

# Kaline Belts Homers To Lead Tiger Surge

Al Kaline may at last have the last laugh on those critics who've said he'll never be a better ball player than he was at 20 years of age.

It's been seven full seasons since Kaline won the American League batting title with a .340 average in 1955 and became the youngest batting champion in major league history. He's had many fine seasons since 1955 but he's never topped that year for all-around effectiveness.

This very well could be the year — in fact, it could be a year in which he silences his critics once and for all by becoming the sixth American Leaguer to win the triple batting crown. Mickey Mantle was the last to do it, in 1956, and the only other AL slugger who've accomplished the feat were Ted Williams, Ty Cobb, Jimmy Foxx and Lou Gehrig.

Kaline is currently leading the AL with 45 runs batted in, ranks second in batting with a .337 mark and his 13 homers place him two behind leader Bob Allison of the Minnesota Twins.

Kaline reached a career milestone Monday night when he hit the 200th and 201st homers of his career in pacing the Tigers to a 6-1 victory over the Boston Red Sox. He is the sixth active AL player to reach the 200-homer mark, joining Mantle, Yogi Berra, Joe Adcock, Rocky Colavito and Roger Maris.

Kaline's 200th homer followed a single by Jake Wood and a walk to Billy Bruton and sent the Tigers off to a 3-0 lead in the first inning. He hit No. 201 in the fifth inning to restore Detroit to a three-run lead. Rookie Bill Fuld yielded only three singles — all by Carl Yastrzemski — to win his third game against one defeat.

The Cleveland Indians beat the Baltimore Orioles, 3-2, the Los Angeles Angels walloped the Kansas City Athletics, 13-3, and the Washington Senators scored a 1-0 victory after a 7-0 loss to the New York Yankees in other American League games.

Barry Latman pitched seven-hit ball for 8 2/3 innings and produced his own winning run with a seventh-inning homer as the Indians gained their seventh win in their last eight games. Latman's homer came on the first pitch by Mike McCormick after the teams waited 77 minutes for a rainstorm to end. Joe Adcock also homered for the Indians, who dealt the Orioles their ninth defeat in 11 games.

Leon Wagner, Charlie Dees and Ed Sadowski homered to lead an 18-hit Angel attack that also included three hits each by Albie Pearson and Lee Thomas. Dan Osinski pitched a seven-hitter behind the assault to raise his record to 5-2. Orlando Pena suffered his seventh loss against five wins.

## Peden Ousted At Portland; Ellis Suspended By Padres

If you're looking for a brief rundown on Monday's Pacific Coast League action, forget the league standings and game results.

Look instead for a couple of off field items from the widely separated cities of Portland, Ore., and San Diego, Calif.

Item one: Portland Beaver manager Les Peden was fired and replaced by Danny Carnevale, a scout in the Kansas City Organization.

Item two: San Diego pitcher Sammy Ellis was suspended indefinitely for insubordination to climax a running dispute with manager Don Heffner.

Meanwhile, on the playing field, Oklahoma City blanked the Padres 7-0 and Spokane topped Seattle 4-1. Denver dropped a close 8-7 exhibition game to the Minnesota Twins and Dallas-Ft. Worth was rained out at Salt Lake City. Peden, a 40-year-old veteran of 17 years of minor league baseball, joined Portland as a playing manager last year and the Beavers finished sixth in the PCL with a 74-80 record.

Peden also played in 47 games and compiled an impressive .351 batting average.

This year Peden concentrated on his managerial duties. (He just recently placed himself on the active list and belted a grand slam home run Saturday night.) The Beavers are currently in third place in the Northern Division with a respectable 28-28 record.

But this did not satisfy the Kansas City Athletics, parent team of the Beavers.

"We hoped the Beavers would be doing better at this stage of the campaign," Hank Peters, Kansas City's farm director, said in announcing Peden's dismissal Monday. "We feel a change of managers might perk up the club."

The feud between Ellis and Heffner had been building up for some days and finally exploded Monday with Heffner's statement: "There's not room for both of us on the ball club, either he goes or I go."

The suspension was a direct result of an incident Sunday, although Ellis had already been assessed two fines for run-ins with Heffner.

## Ducks Unlimited Elects Dan Fry

Daniel J. Fry Jr., Salem, has been elected as the new state chairman for Ducks Unlimited to replace Jack Hayes, Portland, who has served as chairman for the past four years.

Serving with Fry as vice-chairman will be Werner G. Brown, Salem, Jock Fewell and George Marlarkey will continue as co-chairmen of the Multnomah County Ducks Unlimited Committee.

Fry and Brown have been active in the Marion and Polk county groups, working on the Ducks Unlimited Field Days which have highlighted the club's activities in recent years.

The two new officers plan to visit many cities in Oregon in the near future to review the state's organization, and plan to enlarge on the program wherever possible.

Ducks Unlimited is composed of sportsmen interested in improving and preserving waterfowl hunting in the state.

## Local Thinclads Smash Records As 32 Participate At Portland

Competing in the annual Junior Olympic track meet at Portland over the weekend were 32 boys and girls from Roseburg.

The local entrants brought home a total of nine Olympic medals, including five first place awards. Rexi Nicholson in the girls 16-17 bracket and Mike Crumican in the boys 16-17 division emerged as the top winners.

Miss Nicholson captured a second in the 100-yard dash with a 12.3 clocking, and won first places in the 50-yard low hurdles with a .67.4 and the broad jump with a leap of 14.7. Her time in the hurdles snapped the old meet record of .68.3.

Crumican won the mile and 800 races for boys in the 16-17 age bracket. In the 800 Crumican set a new meet record as he toured the course in 1:58.6 to topple the old mark of 1:59.7. He was timed at 4:29.4 in the mile.

Other boys entered in the Junior Olympics from Roseburg were Robin Thomas, Bruce White, Brad Cummings, Ron Frashour, Bill Packett, Dick Diehrich, Ken Cooper and Bob Salcido.
