeks his 28th win and 19th knockout in 32 bouts.

Menno, black-haired and muscular, makes his United States debut. He did not bring his complete record with him but in his latest 16 bouts he won eight decisions, scored seven knockouts and had one draw.

Doug Jones of New York, who lost a decision to the then champion Harold Johnson in their title fight, May 12, 1962, still has light-heavy ambitions although this week he is fighting as a heavy-weight contender against Billy Daniels of Brooklyn at the Teaneck, N.J. armory on Friday. An impressive heavy-weight victory might boost Doug toward a light-heavy title fight with Pastrano.

At Manila Saturday night, Filipino Roberto Cruz makes his first defense of the junior welterweight (140-pound) title against Eddie Perkins of Chicago. Cruz won the crown on a first-round knockout over Battling Torres of Mexico on March 21.

In the American League, the New York Yankees beat the Washington Senators, 7-0, and then suffered a 1-0 loss, the Cleveland Indians defeated the Baltimore Orioles, 3-2, the Detroit Tigers topped the Boston Red Sox, 6-1, and the Los Angeles Angels routed the Kansas City Athletics, 13-3.

Ken Hubbs' ninth-inning single scored pinch runner Jim Schaffer with the winning run for the Cubs as Lindy McDaniel picked up his fourth win in relief. The victim was Hal Woodeshick, who had not yielded a run in his previous 21 consecutive innings. Billy Williams homered for the Cubs and Howie Goss connected for Houston.

Ray Culp, a rookie right-hander who didn't impress the Phillies much in the spring, raised his record to 8-3 with a four-hitter in a 5½-inning game ended by rain. Tony Gonzalez' double and two blows by Don Demeter were the big hits of the Phillies' eight-hit attack. Ed Mathews homered for the Braves.

Tracy Stallard scored his first big league victory since Sept. 3, 1961, and also pitched his first complete game in the majors with a seven-hitter that handed Cincinnati's Joey Jay his ninth defeat in 12 decisions. Tim Larkness' seventh-inning homer was the decisive blow for the Mets.

For League Openers Cool, Williams To Handle Pitching Duties For Lockwood Motors Crew

Doug-Lane League play will open for the Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors tonight when Willamette of Eugene invades for a 6:30 p.m. doublebill.

In pre-league action the local crew has compiled a 4-4 record, defeating Ashland, Corvallis, Albany and North Bend while losing two to Central Point and one each to Albany and North Bend. No record is available for the reportedly tough Willamette crew which featured topflight pitching in high school ball.

Roseburg, a veteran of many Legion campaigns, will be out to repeat as league champs for the right to enter the Area IV playoffs which include the winner from the Southern Oregon League and the winner from among the coastal teams. This is Willamette's first year of Legion competition.

Along with Roseburg and Willamette, the northern division of Area IV will include teams from Martin Brothers Signs of North Eugene,

South Eugene, Sheldon and Springfield.

In rolling to its second consecutive state championship, Roseburg won the league title last year with only one loss to North Eugene.

Coach Bill Harper's charges will have their work cut out for them this year as two major problems have been evident in early season play. First, infield bobbles have proven costly for the Lockwood Motors team; and secondly, hitting has not been consistently good during the first eight games, though the hitting showed signs of improving in Sunday's twin-bill against North Bend.

Cool To Pitch
Ron Cool, strike out artist of the Roseburg staff, is scheduled to start on the hill in one game tonight, while Dick Williams, star right-hander, will handle the chores in the other.

Cool, a flashy southpaw from Drain, has compiled a 2-0 record by handcutting Ashland and Corvallis in his first starts under the Lockwood Motors banner. The talented lefty has been tagged for just two singles in 12 innings, has walked six batters and has recorded 30 strike outs.

Williams has a 1-1 record in Legion play. In 11 innings he has given up 10 hits, walked five, hit one batter and has struck out eight. He also rates as a good hitter with two base raps for three appearances.

Ready for relief duty if needed will be Darrell Cellers who came on at Corvallis to toss four innings of no-hit ball, lefty Ron Westbrook (1-1), Jon Burnham (0-1) and Jerry Boucock (0-1).

Jim Beamer and Mike Markham will share the catching duties, with Beamer serving as backstop behind Cool. Beamer came to life in the hitting department to raise his batting average to a hefty .381 and has six RBIs.

At first base will be either Dave Sevall, Westbrook or Stan Young, while Lance Casebeer or Cellers will start at second. Boucock or Bob Kinyon will pull down the starting slot at third, with Artie McDonald tentatively set to open at short. McDonald suffered a

sprained ankle against Central Point in the second game of the season and has seen only limited duty since that time. If McDonald isn't ready, Bob Manning will be moved from his regular centerfield spot to play shortstop.

The probable starting outfield will find Mike Blomberg in left, Manning in center and Tom Morrison in right.

McDonald leads the regulars at the plate with five hits for nine at bats — a bulging .556 average. Boucock is hitting .429. Sevall has a .304 average and Blomberg is hitting .286 and leads in RBIs with seven.

Reserves for Roseburg include infielder Rick Abrahamson, and outfielders Don Evans, Bruce Wassom, Jim Coon, Ray Shepherd, and Charles Dorfmeister.

Following tonight's league opener, Roseburg will host the Central Point Cheneys Thursday at 8 p.m. in hopes of avenging the two losses suffered at Camp White. Friday the local crew will travel to North Bend for a single contest, then will return home Sunday to take on the invading Marshfield squad in a doubleheader. The next league games will be June 19 at North Eugene.

Art Pollard Records Track Win, Salt Lake Races Next On Agenda

Art Pollard, fresh from a thrilling victory at the Monroe, Wash., track is set to compete in the Intermountain Championship race at Salt Lake City June 21-22.

Pollard, driving Ken's Martinizing Special, dominated the field in his most recent outing as he staged a duel with Bill Foster, Victoria, B.C., Canada, in the modified sportsman action.

Pollard, circling the new five-eighths mile asphalt oval, had the third fast time in the time trials, with Foster taking the honors with a .26.36.

The two drivers staged a duel in the fast heat race with Foster emerging victorious. Pollard evened the score by winning the trophy dash, then came on to edge Foster in the 35-lap main event. In the main event Pollard took the lead from the Canadian ace on the 31st lap.
